CONNAUGHT.

GALWAY.

A Press Association telegram says:
—The owners of the steamship Oar-
nock, which left Glasgow, with
eleven hands, for Galway, have given
her up as lost, nothing having been
heard of her since she sailed.

LEINSTER.

DUBLIN.

Mr. O'Sullivan who has been for
the past sixteen years chief clerk in
the Belfast prison, has been promot-
ed to the rank of Deputy Governor of
Kilmainham. Mr. O'Sullivan is
succeeded in Belfast by Mr. McHugh.

Statistics have been prepared,
from local inquiry by the constabulary,
as to the produce of the crops
in Ireland during the past summer,

ley's resolve to supply, out of the
public funds, potato seed to the
small farmers, upon whom the great
loss has fallen.

KILKENNY.

Mr. P. M. Egan, Kilkenny, has
been appointed to the Commission of
the Peace for the borough of Kil-
kenny. Some time since, he was
recommended for the Commission by
the almost unanimous vote of the
Kilkenny Corporation. Mr. Egan
has been twice Mayor of Kilkenny,
and during his term of office suc-
ceeded in completing an extensive
artisans' dwelling scheme for the
"Fair City", as well as establishing
some of its important firms. As the
author of several historical and edu-
cational works he is widely known.

MAYO.

Jas. Lynchman, the Achill fugi-
tive, has been arrested at the house
of a man named Gallagher, at Sra-
heena, near Westport. The police
had searched the premises previously
without avail; but, finally, on pulling
aside a heavy chest, a hole under
the floor was discovered, and in this
Lynchman was concealed. He was
at once handcuffed and transferred,
under a strong escort, to Castlebar
jail. Gallagher, the owner of the
house, and a girl named Mary Mas-
ters were arrested.

ROSCOMMON.

At the Quarter Sessions in Ros-
common, Judge O'Connor Morris
took up the hearing of the cases on
the De Freyne estate. A great deal
of interest was manifested when the
cases were called, as it was known
that the tenants had offered to pay a
year's rent, which was refused, and
again, that when two years' rent
was offered, three years' was de-
manded. Mr. Hynes, for the land-
lord, said that there was eight cases
in which the parties were allowed in
as caretakers, all of whom owed over
eight years' rent. The landlord
offered fair terms, and these tenants
would have accepted them only they
were interfered with. Michael
Daly gave up possession, and the
landlord got possession of all. Twelve
of the tenants went back, and
made no offer. Mr. McDonnell
—That is not a fact. They did make
an offer. Mr. Hynes—An ejectment
was then brought, and your lordship
thought it right to extend the same
terms to these twelve as the others.
Judge Morris—I think so still. Mr.
McDonnell asked if the landlord
would accept the offer of Judge Mor-
ris; but Mr. Hynes said he had no
instructions, which was simply an
evasion of the Judge's offer. Judge
Morris—If the case had gone before
the Commissioners the landlord
would have to accept two years' rent
and settle it. If I was a Commis-
sioner I would give him only two
years' rent. The Judge then intimated
that he should give a decree, and
that Lord De Freyne should be
satisfied to get two years' rent. He
would give a decree with stay of
execution for a month. Mr. McDon-
nell asked to have the same rule
made in all the cases, which was
agreed to.

SLIGO.

Most Rev. Doctor Gillooly, Bishop
of Elphin, died recently at The Pal-
ace, Sligo. He had been ill for a
considerable time, and it was only
the other day that the appointment
of a Coadjutor was made known.
During the last days of his illness
hope of his recovery had been prac-
tically abandoned. The sad tidings
were received with the utmost sor-
row in the town and district. Most
Rev. Dr. Gillooly was the senior
member of the Irish Episcopate.
Before his elevation to the See of
Elphin he had been a zealous and un-
tiring priest of the Congregation of
the Mission. He was elected Coad-
jutor Bishop on the 18th of February,
1885, was consecrated on the 7th of
September in the same year, and
succeeded to the See on the 1st of
December, 1885.

WEXFORD.

Sergeant John Dunne, who had
been in Enniscorthy for a great
many years, has been transferred to
Kilmoickridge.

The obsequies of the late Rev.
Nicholas Roche, of New Ross, were
held in the parish church, where the
solemn High Mass and Office for the
repose of the soul of the dead took
place. The church was crowded.
The Most Rev. Dr. Browne, Bishop
of Ferns, presided at the office, and
a large number of clergymen were
present.

WICKLOW.

The Messrs. Lynch of Birm-
ingham, the celebrated manufacturers
of explosives, have been for some
time past in negotiation for the ac-
quirement of the sandhills or war-
ren in the north-side of the Arklow
river, with a view to erecting a cor-
dite factory thereon. An initial
difficulty with the War Office having
been overcome, everything pro-
gressed so that the site for the pur-
posed factory had been marked out
and material and plant for the build-
ings had been sent on to Arklow.
At the last moment, however, some
difficulty seems to have arisen, and
the men who were employed in car-
rying out some preliminary work on
the ground were discharged, and
orders given for the stoppage of the
works. It seems that some people
objected to the fencing of the sand
hills, shutting them out from access
to the sea at this particular place. It
is thought, however, that the diffi-
culty will be overcome.

MUNSTER.

CLARE.

The proceedings of the Carrigroh-
Petty Sessions possessed an extra-
ordinary public interest from the
fact of the bailiff on Major Hickman's
estate, at Rehy, named Timothy
Healy, being brought up in custody
charged with the burning of the
house of an evicted tenant on the
estate named Liddane. The house,
from which Liddane had been evic-
ted some time ago, was burned on St.
Stephen's Night, and Major Hickman
had lodged a claim for £50. Infor-
mation received by the police, cou-
pled with the fact of Healy's de-
camping from the place after the
outrage, caused suspicion to rest on
the bailiff at once, and he was ar-
rested soon after. Evidence of a
circumstantial character having
been given, Healy was returned for
trial to the Clare Spring Assizes,
bail being offered, himself in £50 and
two securities in £25 each.

CORK.

Dr. John Reed and Dr. R. P. Cros-
bie have been elected House-surgeons
to the South Infirmary, Cork.

Alphonsus Maria O'Flynn, third
son of John O'Flynn, of Hornhead,
Passage, West, has made application
for admission to the Irish Bar.

A Clonsilla correspondent says
that the schooner Betsey Nichol, with
Captain Roberts and three sailors,
left Dunne Bay for Liverpool. Two
days after she put into Kinsale, and
has not since been heard from. It is
feared that the vessel and crew are
lost.

KERRY.

The distress in Kerry, consequent
on the failure at last year's crops,
has already become acute, and the
only remedy must be found in the
immediate setting on foot of re-
productive works in the various dis-
tricts. The idea that famine can be
relieved out of the poor-rates, when
every pound is already taxed to
nearly half its value is nonsense.
The statement is made that there is
no private employment in the coun-
ty. All other alternatives of relief
are thus exhausted, and it is essen-
tial that the only efficient expedient
should be promptly put in force.

LIMERICK.

At the last Presentment Sessions,
Mr. Gubbins, a farmer, was awarded
£1,500 compensation for the malici-
ous burning of five hundred tons of
hay and other property last October.

The dispute in connection with the
Croom Mills Bakery strike, in Li-
merick, which has been in existence
for the past three years, has at last
been satisfactorily arranged, and the
strike is at an end. There was a
band parade through the streets re-
cently, in honor of the event, and
barrels were set ablaze in the
vicinity of the Mechanics' Institute.

TIPPERARY.

Michael Hughes, of Sheehyville,
near Thurles, charged with the
murder of Thomas Dwyer, of the
same place, by striking him on the
head with a stone on the 6th of June
last, was arrested by the Rahilly
police, and conveyed to Thurles,
where he was remanded for examina-
tion.

The Lord Chancellor has appoint-
ed Mr. J. Slattery, Bridge House,
Borrisokane, late District Inspector
R.I.C., to the Commission of the
Peace for the County Tipperary.
Mr. Britton, of Newtown House,
Carrick, has also been appointed to
the Commission of the Peace. Mr.
Britton is a Nationalist.

WATERFORD.

Mr. F. Keane, with his usual
enterprise and energy, is devising
means for procuring a suitable steam-

er that will ply between Cappoquin
and Youghal. The one he has in
view will accommodate 400 passen-
gers, and will draw only 4½ feet of
water. Her speed, too, will be
much greater than that of previous
boats that ran on the Blackwater.

Colonel James Jackson Clark, of

rena, county Derry, have been ap-
pointed Deputy Lieutenants for the
city and county of Derry.

Intelligence reached Coleraine of
the sudden death of Mr. Frank
Goulding Watney, J.P., of Land-
more House, Aghadowey, agent for
the Worshipful Company, of Mercers
in the Coleraine district.

DONEGAL.

A sad boating fatality is reported
from Arranmore Island. Five fish-
ermen set out at two o'clock in the
morning to haul their herring nets.
They failed to appear at Burtonport
market as expected, and fears were
entertained for their safety. In the
evening their boat was found, bot-
tom upwards, with the body of one
of the men entangled in the net
attached to it. It is believed that the
haul of herring was too great, and
the sea being choppy, the boat cap-
sized.

DOWN.

Messrs. John and Peter O'Hare, of
Mayo Bridge, have granted, unsol-
icited, to their Carnarney tenants an
abatement of 25 per cent, on their
judicial rents, due 1st November
last. For a number of years these
gentlemen have given an abatement
of from 30 to 25 per cent, and in no
case was it less than 25 per cent.

MONAGHAN.

At the first meeting of the newly
appointed governors of the Monaghan
and Cavan District Lunatic Asylum,
held in the boardroom attached to
the institution, in Monaghan, Mr.
James McCullagh, J.P., in the chair,
Mr. P. Rafferty called the attention
of the Board to the fact that, while
Lord Rossmore wanted £92 an acre
for land, which was valued by the
Board of Control at £54, the adjoin-
ing land, belonging to Mr. A. N.
Moire-Forster, had been offered to
them at £60 an acre—£10 less than
the original offer. The Chairman
said £92 an acre would not be a bad
price. Mr. Rafferty said he had been
speaking to Mr. Harry Rogers, Mr.
Haire-Forster's agent, and had told
him that he thought £50 an acre
would be a fair price. Most Rev.
Dr. Owens said that it was his
opinion that Mr. Haire-Forster's land
was of higher value than Lord Ros-
smore's. After some further conver-
sation, Mr. Rafferty moved that Dr.
Taylor be instructed to write offer-
ing £54 an acre to Mr. Haire-For-
ster, and that that gentleman's reply
be forwarded to the Board of Con-
trol. Most Rev. Dr. Owens second-
ed the motion, and it was unanim-
ously adopted.

TYRONE.

Thomas O'Neill, of Lisinastara,
was found dead in bed, at the house
of a friend.

The estimate of the corn crop in the
Southern States this year is 490,000,000
bushels, an increase of 50,000,000 bush-
els over last year. Here is a gold mine,
the yield of which can be made better
and better if planters can only be per-
suaded to drop cotton to some extent.
The day ought to be near at hand also
