# NEWS DOTS FROM IRELAND

## Interesting Paragraphs Concerning the Doings of Our Friends Across the Ocean,

### Gathered from All Parts of the Emerald Isle for Our Readers.

#### CONNAUGHT.

**GALWAY.**  
The Spring Assizes for both the City and County of Galway will open on Friday, the 22d of March.

A monster Nationalist meeting was held recently at Rye Hill, five miles from Athenry. Notwithstanding the severity of the weather and heavy snow fall, there was an immense gathering of people. Speeches were delivered by Messrs. John Roche and D. Kilbridge, M. P. A report appeared recently in the Dublin Independent, announcing the death of the redoubtable Murty Hynes, of Land League fame. We are glad to say that the report was a falsehood, devised out of 'whole cloth.' The would-be political wit who devised it ought to have his hide tanned, and would, no doubt, if his identity could be discovered.

#### LEINSTER.

**CARLOW.**  
The visit paid so recently to his friends in Carlow by Father Edmund J. Dillon, from his far-away mission in Trinidad, renders more painful the sad news of his death, just received by his father, Mr. Edward Dillon, of the Town Hall. Father Dillon died of aneurism of the heart after a long illness, borne with most edifying Christian resignation. The deceased was born at Kenagh, county Longford, on the 19th April, 1861.

**DUBLIN.**  
An international hurling match, between the Gaelic Athletic Associations of Ireland and America, to be played next summer, in Dublin, is on the tapis.

The directorate of the City and Suburban Grounds, Dublin, will bring about a revival of an ancient Irish custom on next St. Patrick's Day. A championship reel and jig will open the proceedings, and it is hoped that every Gaelic Club in the country will send its representative dancer to the contest. Bands will attend, and a tug-of-war and other athletic contests for championship honors will also take place.

#### MUNSTER.

**CLARE.**  
The new high altar to the memory of the late reverend pastor of Carrigaholt, Rev. P. Brennan, has been completed at the studio of Mr. Wm. O'Neill, sculptor, Great Brunswick street, Dublin. The design is of Gothic character and composed of statuary, Sicilian and colored marbles, and Caen stone. Beneath the altar table is a finely carved representation of the Entombment, with elaborately treated panels. The inscription on the pith is as follows:—To the memory of the Rev. P. Brennan, P. P., of Carrigaholt, from December, 1886, to December, 1893—R. I. P. The canopy rises to a considerable height, and is supported by Irish red granite shafts. The effect of the entire work is exceptionally artistic and impressive.

**KILKENNY.**  
Edward K. Bunbury Tighe, Esq., D. L., of Woodstock, Innistogue, has been appointed High Sheriff for the county Kilkenny.

**KING'S.**  
William B. Homan Mulock, Esq., Bellair, Ballinacorney, has been appointed High Sheriff of King's County.

The Spring Assizes for King's County will open at Tullamore, on Friday, March 1st, before Justice O'Brien and Justice Johnson.

**LONGFORD.**  
The new election of Commissioners, ordered for the borough of Longford, by the Queen's Bench Division, on account of the irregularities at the annual contest in October last took place recently. The result was a majority for the Redmondites and Tory parties. Mr. John Quinn, C. T. C., was the presiding officer. After the declaration of the poll a very noisy gang of Redmondites crowded into the jury room, and acted in a most disgraceful manner. The following was the result:—Plunket (R), 103; McEwee (T), 97; Igée (R), 88; Trimble (R), 77; Shevlin (N), 74; Duffy (N), 63.

**LOUTH.**  
Mr. M. C. Moynagh, solicitor, Dundalk, has been appointed Crown Solicitor for Louth and for the County of the Town of Drogheda, in the room of the late Mr. Given, deceased.

Mr. Patrick Finegan, a well-known and esteemed citizen of Drogheda, died suddenly, at his residence, at Narrow West street. The deceased had been for nearly forty years past in the employ of Messrs. Hill, corn merchants and millers, as store keeper and clerk, and during that long period stood high in the esteem of his employers, as well as of all who knew him. Apoplexy, resulting in heart failure, was the cause of death.

**MEATH.**  
A handsome testimonial recording the services rendered and the acknowledgments of the Royal Humane Society has been awarded to Patrick Mooney, aged 22, of Seaton's lane, Trim, for saving a child of 4 years, named James Brogan, on December 21, near Boyne Bridge. A strong current was running, and the water at the spot was fully eight feet deep. Mooney gallantly jumped over the parapet, without divesting himself of any of his clothes, and with considerable risk and difficulty swam with the boy to the shore.

**QUEEN'S.**  
Charles Joseph Black, Esq., Health

House, Maryborough, has been appointed High Sheriff of Queen's County.

**WESTMEATH.**  
Captain Lawrence Murphy, Ballinacorney, Multyfarnham, has been appointed High Sheriff of Westmeath.

**WEXFORD.**  
At a threshing of corn near Canross, a young man, Patrick Maloney, from Raheen, who had been feeding the drum of the machine, lost his right arm. After the accident, the injured man became insensible but subsequently recovered consciousness. He was attended by Dr. Cardiff, and conveyed to the County Infirmary, where he died on the following day. The injury was of such a frightful nature that there was no hope of his recovery from the beginning.

**WICKLOW.**  
A portion of a stained glass window in Bray Catholic Church was discovered recently to have been broken, and it was suggested that the damage had been caused by some person entering the building by the open part of the window. Next day the police arrested a young artisan named Martin, who is employed at the new church buildings. The arrest caused a great sensation, as the prisoner is the son of Alderman Meade's foreman mason, who is carrying out the enlargements of the church.

**WATERFORD.**  
The Corporation of Waterford have decided by 18 votes to 1 to confer the freedom of the city on Mr. Sexton, M. P.

An application for a patent has been made by M. O'Connell, of Cappoquin, for 'An improved method of shifting straps, belts, bands or ropes on rotary pulleys.'

#### ULSTER.

**ANTRIM.**  
A land meeting was held recently, in the Protestant Hall, Antrim. It being market day there was a large number of farmers in the town, and the hall was well filled at two o'clock, the admission being by ticket. The chair was occupied by Mr. S. Black, who was heard with much enthusiasm during his speech, after which a number of resolutions favoring land reform were proposed and adopted.

**ARMAGH.**  
The house of a man named Joseph Mahwinny, in the townland of Derrymore, near the village of Maghera, was destroyed by fire recently, together with the furniture and clothing, also some money which he had to meet his rent. A son of Mahwinny's was taken out of the house in an unconscious state. As the fire is alleged to have been of malicious origin a claim for £200 compensation has been lodged.

**DERRY.**  
The Spring Assizes for Derry City and County will open on Monday, March 18th, before Justice Holmes and Justice Gibson.

The steamer Shamrock, reported beached in Culmore Bay during the late gales, has been successfully floated and brought to Londonderry for dry-docking for repairs.

#### DONEGAL.

In the Court of Appeals, Dublin, the arguments in the case of McSheffry v. Doherty were resumed and concluded. The plaintiff appealed against a decision of the Queen's Bench Division upholding a verdict found for the defendant in a cross action of ejectment to recover possession of certain lands in the County of Donegal. The case was of very technical character, and the court reserved judgment.

#### DOWN.

In the Court of Queen's Bench, Dublin (before Justice Madden and a Common Jury), Jane Minnes, the wife of a farmer living at Loughadrian, county Down, sued John Miskemmons, a farmer, living in the same neighborhood, to recover £200 damages for slander. The defence was a denial of the use of the words in a defamatory sense. The jury found for the plaintiff, with £20 damages.

#### MONAGHAN.

An inquest was held recently, at Dundalk, by Dr. Sellars, Coroner for North Louth, touching the death of a man who was found dead in a bedroom in the Imperial Hotel. Deceased had arrived at the hotel the previous night, and left instructions to be called at 7.30 next morning. At that hour the 'boots' of the hotel rapped at his door, and not getting an answer forced it in, when he found the bed undisturbed and the man dead in a sitting position. The deceased was identified as James Michael Mullan, leather and spirit merchant, Monaghan. The brother of the deceased gave evidence that deceased was in financial difficulties, and was going through the Bankruptcy Court. The jury did not consider a post mortem necessary, and found that deceased died from natural causes.

Expectorating upon the floors of street cars is to be stopped by the car companies of the city of Washington. Conductors are required to eject passengers guilty of such vulgarity; and if the companies went further and employed Corbitts and Sullivans to pitch such fellows through the car windows, the whole race of ladies and other decent people would rise up and call them blessed. The same regulations should be enforced in every other city; not only regarding street cars, but sidewalks also. Cleanliness, better than church steeples, points to a higher civilization, and it is refreshing to see that in at least one city the public demand for personal decency is heeded. Let the good work go on!

**LIMERICK.**  
Mr. J. B. Irwin, Resident Magistrate of the Limerick District, has been transferred to another county. He will be succeeded by Mr. E. F. Hickson, R. M., Enniskillen.

A special meeting of the Limerick Harbor Board was held recently, at the office, in Green street, for the purpose of electing a secretary in succession to the late Mr. Jas. Harris, at a fixed salary of £250 per annum. Three candidates were proposed—Messrs. J. T. Phillips, John Boyd, and Patrick Riordan, and on a final poll, Mr. Boyd was elected by seven votes to six. The Mayor presided.

**TIPPERARY.**  
An accident of a melancholy nature, resulting in the death of Miss Charlotte Powell, daughter of Mr. James Powell, of Derryleigh House, Newport, occurred a few weeks ago. Miss Powell left her father's house for a short walk, mentioning that she would be back in time to dine with the other members of the family. Her long absence eventually gave rise to feelings of alarm, and some members of the household hav-

ing gone to look for her, they found, to their horror, the young lady in a neighboring river. It was evident that she had been endeavoring to cross the river, when she must have been seized with a weakness or have accidentally fallen into the water.

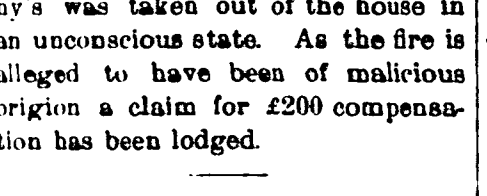
