

HISTORY OF THE WEEK

Brief Notes Chronicling All Events of Interest.

CLIPPED, COULLED AND CONDENSED

Record of the Most Important Happenings of the Last Seven Days Put in Small Space and Arranged With Regard for the Busy Reader.

The New York state senate committee on general laws finding no objection to Mr. Chapman's bill compelling the issuing of a license by a county clerk before a marriage can be celebrated by a clergyman, decided to report the bill favorably.

John Milligan, who murdered Galen and Hannah Clark on Nov. 3, 1893, has been hanged at Oklahoma City. O. T. Milligan was only 21 years old. He died without fear, saying he was going straight to glory.

Captain I. G. Shepard, chief of the revenue cutter service of the treasury department, has died in Washington from pneumonia.

Senator Stewart received the following dispatch from the governor of Nevada: "Resolution of legislature indemnifying Sibley and bimetallic platform passed and approved."

The Spanish government has issued an order forbidding delivery of private telegraph dispatches containing Cuban news of a character unfavorable to the government. It has also ordered that no cipher messages be sent to Cuba.

A flood in the Parahiba do Sul river has destroyed the sugar crop in the Campos dos Goitanezes district in the state of Rio Janeiro. This district produces the best sugar grown in Brazil.

James O'Brien, Jr., of the firm of Meredith & O'Brien, stock brokers of Montreal, has been arrested on the charge of obtaining \$20,000 from the Quebec bank under false pretenses.

Judge P. Emory Aldrich, senior justice of the superior court of Massachusetts, died at his home on Elm street, Worcester, after an illness of two weeks.

The New Jersey house has passed the elective vote bill over the governor's veto by a vote of 39 to 16. The bill is now a law.

A cable dispatch has been received by the American board of foreign missions announcing the death of Rev. George Cushing Knapp at Bitlis, Eastern Turkey. Mr. Knapp has been a missionary in that country for 40 years, which have been years of severe labor and much peril.

Ex-Manager Cook of the Commercial bank of St. Johns, N. F., has been arrested. Many grave charges are proffered against him.

New York state superintendent of public buildings has discharged 20 more employees of his department who hold over from the Democratic administration.

A severe engagement was fought at Barrocas, Colombia. The rebels numbered 500, of whom 190 were slain. In addition the government troops, which were victorious, captured many prisoners.

Group Five of the State Bankers' association in session at Utica, N. Y., adopted the system of uniform statements and resolved to vote in favor of the consolidating of Group Four, consisting of Jefferson, Oswego, Onondaga, Madison and Cortland counties, with Group Five.

The firm of Cushman Bros. & Co., manufacturers of window shades of Boston, went into insolvency with liabilities of \$150,000.

Governor Morton of New York has granted the requisition of the governor of New Jersey for the transfer to that state of Apostle James, arrested in New York city on the charge of having committed fornication (which crime is punishable under the laws of New Jersey) with Mary Sears of Passaic, N. J.

Walker A. Hamner, the embezzling teller of the First National bank of Lynchburg, Va., pleaded guilty in the United States court and was sentenced to seven years in the penitentiary.

A consistory was held at Rome at which the pope preconized 95 archbishops and bishops, including the archbishop of St. Boniface, Canada, and the bishop of St. Johns, N. F.

Jacob Goldberg and his wife, living at Indianapolis, were found asphyxiated by natural gas which had escaped from the kitchen stove. Mrs. Goldberg was dead and her husband cannot recover.

George Wittaker, convicted of murder, and Will Downs, convicted of rape at Morrilton, Ark., have been sentenced by Judge Wallace to hang on Friday, April 30.

Governor McIntyre of Colorado has issued a proclamation offering \$1,000 reward for the capture of any or all the men who lynched the Italians at Walsenburg.

The Justitia and Ideal (newspapers) of Madrid are to be prosecuted before a court martial on account of articles which they have published reflecting upon the conduct of army officers.

Winslow M. Mead, a popular and well-known newspaper man of Rochester, has accepted an appointment under Superintendent of Public Works Aldridge at Albany.

Senator Romero, the Mexican minister at Washington, has entered a formal denial of the accuracy of the published statement that the impending war between Mexico and Guatemala is due to the influence of a British syndicate which controls the Tehuantepec railroad from fear of the competition of the Guatemalan road.

An official dispatch from Havana, Cuba, says that General La Chamba has left Manzanilla with a force of cavalry and infantry. He has gone in the direction of Xucuman.

Prince Komatsu, commander-in-chief of the Japanese armies, has been ordered to proceed to China and to establish his principal headquarters, probably at Peking. The emperor remains at Hiroshima.

Zempha, the queen of Palmyra, spoke seven languages. After being captured by the Romans she learned Latin and Greek also, married a Roman senator and lived the rest of her life as a Roman matron.

It is estimated by engineers that the leakage from the gas pipes of London equals 9 per cent of the total manufacture.

EXTRAORDINARY GRAND JURY

Presentment and Indictments Against Police Officials Handed Up.

NEW YORK, March 10.—The extraordinary grand jury which has been sitting since Jan. 7, reported to Justice Ingram in the court of oyer and terminer.

Foreman Leggett handed up a bunch of indictments, numbering 33, and also a presentment censuring the police department of this city.

The following passage occurs in the presentment: "Circumstances and testimony offered have tended to show financial consideration and in some cases lax administration. Indeed, the publicity with which the law is violated and the immunity from arrest enjoyed by the lawbreakers are inconsistent with the law."

The jury has not been discharged, as Foreman Leggett stated they had some more work to complete.

The grand jury in its presentment refers to Superintendent Byrne as follows: "The enjoyment by the executive head of the force of a considerable fortune, accumulated as a result of favors granted in the performance of official duty, may well have caused demoralization of the force under his command. The distinction between such favors and direct gratuities is not one that his subordinates are likely to appreciate."

The jury further scores the police for its hostility to the investigation.

NEW TRIAL ORDERED.

Erastus Winsor Overruled and New Contempt of Acquittal.

NEW YORK, March 10.—Judgment was reversed and a new trial ordered in the case of the people against Erastus Winsor in the general term of the supreme court.

This practically affirms the position taken by Justice Barrett in granting a certificate of reasonable doubt that Judge Ingraham erred in refusing to charge the jury as to Winsor's criminal intent when he indicted the forgery for which he was indicted and of which he was found guilty in the court of oyer and terminer.

The opinions were written by Chief Justice Van Brunt, O'Brien concurring.

Justice Follett writes a dissenting opinion.

Mr. Winsor expressed himself as being overruled and thought that on the trial he would surely be acquitted.

Italian Incident Closed For the Present.

WASHINGTON, March 10.—Expressions of satisfaction having been made by the Italian government at the steps taken by the United States authorities for the apprehension of the murderers of the Italian at Walsenburg, the diplomatic incident occasioned thereby is regarded here as closed for the present at least.
