NEWS DOTS FROM IRELAND

Interesting Paragraphs Concerning the Doings of Our Friends Across the Ocean.

Gathered from All Parts of the Emerald Isle for Our Readers.

CONNAUGHT. LEINSTER.

GALWAY.
 Martin Morris, eldest son of Lord Morris, will stand at the next election as a Conservative for his native town, Tuam.

An extraordinary scene took place at the chapel of Kilmannin, county Galway, recently. Father Coyne, who has unsuccessfully appealed in person to the Propaganda at Rome in support of his objection to the transfer of his parish from the Diocese of Tuam to that of Galway, and who is backed up by a body of parishioners, gained possession of the chapel on the previous Friday night by means of a key, with a number of his adherents. The new clergyman, Father Conroy, arrived on Sunday morning with a number of his supporters. A large number of police proceeded to the place, and snowstorm to prevent violence. The occupants refusing to open the door, Father Conroy's adherents smashed it in with sledge hammers. District Inspector Tweedy removed Father Coyne from the building and prevented a collision of the two parties. Father Coyne declaring that he would have the dispute settled by a civil action against the police officer for assault.

MAYO.
 The appointment of the Very Rev. Canon Hoare, P.P., Carrick-on-Shannon, to the Bishopric of Ardgagh and Clonmacnoise (in room of the venerated Right Rev. Dr. Woodlock, who has resigned owing to falling health) is universally received with satisfaction in the Diocese. Canon Hoare is a staunch Nationalist.

At a meeting of the Drumkeeran Branch, I.N.F., the vice-president in the chair, and a large attendance of members, it was unanimously resolved to forward £10 to the trustees of the Irish Parliamentary Fund, as a first instalment in response to the urgent appeal of the Chairman of the Party. A resolution was adopted strongly condemning the action of the Redmondite members, who on Friday night's division had tried to oust the Government.

ROSCOMMON.
 A man named James Gibbons died from exposure, recently, at a place called Ballyhubert. During the evening Gibbons asked, lodging at several houses in the neighborhood, and being refused he sought shelter in a lonely portion of the road, where he was afterwards found dead.

The proprietors of the Kirkcaldy estate have sent notice, through their agent, Mr. Caledon Dolling, to several of their tenants of Lisolway, a townland near Castlerena, threatening legal proceedings unless they pay up their rent at once.

SLIGO.
 James D. Vernon has been appointed Commissioners for Oaths at Sligo. Mr. Benjamin Murrow was also appointed to the same place.

Recently, as a young man named Gallagher, from Cappagh, Coolaney, was out tracing hares in the snow, some of it got into the muzzle of his gun. On firing afterwards the barrel burst, injuring Gallagher about the head dreadfully. One of his eyeballs is injured by grains of the shot, and it is feared that the sight will be impaired.

The remains of Mrs. Burrows, widow of the late Rutledge Burrows, at Woodfield, Riverstown, were consigned to their last resting place, in Ballysumaghan Charchyard. The chief mourners were the five sons of the deceased, A. C. Burrows, Dublin; John Burrows, Agent, Bank of Ireland, Newry; Rutledge Burrows, Sub-Agent, Bank of Ireland, Ballybay; James Burrows, H. M. Customs, Leith; William Burrows, Woodfield.

QUEEN'S.
 Mr. Thomas R. White has been appointed Commissioner for taking Oaths at Mountrath.

WESTMEATH.

At the Queenstown Petty Sessions, Thomas Daly, a returned emigrant, belonging to the county Westmeath, who had landed that morning from the Cunarder Etruria, was charged with concealing 11lbs tobacco and a quantity of spirits with intent to defraud the Custom Revenue. George McDonough, examining officer of Customs, deposed to having found the articles concealed in defendant's valise; and Daniel Daly, officer of Customs, deposed that he had asked defendant if he had in his possession or luggage firearms or any goods liable to duty, and that he had answered in the negative. Daly was fined 13s. 6d., being the single value and duty, and 5s. 2d. costs, and the tobacco and spirits were forfeited.

MUNSTER.

CLARE.

At the church, Miltown Malbay, while waiting for Mass, an old man named Peter O'Loughlin, while on his knees saying his prayers, was noticed to sigh and moan and afterwards fall back into his seat. The Rev. Father Kingston, P.P., who was in the sacristy, was immediately with the dying man and administered to him the last rites of the Church. After Mass he referred to the very sudden death among his people, and recommended their prayers for the repose of his soul. Deceased was awaiting Holy Sacrifice of the Mass to receive the Holy Communion when he was suddenly taken away.

CORK.

Much satisfaction has been experienced by Cork Nationalists at the appointment of Mr. Georgeson, Union quay, and Welesley terrace, Cork, to the Commissioner of the Peace for the city. Mr. Georgeson, who is the hon. sec. of the Cork Young Men's Christian Association, is a staunch Protestant Home Ruler who has always in a liberal, but unobtrusive way rendered financial support to every National fund. He has done an immense for the improvement and development of the herring and mackerel industry on the south and west coasts, in connection with which he employs several hundred persons. Mr. Georgeson has also business in New York.

KERRY.

Much distress exists in the country districts of Kerry, and alarming statements are made of the destitution in the Unions.

The death of Mr. Dennis O'Connell, merchant, Church street, Tralee, caused very general feelings of regret among all classes in the town. The many good qualities of the deceased secured for him an extended popularity, and with his brother, Mr. M. O'Connell, Clerk of Union, and the other members of the family the greatest sympathy is expressed in their bereavement.

LIMERICK.

At a full meeting of the Limerick members of the Independent Party in the Corporation, held in the Mayor's Office, Town Hall, Alderman Reardon presiding, it was unanimously decided on the proposition of Alderman Kenna, High Sheriff, seconded by Town Councillor Gilligan, that Town Councillor Wm. M. Nolan be the candidate of the party for the Mayoralty, which has become vacant owing to the election of Mr. Bryan O'Donnell, Mayor, as city rate collector. Mr. Nolan will not be opposed.

TIPPERARY.

At Dublin, recently, Justice Johnson and a city common jury continued the hearing of an action by Mary Dwyer, of Clonreen, county Tipperary, aged 23, daughter of a laborer, against Samuel Orpenham Reall, a young man, who managed for his brother a farm of over 158 Irish acres near Cashel, to recover £500 damages for breach of promise of marriage. The plaintiff had been a general servant in the defendant's house for fifteen months. The jury found for the plaintiff for £150.

WATERFORD.

The election of Alderman for the Tower Ward in the place of the late Alderman Jos. Clamplatt took place recently. The Tower Ward has always been regarded as a Unionist stronghold, but of late years its constitution has been considerably

changed. The present election, however, cannot be taken as an indication of the comparative strength of the parties, as it was limited on local and personal grounds. The following is the result: Nelson, J.P., (Conservative), 39; J. Laffan (neutral), 39; W. R. (Conservative), 32. The result was received with applause by both Nationalists and Unionists, Mr. Ward being hissed by both parties.

ULSTER.

ANTRIM.

Meetings in Ulster in support of Mr. Morley's Land Bill are being held, and if tenant-farmers are wise they will continue the agitation until the Bill is safely through. The farmers of the North, said one of the speakers at the recent meeting, were not given to agitation. They were more inclined to grin and bear it, and this should appeal to the English people. There is, however, no reason why they should bear it. But the appeal had to be made, not to the English people, but to the House of Lords—and to impress that body, what the farmers must do is, not to grin, but to show their teeth.

ARMAUGH.

The public schools in Lurgan have been closed owing to the distress caused by the extremely cold weather, and sickness caused by bad water.

DERRY.

A fire occurred, recently, at Hall Mile, near Coleraine, by which the dwelling house of a small farmer and carter named David Parkhill, was totally destroyed, with all the furniture, clothing, &c. Four persons who were in the house escaped unhurt. The fire was caused by the explosion of a paraffin lamp. Some of the neighbors gave assistance in the endeavor to put out the fire, and succeeded in saving the adjoining buildings.

DONEGAL.

The bodies of Thomas Greer and Frank McGinley, boys, were found in the ice in the Lough, a short distance from Dunfanaghy, County Donegal. They left home in search of wild fowl. A search party broke the ice near where a cap was discovered and the two bodies were recovered.

DOWN.

As Dr. James McIlroy, J.P., of Ballycastle, was passing along Church street, Ballymoney, he slipped on the ice his leg bending under him, causing a fracture of one of the bones on the back of the leg and dislocation of the ankle. A few hours subsequently an accident also occasioned by the frost and snow, occurred to a little lad named McKeon, a grandchild of Mr. John Johnstone, rate collector, Ballymoney. The lad had been sent on a message, and when returning along the main street he slipped and fell, and one of the wheels of an empty cart, drawn by a horse passed over his body. It is understood that the injuries sustained are not likely to prove of a serious nature.

MONAGHAN.

The frost in Monaghan and neighborhood continues with unabated severity. Old residents declare that they have never experienced anything so severe. The snow which is lying in abundance on the ground is quite dry and light. The poor are suffering intensely, and M. B. Kiernan, C.T.C., and other members of the Coal Committee were engaged in collecting funds to provide fuel for them. Several rather serious ice accidents have happened. M. W. H. Swan, sub-sheriff, is confined to his room by a rather severe injury to his leg, sustained while skating on the lake at Rossmore Park. A young man named Thomas Graham sustained a fall on the ice, which resulted in serious injuries to the muscles of his shoulder.

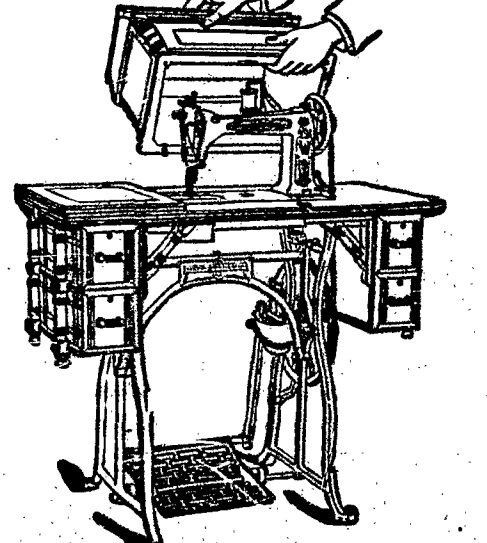
