NEWS DOTS FROM IRELAND

Interesting Paragraphs Concerning the Doings of Our Friends Across the Ocean,

Gathered from All Parts of the Emerald Isle for Our Readers.

CONNAUGHT.

GALWAY.

A largely attended public meet-
 ing of the parishioners of Dunmore
 was held in the Courthouse to urge
 the Government to open relief works
 to meet the distress that prevails in
 the parish. Very Rev. Canon
 O'Dwyer occupied the chair, and
 resolutions calling for the opening
 of reproductive public works, such
 as deepening the drainage of the
 river from Glanamaddy to Millown,
 and the building of a line of railway
 from Tuam to Dunmore and Bally-
 haunis, were unanimously adopted.

LEINSTER.

CARLOW.

We regret to announce the death
 of Mrs. Governey (mother of Mr.
 Michael Governey), which took place
 at her residence, Ballylinan. Mrs.
 Governey, who had reached a ripe
 old age, had been in feeble health
 for some time, and the event was
 not unexpected; nevertheless her
 demise has occasioned great regret
 in the district, where she had by her
 many virtues and her kindly dispo-
 sition earned the good will and esteem
 of a wide circle of friends.

DUBLIN.

During the recent 'cold snap,'
 17,480 loads of snow were removed
 from the street of Dublin. Recent
 reports state that the frost has
 almost ceased.

We called attention some time ago
 (says the Medical Press) to the re-
 sults of the Naval authorities to ac-
 cept the license of the Irish Phar-
 maceutical Society as qualification
 for the position of Dispenser in the
 Royal Navy, although the similar
 qualification from England is accept-
 ed. Lord Spencer has now informed
 a deputation from the Society that
 the disability would be removed, and
 a new Order in Council made for
 that purpose.

KILDARE.

The work of relieving the prevail-
 ing distress among the poor of Naas
 is being assiduously attended to by
 the Naas Poor Relief Committee.
 Upwards of £100 has been sub-
 scribed for the purpose of relieving
 the poor people unable to find em-
 ployment.

KILKENNY.

The Pope has appointed Most Rev.
 Dr. John O'Reilly, Bishop of Port
 Augusta, South Australia, as Arch-
 bishop of Adelaide, in succession to
 the late Most Rev. Dr. Reynolds.
 The news of the appointment was
 received by the Catholics in South
 Australia with a great deal of plea-
 sure, it being a most popular one.
 Dr. O'Reilly is a native of the city of
 Kilkenny, received his early educa-
 tion in St. Kieran's College, and
 completed his ecclesiastical studies in
 All Hallows. There he was or-
 dained, and joined the Australian
 Mission.

KING'S.

At the last meeting of the Bir-
 Board of Guardians, on the motion
 of Mr. Gallagher, seconded by Mr.
 Hogan, a resolution was adopted
 declaring the Order in Council, on
 swine fever, use less, unworkable,
 and injurious, and calling on the
 Privy Council to revoke it.

LONGFORD.

The Lord Lieutenant has appoint-
 ed Mr. Robert Vincent Maxwell, sol-
 licitor, to be Clerk of the Crown and
 Peace for the County of Longford.
 Mr. Maxwell is a member of a re-
 spectable old Longford Catholic
 family, is possessed of high legal
 acumen, and has ever been a gener-
 ous subscriber to all National move-
 ments, as well as those of a charitable
 nature.

LOUTH.

Mr. Meagher, of Drogheda, has
 been appointed to the position of
 manager of Munster and Leinster
 Bank, in Killarney, in room of Mr.
 W. Butler, who has retired, owing
 to ill-health.

The Hon. Chas. Bertram Bellew,
 Barmath Castle, Dunleer, was
 sworn in as High Sheriff of the
 County of Louth, for the ensuing
 year, and Mr. Thos. J. Byrne, of
 Rossinabla and Exchange Buildings,
 Dundalk, as Under Sheriff.

MEATH.

The revelation as to the sanitary
 condition of Kells made at the local
 inquiry held recently, by Mr. Coston,
 G.E., are certainly shocking. The

poor of the town are huddled into
 houses unfit for human habitation.
 The medical officer stated that there
 was one place where two families
 resided, a small, wretched dwelling,
 and he believed there were twenty
 or thirty people living under one
 roof. The water supply of the town
 is so bad that it has been declared
 by Sir Charles Cameron to be only
 fit for flushing sewers. The Town
 Commissioners desire to remedy
 both evils, but it was discovered
 that they have not the necessary
 borrowing powers. It would take
 £18,000 or £19,000 to accomplish the
 necessary work, and the Commis-
 sioners can borrow only £5,000.
 Under the circumstances one of the
 schemes must be dropped.

ULSTER.

ANTRIM.

The work of relieving the poor of
 Belfast is proceeding actively. It is
 estimated that about 1,000 meals
 were distributed gratuitously to the
 needy recently. The corporation
 held a special meeting to consider
 what steps should be taken to pro-
 vide work under the Council for the
 unemployed of the city, and several
 public works were decided on.

ARMAGH.

The remains of Mrs. Torney, relict
 of the late Mr. James Torney, were
 interred at the family burying-
 ground at Lisbane. The deceased
 lady belonged to one of the most
 respectable families in the district,
 and was noted for her true Christian
 piety, most kindly disposition, and a
 genuine love for alleviating the
 miseries of the poor and afflicted.

DERRY.

The Aurania, from New York, ar-
 rived at Queenstown recently. On
 the previous evening, a steerage
 passenger named Hamilton Pat-
 erson, a native of Derry, committed
 suicide by jumping overboard. He
 left a letter in the pocket of his
 coat, of which he had divested him-
 self, directed to his wife in Chicago,
 saying he was tired of life.

DONEGAL.

Hugh A. Keown, of Burtonport,
 County Donegal, assisted by Patrick
 D. McCane and Charles Boyle, has
 been awarded a testimonial for sav-
 ing James Hanlon, carpenter, at
 Burtonport Pier. It appears that
 Hanlon, in attempting to get down
 the quay, to find his boat, in the
 darkness fell into the sea from a
 height of ten feet. In his struggle
 he was carried out some distance
 from the quay. Keown jumped from
 quay into a boat, and it is stated,
 incurred considerable risk. Event-
 ually he got Hanlon safely out.
 McCane assisted in the rescue. Only
 two months since Keown and Mc-
 Cane saved the life of a sailor named
 Gallagher under, it is stated, peri-
 cular circumstances.

DOWN.

There are 41 cases of smallpox in
 hospital in Newry. It has been de-
 cided to keep the schools closed. A
 case of smallpox is also reported
 from the Boyle Union.

Michael McCavara, of Clontiffece,
 near Warrenpoint, who was sen-
 tenced to ten years' penal servitude
 for the manslaughter of a farmer
 named Patrick Morgan, of Clontif-
 feece, county Down, was released re-
 cently, by order of the Lord Lieuten-
 ant, after serving five years in
 Mountjoy Prison.

MONAGHAN.

The Rev. Matthew Macaulay,
 minister of Cahans congrega-
 tion, in the Presbytery of Monagh-
 an, died recently, at Rathfriland,
 where he had been residing for some
 time. He was an ardent and enthu-
 siastic Home Ruler, and not infre-
 quently took part in debates in the
 General Assembly when that burn-
 ing question occupied their atten-
 tion.

TYRONE.

The tenants on the estate of Mr.
 C. G. B. Kennedy, Mullenteau,
 Stewardstown, have received notices
 to the effect that they will get an
 opportunity of purchasing their
 holdings. The tenants, when made
 a similar offer some years ago, held
 a public meeting, and the majority
 of the tenants agreed to offer fifteen
 years' rent off. The offer was re-
 fused. The tenants on another
 estate of Mr. Kennedy, near the vil-
 lage of Pomeroy, have received simi-
 lar notices. No steps have yet been
 taken.

 if not eccentric, is reported as saying
 that, broadly speaking, there will be
 no pulp in the twentieth century.
 Is that to be taken as a delicate way
 of saying that he will not be here?




