Deaths and Funerals.

Jeremiah Sullivan, one of the oldest residents of the city, died at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. J. M. Quigley, 25 Gady street, Saturday afternoon, aged 95 years. Mr. Sullivan was born in County Kerry, Ireland, and came to this country about 60 years ago and settled in Rochester. He has been a resident of this city ever since. He enjoyed good health all his life until two weeks ago, when he began to fail.

Mr. Sullivan was the oldest member of the parish of the Church of the Immaculate Conception. Until five years ago Mr. Sullivan lived in the third ward on Adams street. When he settled in the third ward the nearest Catholic church was the old St. Patrick's Church at the corner of Frank and Platt streets, now St. Patrick's Cathedral. Mr. Sullivan attended St. Patrick's Church until the parish of the Immaculate Conception was organized. The first services of the parish were held in a house on Gregg street, and Mr. Sullivan was present at these services.

Mr. Sullivan leaves four children, Daniel H. Sullivan, Mrs. J. M. Quigley, and Miss Nellie A. and Emma Sullivan. The funeral took place on Tuesday morning at 8:30 o'clock at the residence of Mrs. Quigley, and at 9 o'clock at the Church of the Immaculate Conception.

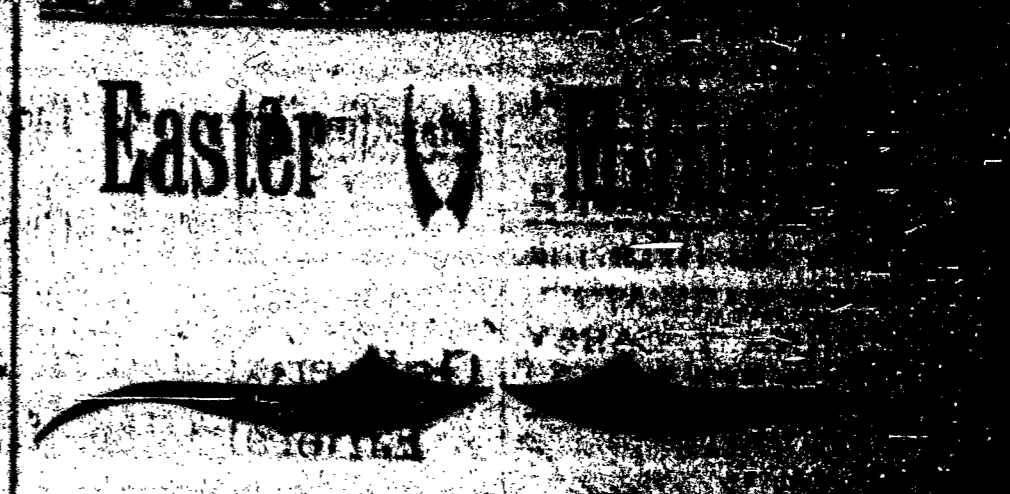
