LOCAL HOLY WEEK.

How it was Observed in the City.
Last Sunday night the retreat for men was successfully concluded at the Cathedral. During the week eleven hundred men made the retreat, approaching the Sacraments of Penance and the Holy Eucharist. At noon, Wednesday, the Cathedral Parochial School closed, not to reopen until next Tuesday. The regular services of Holy Week at the Cathedral were carried out as announced last week.

Easter Sunday, besides the ordinary early masses at 6, 7:30 and 9 a. m., there will be Pontifical Mass at 10:30 a. m., after which the Papal Benediction will be given and the services will close with the singing of the Te Deum by the congregation. The sermon on this occasion will be preached by Rev. E. J. Hanna, D. D., of St. Bernard's Seminary.

Palm Sunday.
Palm Sunday was observed Sunday in all Catholic Churches of the city. At St. Patrick's Cathedral the congregation was especially large and the services impressive. The morning service opened with the blessing of the palms by Bishop McQuaid. High mass was celebrated by Father Kiernan, assisted by Father Van Ness and Father Hughes. The passion according to St. Matthew was sung by Monsignor De Regge; Father Van Ness and Father Hughes.

COOK OPERA HOUSE.
Tornado, the big scenic production is announced as the attraction at the Cook Opera House, the first three nights of a week, with Monday and Wednesday Matinee. Packed to the doors the temperature of the house was suggestive of 'The Tornado', and probably for the first time this season, the small boy with the palm-leaf fan negotiated sale. With a rushing, roaring tornado approaching, and carrying away houses, with two vessels colliding in mid-ocean, with a green sea tossing and drowning men high on its great crests and with a shadowy copse with golden hair lying on a disjecting table, there is enough to satisfy the most ardent admirer of the realistic. In five acts, the principal characters are taken from a little Wisconsin hamlet through almost every danger of land and sea. A dark alley in Chicago and the foot of Randolph street viaduct, with sky-scraping buildings in the background are bits of scenery."

The Fast Mail will be presented at the Cook Opera House, Thursday, April 18, for 3 nights and a Saturday matinee. The scenic and mechanical effects of the Fast Mail are pronounced as simply perfections of the scenic features they are all so good that it is hard to particularize. The scene in the boiler room, of a Mississippi river steam boat, is said to be very realistic, but it is in the detailed railroad effects, where in lie the great expectations of the audience, the great locomotive rolls upon the stage, comes to a full stop; the engineer alights from his caboose through the familiar process of oiling up, then struts his iron steed, pulling after him a train of fourteen cars, perfect in every detail. Thus, a scene eclipsed by the Fast Mail itself. The Mail bags hang in full sight on its upright, the rattle of the coming train is distinctly heard; the glare of the head light illuminates the track; there is a whiz, a flash of lights as the train flies on at a terrific rate of speed. The Mail is snatched up by its hasty guardian and all that is left is the trail of sparks from the engine, these two trains are simply the perfection of mechanical skill these great effects are equalled by the beautiful picture of Niagara Falls, this scene is shown as if standing in the center of Suspension bridge with the Falls straight in front.

ACADEMY.
The attraction announced for the Academy next week, Easter week, is a spectacular presentation of the romantic, southern melodrama, "The Octoroon," written by that master of modern dramatists, Dion Boucicault. The piece is known as a comparison play to Uncle Tom's Cabin, dealing with times in the South before the war, showing the cruelties and iniquities of the slave traffic, with an interesting plot, replete with pathos, sentiment and comedy, and with some of the most startling sensations, including the burning of the steamboat Magnolia. The desperate knife duel in the cane-brake; the slave auction sale; the great detective camera scene; the planter's house at Terrebonne, and the beautiful Iphesissis, "The Death of Zoe, the Octoroon Slave."

Incidental to the plot, will be introduced the famous Magnolia colored quartette, a band of genuine darkies and pickaninies in plantation pastimes, of banjo playing, singing and waltz and back dancing.

Some magnificent stage pictures, including a Mississippi Cane Break, especially painted for this production, will be displayed and some marvelous mechanical effects worked.

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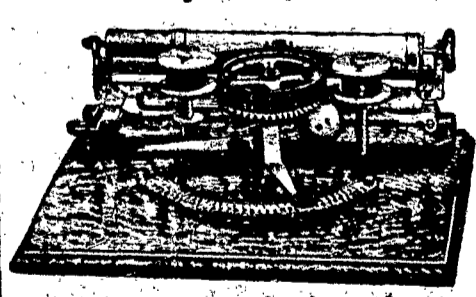

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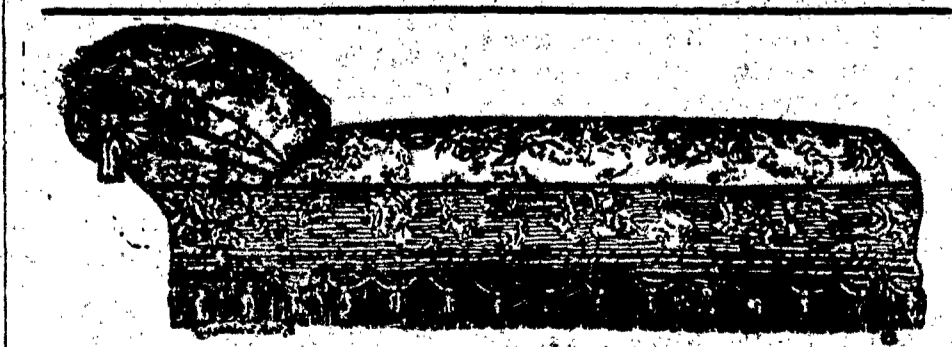
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
