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NEWS DOTS FROM IRELAND

Interesting Paragraphs Concerning the Doings of Our Friends Across the Ocean,

Gathered from All Parts of the Emerald Isle for Our Readers.

CONNAUGHT.
DUBLIN.
At the first meeting of the new
Clifden Board of Poor Law Guardians,
the undersigned gentlemen were
re-elected for the purpose of the
following officers: Henry A. Robinson,
J.P. (Tory), chairman; George E.
O'Flaherty (Tory), vice-chairman;
and William Gorham (Nationalist),
deputy vice-chairman.

A public meeting of the inhabitants
of Tralee was held in the Town
Hall, recently, for the purpose of
providing forthwith an adequate
supply of hose, together with all the
necessary appliances, and of estab-
lishing a Fire Brigade, or devising
some other effectual means of averting
a calamity in the future such as
the recent disastrous fire, whereby
Mr. Hosty's premises were consumed.
Rev. Father Curran, Adv. presided.
After some discussion it was decided
that Messrs. James McDonnell, Patrick
Murphy, William Quinn, John
A. O'Flanagan, and M. S. Walsh,
be deputed to wait on the Town
Board, for the purpose of ordering
hose, &c.

LEITRIM.
Under the Land Bill now before
Parliament it is proposed to take
away the landlord's right to pre-
emption. How this will affect the
tenant may be gathered from a case
that has recently occurred at Ballagh
—O'Meehan. A man named James
McGowan set up his farm for sale,
and it was bought for the sum of
£250. Mr. Hewson, the agent, how-
ever, wrote to say that the landlord
required the farm for himself, and
he offered the ridiculously low sum
of £60. Thus it stands at present.
The selling tenant has no remedy,
and must either accept the £60
offered by Mr. Hewson, go into court,
or continue to occupy the land him-
self.

MAYO.
The military authorities have pur-
chased from the Earl of Lucan the
fee-simple of the barracks in Castlebar,
at a sum between £3,000 and
£10,000.
Mr. John O'Grady has been ap-
pointed Gas Manager at Castlebar,
and the directors have resolved to
reduce the price of gas to 8d. per
1,000 cubic feet.
At the first meeting of the Balli-
robe Board of Guardians, Mr. A. C.
Martyr and Mr. J. O'N. Donnellan
were re-elected chairman and vice-
chairman respectively. Mr. Dooley
was elected deputy vice-chairman.

ROSCOMMON.
A respectable man named Luke
Doekery, residing at Carramore,
about 10 miles from Ballinacorney,
recently met his death from burning.
It appears that the deceased, who
was aged 75 years, was out in the
field during the day, and went into
his house in the evening. There was
no person in the house but himself.
When his wife returned in the evening
she found him lying on the fire,
severely burned. He was not quite
dead, but succumbed in a short time
afterward. It is surmised that he
was in the act of lighting his pipe
when he got a dizziness, and fell on
the fire.

SLIGO.
At a "Ding Hunt" recently, Alder-
man Francis Nelson, of Sligo, met
with a severe accident. He collided
with Mr. P. Connolly, and was thrown
from his horse, sustaining a fracture
of two ribs.
The Assistant Surveyor of the
General Post Office, Dublin, has been
recently in Sligo inspecting possible
sites for a new post-office. There are
three possible sites in Castle street
and two in Knox street. One propo-
sal is to build a new office at the
Fish Market, just facing Knox str.
No final decision can be arrived at
for some time, as the Board of Works
must first inspect and report.

WICKLOW.
A young man named Wm. Wood-
roffe, met his death by an accident
which occurred recently a short dis-
tance outside Wicklow. Woodroffe,

out on the journey homewards. The
horse of which he was in charge,
from some cause or other is presumed
to have run away. At any rate the
animal was met on the road by Mrs.
Cooper Newland, who was coming
into Wicklow, and in trying that
there was no person driving, she
brought it to a standstill. Mrs.
Newland had travelled but a short
distance further when she found
Woodroffe lying in the dyke. She
pulled him out and then discovered
that he was dead. Dr. Halpin was
sent for, and on his arrival he pro-
nounced that the man's neck had
been broken.

MUNSTER.
CORK.
An army pensioner named Fitz-
gerald, residing in Evergreen, Cork,
died suddenly, while going to work
recently.
The 9th and 10th of July are the
dates selected for the annual show
of the Cork Agricultural Society.

At Bandon Quarter Sessions there
was no criminal business, and County
Court Judge Bird was presented
with white gloves.
Some time ago, relatives of James
Frendergast, who had lived for some
time in California, and died, leaving
some property, were asked by adver-
tisement, to communicate with Mr.
Shuck, solicitor, San Francisco. Mr.
Shuck has received several let-
ters from persons bearing another
name than that of Frendergast, and he
desires to point out that these can-
not possibly be relatives of the per-
son in whom he is interested.

KERRY.
More notices having been served
on the Killarney relieving officers by
the solicitors to Lord Kenmore of
impending evictions against tenants.
The evictions that are being carried
out on the estate are effected under
Mr. Balfour's eviction-made-easy
clause.

DONEGAL.
The government have announced
that they propose to open relief
works at Glenvar. The work will

LIMERICK.
At the Limerick Quarter Sessions,
Mr. J. Mahony, of Castleconnell,
sued for damages Mr. E. H. P. Hos-
ford, Secretary to the Limerick
Fishery Conservators, for false arrest
and imprisonment, in connection
with the recent dispute about the
chairmanship of the Fishery Board.
County Judge Adams gave a decree
of forty shillings and costs against
the defendant.

TIPPERARY.
Mr. H. Dunne has been removed
on promotion as teller from the Ne-
agh branch of the National Bank to
Fermoy, and Mr. A. F. Costello is
promoted to a higher position by the
change. Mr. Costello's place will be
filled by Mr. Fleming.

WATERFORD.
One of the principal supporting the
roof of the old Presbyterian church
in Lismore came down with a sudden
crash, bringing the end ceiling and
cornices with it, crushing to atoms
every pew it came in contact with,
and breaking several gasoliers. A
lady who was just leaving the build-
ing had scarcely reached the door

when she was followed by a cloud of
dust and a crash like thunder.

ULSTER.
ANTRIM.
At a largely attended meeting of
Tory Unionist farmers, held in the
Central Hall, Belfast, under the
auspices of the Ulster Land Commit-
tee, Mr. Samuel Black, J.P., presid-
ing, a resolution was adopted ex-
pressing strong approval of the Land
Bill, and urging all political parties
to unite in efforts to pass it. A
resolution was also adopted ex-
pressing surprise and pain at Mr. Cham-
berlain's speech in opposition to the
second reading.

ARMAGH.
A meeting of the Armagh Dispen-
sary Committee was held recently,
Mr. Joseph Anderson in the chair.
With reference to the site to be
chosen, on which to build a new
dispensary, a sub-committee had de-
cided on selecting a site on The Mall,
which had been offered by Mr. Wm.
Couser at 2s. per foot. The recom-
mendation of the sub-committee was
adopted by the Dispensary Commit-
tee, and at the meeting of the Ar-
magh Guardians the latter also
adopted the recommendation by 17
votes in favor, to 12 against.

DERRY.
An inquest was held recently, be-
fore Dr. W. H. Caldwell, J.P., at
Macleary, near Coleraine, on the
body of a single woman named Ca-
therine Herald, 37 years of age, who
had died on the previous morning
from the effects of exposure to cold
and wet. From the evidence of
Jane Edmundson, a married sister of
deceased, it appeared that the two
women, with a third sister, had spent
the day at Landmore, Aglvey, where
deceased resided. In the evening
Mrs. Edmundson left, accompanied
by deceased, to catch the train for
Coleraine, but missed it. They then
decided to walk the distance (about
seven miles), but after nightfall
deceased became exhausted, and not-
withstanding the efforts of her sister,
she could not keep on her way, but
sat down on the roadside, where the
pair remained until daybreak. The
medical evidence was to the effect
that death had resulted from ex-
posure to cold and wet. Verdict ac-
cordingly.

Intelligence announcing the demise

MONAGHAN.
Barrister James Orr, County Court
Judge for Monaghan, opened the
Quarter Sessions, and addressing the
aged jury congratulated them on
the fact that there was only one case
to go before them, and that was one
in which a man named Cappagh was
charged with stealing 4s. from an-
other man named Keily, in Clones.
That was very small, indeed, and
showed that the division like the
division of Castleblayney, was free
from crime.

TYRONE.
In Liverpool, a few days ago,
detective-sergeant Allison arrested
John Thompson and Mary Wilson in
lodging-house in the neighborhood of
the docks. The warrant under which
the officer acted was issued at Beragh,
county Tyrone. The couple had
eloped, and were on their way to
America. The male prisoner was
charged with stealing £26. They
were lodged in the City Bridewell,
preparatory to being removed to
Ireland.
The retirement of Maj. Gen. Oliver O.
Howard from the active list of the
army occurred by reason of his reach-
ing the age of 64 years. Gen. Howard
made an honorable record during the
war, and his empty sleeve bears testi-
mony to the sacrifice that he made for
the Union. There is no one of the
Union generals who stands higher in
the esteem of the public than does Gen.
Howard. All will wish him many years
of life, which for him will not mean
years of idleness but years of service
fruitful of benefits to humanity.
