## Deaths and Funerals.

### DEATH OF OWEN REDMOND.

He Was a Well Known and Highly Respected Resident of Rochester.

Owen Redmond died Monday at his residence, No. 112 Spencer street, aged 81 years. He was attacked by the grip during the winter and had not fully recovered. About a week ago he caught cold and this resulted in a relapse, which caused his death.

He was a native of the county Wexford, Ireland, and was the son of a farmer. He received a good education and engaged in commercial business and afterward became interested in manufacturing industries, conducting a flour and woolen mill. He came to this country about forty years ago and settled in Rochester. Most of this time he had devoted to the invention of labor saving machines and took out a large number of patents. Among his other inventions were the following: Locomotive headlight, which was in almost universal use up to the time of the introduction of kerosene; spoke planing machine; ash lock; two or three sewing machine improvements; mowing and reaping machines; steam plows and boilers and other devices of various kinds. His last invention was of a boot and shoe lasting machine.

He had been a member of the Cathedral congregation since coming to the city and was a staunch Democrat.

The deceased was a genius of more than ordinary merit. He was an amateur musician of considerable skill and a good conversationalist.

He is survived by a wife and three children, Edward M. Edmund and Miss Lizzie Redmond.

The funeral was held from the Cathedral Thursday morning.

Lawrence Hoener, aged 77 years and 6 months, died at his home, 88 Wilder street, Wednesday morning. He is survived by a wife, Anna M. Hoener, and one son, George. The funeral took place Friday morning at 8:30 and from St. Peter and Paul's Church at 9 o'clock.

Mary Spain, aged 72 years, died Wednesday morning at the Rochester State Hospital. The funeral took place in the afternoon from the hospital and the interment was at Holy Sepulcher Cemetery.

The remains of Emma Myers, who died at St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Utica, on Tuesday, were brought to this city to the residence of Isadore Roland, 100 Evergreen street, a brother-in-law of the deceased. The funeral took place Thursday morning from 180 Evergreen street, at 8:30 o'clock, and from St. Bridget's church at 9 o'clock.

Henry William, infant son of Jacob and Louise Dentinger, died Thursday morning at the family residence, No. 64 Lime street, aged 4 years and 10 days. The funeral was held from the house at 2:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon and from St. Peter and Paul's Church at 8 o'clock.

Mrs. Eugene Savard, nee Ida Gayott, died at the family residence, No. 85 Hudson avenue, at half-past 5 o'clock Tuesday morning, aged 32 years. Aside from her husband and one daughter, she is survived by one sister, Mrs. David O'Brien, and one brother, Alfred Guyott. The funeral was held from the house at 8:45 o'clock and from Our Lady of Victory church at 9 o'clock Thursday morning.

The bearers were Louis C. Langie, Eugene Sackett, Frank Renaud, Ottmar A. Nobel, William A. Gendreau, Charles A. Hudon. Rev. A. Notrebaert said the requiem mass. A double quartette from the Polyhymnians assisted the choir, and as the funeral was leaving the church sang Cardinal Newman's, "Lead Kindly Light."

The funeral of Dominick Kearns who was so brutally slain by A. P. A. Oatfield, was held from the house at 8:30 o'clock Wednesday morning, and from Immaculate Conception church at 9 o'clock.

The funeral of Mrs. William P. Farrell took place from the family residence, No. 70 Persalls avenue, at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning, and at 9:30 o'clock from Corpus Christi church.

On Friday morning the 16th inst. at 8 o'clock, at the home of her mother, 24 William street, occurred the death of Louisa M. Dunn, aged 20 years. Miss Dunn graduated with the highest honors from the Free Academy in 1893, and from the New York state training class in 1894. Since that time her health has gradually failed. During the past two years her intense sufferings have been known to no one except herself; there was never a murmur from her lips, but always met every one with a smile. She leaves besides her mother to mourn her sad loss, four sisters, Mrs. Lawrence Karger, of Scottsville, Misses Mary, Oelia and Lizzie, of this city, and two brothers, Frank, of Scottsville, and John, of Dankirk, who have the sympathy of all in their sad affliction.
