

## CITY PARISH NEWS

What is Going on in the Various Parishes.

Pentecost Services at the Cathedral.

At St. Patrick's Cathedral Sunday morning the services were of a more impressive nature than usual, it being Pentecost Sunday. Solemn high mass was celebrated. Rev. James P. Kiernan was the celebrant, assisted by Rev. Arthur Hughes as Deacon of the mass and Rev. Mr. Corwin as Sub-Deacon. The sermon, which was on the gospel of the day, was preached by Bishop McQuaid.

Bishop McQuaid at 9 a. m. to-day ordained to the holy priesthood John Brophy, John Cronin and Philip Neville. The ceremony was an impressive one and was witnessed by a large number of persons. After the ceremony the newly made priests imparted their blessing to their friends.

The Central Board of Catholic Reading Circles will meet in annual session at 4 p. m. Sunday, June 16th.

About 115 children are now preparing their first confession which will be heard next week.

Instructions for the first communion class will be continued on Monday and Thursday afternoons and evenings until June 16th, when the Sacrament of Confirmation will be administered by the Rt. Rev. Bishop. On that morning the children will again receive Holy Communion and the confirmation will take place at 4 p. m. Children are requested to secure individual sponsors and places will be reserved for said sponsors in the side aisles of the Cathedral on the afternoon of the ceremony.

The work of the scholastic year 1894-1895 is fast drawing to a close. The regents examinations will be held June 10-14. Large numbers of children from the parochial grammar schools of the city and vicinity will assemble at the Cathedral school to pass the preliminary regent examinations. Many will also try the examinations in U. S. History, and New York History. The grade examinations begin the following Monday morning, June 17th, the examinations in United States History in the seventh and eighth grades will be held on Wednesday, June 14th.

The closing exercises of the school will be held on Thursday evening, June 17th. A rehearsal will be given in the forenoon for the benefit of the school children and in the evening admission will be by ticket. Tickets will be given to the parents of the graduates, and others will pay an admission of 25 cents.

Competition in Christian Doctrine and Bible History for the month ending May 15th shows the following: Ninth Grade 4 to 1 in favor of the girls. Eighth Grade, 4 to 4. Seventh Grade, 0 to 0. Sixth Grade, 2 to 1, in favor of the boys.

Holy Rosary.

There were two masses last Sunday. The first was at 7:30 a. m. and a large number received communion. There was high mass at 9 a. m. and the choir with Mrs. Martin Hennessy at the organ sang the mass in charming manner.

Children Escorted to Holy Family Church by Knights of St. John.

Holy communion was administered for the first time to one hundred and twenty candidates Sunday morning at Holy Family Church. The members of the communion class were escorted from the school, where they had formed in procession, by the Knights of St. John.

Next Sunday Bishop McQuaid will administer the sacrament of confirmation to the communicants of last Sunday.

Forty Hours Devotion at Corpus Christi.

The "Forty Hours Devotion" opened at the 10 o'clock mass at Corpus Christi Church Sunday last, and was closed on Wednesday morning with solemn high mass. Rev. Father Hickey preached Monday evening on the valuation of the soul. Many beautiful illustrations were brought forth to show the great value of the soul, and what care should be taken to keep the soul in the state of purity at all times, and to take advantage of the extraordinary time given by God to all to approach the Sacraments. In conclusion the Rev. Father spoke of the man who once said "If I had two souls I would give one to God and the other to Caesar, but as I have but one soul I will give that to God." A large number of priests were in attendance each evening bearing Confession, so that every one was

able to gain the benefit of the Forty Hours. The Devotion closed Wednesday evening at 8:30.

Devotions in honor of the Sacred Heart of Jesus was held at 7:45 Friday evening. Confession was heard on Thursday afternoon and evening.

Closing of May devotion was celebrated at Corpus Christi Church in a manner quite suitable to the occasion at 7:30 Friday. 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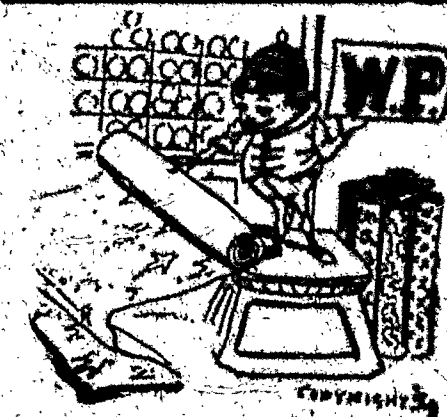
