NEWS DOTS FROM IRELAND

Interesting Paragraphs Concerning the Doings of Our Friends Across the Ocean,

Gathered from All Parts of the Emerald Isle for Our Readers.

CONNAUGHT. LEINSTER.

GALWAY.
Dr. Moffett, President of Queen's College Galway, arrived in town recently from London, where he had just made a successful fight for the maintenance of the college. The students organized a demonstration in his honor. They had a torchlight procession, which met him on his arrival at the terminus and marched through the streets to the college. On reaching the door of his residence Dr. Moffett stood up in the open carriage to address the gathering. In the course of his speech he said he did not fight for a personal matter. He fought for the interest of the Professors of all the Queen's Colleges as well as his own. In that fight he had some good kind friends, and amongst them were three members of the Government—the Lord Chancellor in England, the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and the Chief Secretary, Mr. Morley. After speaking to the students for about twenty minutes, the President passed into his house, and from that to the interior of the college, where an address of congratulation was presented by the professors.

LEITRIM.
At the last meeting of the Carrick-on-Shannon Board of Guardians, the Rev. P. Clarke, Ballinaglera, wrote asking that the question of relief works for that locality be again pressed on the attention of Mr. John Morley. On the motion of the chairman the following resolution was unanimously agreed to:—"This Board again call on Mr. Morley to at once take steps, to give employment to the poor of Ballinaglera and surrounding districts."

MAYO.
The Castlebar papers announce that Master James Nolan has inherited extensive properties in the counties Dublin and Meath, from his uncle, the late John Nolan Whelan, J.P., son of the late John Nolan, J.P., Kibballyhoo Park, county Carlow. He is to take the name of Whelan. The fortunate youth is a grandson of the late Mr. Ignatius Kelly, Crown Solicitor for Mayo, and a nephew to Mr. Malachy Kelly, the present Crown Solicitor, and to Mr. Patrick Kelly, solicitor, Castlebar.

In Westport, Patrick Loudon, aged 20 years, son of Mr. John J. Loudon, Kildangan House, was suddenly seized with homicidal mania and attacked his uncle with a knife. The weapon was, however, wrenched from him, and he then seized a razor and ran toward his own home, where he cut the throat of his eleven year old sister, and concluded by cutting his own throat. His sister died subsequently. The unhappy author of her death, at last accounts, was still living. He had been for a short while in America, having come here against his father's expressed wishes. Since his return to Ireland, his mother stated that she considered he was very peculiar, so much so that a few days before the tragedy she told one of her other sons that one of them ought to watch him constantly. At the inquest of the dead child, a verdict was returned that death was caused by the wound inflicted on the deceased by Patrick Loudon, and that at the time that he inflicted the wound he was of unsound mind.

ROSCOMMON.
A few days ago, the Bishop of Elphin, Right Rev. Dr. Clancy, was being driven on an outside car to the Broadstone railway station, Dublin, en route for Sligo, when a wheel of the vehicle broke, and he and the driver were capsized into the road. Both were severely cut and bruised.

Mr. Henry Boyers, of Knox street, Sligo, has been declared contractor for medicines in the Dromore West Union.

WICKLOW.
Mr. Joseph Abbott, C.E., Government Arbitrator, sat at the Four Courts, Dublin, and continued the arbitration with reference to 1,500 acres of land which the War Department proposes to take for the purpose of a rifle range and camp at Kilibride, County Wicklow. Mr. Cherry appeared as counsel for Mr. Richard Eustace, holding 540 acres of mountain land, the rent of which was £30 (reduced by Mr. Fletcher Moore, the landlord, to £20), which had been taken, the War Office only offering £5 compensation. Mr. Shannon appeared for Mr. James McGrath, a grazing tenant of 243 acres. Mr. Bourke, for the War Department, contended that these tenants were entitled only to the value of the grass; they were merely graziers, and not entitled to compensation under the Act.

MUNSTER.
CLARE.
The Clare Artillery Militia, who are to undergo their annual training at Dover, England, this year, arrived at the Admiralty Pier, Dover, in the steamship Kenmare. One of the corps, a gunner named John McInerney, belonging to Killrush, died on voyage. The Dover coroner held an inquest respecting the death of McInerney, and from the evidence of his company sergeant it appears that the deceased was under the influence of liquor when he went aboard, and when the steamer was only a few hours out he fell down in a fit and died. The doctor in charge of the troops was of the opinion that death was due to convulsions, induced by excessive use of alcohol, and the jury returned a verdict accordingly.

CORK.
John Thompson, arrested at Cork on suspicion of being the man Blatch, who is wanted in connection with the murder of a Colchester tradesman, proved that he was not Blatch, and was discharged.

KERRY.
A melancholy accident occurred to a sailor named Duncan, hailing from Manchester, and employed on a steamer connected with the fishing fleet in Valentia harbor. Duncan was in the act of descending through the hold of the steamer and thought the ladder was there, but unfortunately it had been removed out of its place, and the poor fellow was precipitated a depth of several feet. He was subsequently removed to the hospital in Valentia and was examined by Dr. Mannix and Dr. Trant, who found that he was internally injured and performed an operation upon him. They consider his case a hopeless one.

LIMERICK.
An emergency man who acted as caretaker of Castle town, Rathkeale, was recently fired at and dangerously wounded while thatching the roof of a dwelling-house. The man, whose depositions have been taken, states that on the previous evening, a party of disguised men visited his house and threatened him with personal violence. Several arrests have been made.

TIPPERARY.
Patrick Singleton, the aged caretaker of the ancient Castle of Carrick-on-Suir, attempted to commit suicide recently by cutting his throat. He only severed the windpipe, however, and did not reach the main arteries. When Constable McGown was called in he found him in a bad state. The constable had Dr. Wall sent for, and when the latter arrived he stitched and dressed the wound. The man had lost a large quantity of blood, but after the doctor's treatment the bleeding was not so much; but little hope is entertained of his recovery, as he is hardly able to eat anything, and it is feared he will eventually die from exhaustion. Singleton suffered from some internal complaint, and it is stated that the torture consequent on it caused insanity. He is an army pensioner, having a shilling a day, and served in the Crimean War. He is about 64 years of age, is married, and has a son in America.

WESTMEATH.
The Most Rev. Dr. Hoarè, Bishop of Ardagh and Clannacnoise, officiated for the first time at the Convent of Mercy, Moate. The young lady who received the religious habit at the hands of the Bishop, on the occasion, was Miss Lizzie Bardou (called in religion Sister M. Columba Joseph), youngest daughter of Mr. Edward Bardou, Carrollstown, county Westmeath.

WEXFORD.
At the New Ross Quarter Sessions, there was but one indictment to go before the Grand Jury; and as the bills in the case were thrown out, there was no criminal business before the court.

WATERFORD.
A sum of £5,200 has been drawn by the Waterford Guardians, from the public funds, on account of the loan for the water-works. This leaves a sum of £1,800 still available for the completion of the works, which is now only a matter of a few months.

The Examiners into Proofs and Compliance with Standing Orders of Parliament, met at Westminster recently. Among the Bills which passed this stage, and which were ordered to be reported were the Waterford and Limerick Railway Bill, which empowers the raising of money by new consolidated stock, and to change the name of the Company to the "Irish Great Western Railway Company."

ULSTER.
ANTRIM.
A trial trip of a new dining car intended for use on the Great Northern Railway took place recently. The car, which is 50 feet long, is the first of its kind to be used on Irish railways. It is divided into two saloons—first and second class—and has a well-fitted kitchen, steward's pantries, etc. The car is a very creditable piece of Irish workmanship, and all the arrangements are of a most satisfactory character. It will run on the 7 a. m. up express from Belfast, and thence 5.30 p. m. train from Dublin.

ARMAGH.
Peter O'Hare, an employe of the Reesbrook Spinning Mills, received a severe injury to his hand, which was literally cut in two by the machinery at which he was working. The unfortunate young man was conveyed off the mill premises, and his injuries having been bandaged, he was taken to Rathfriland Hill Hospital. The occurrence appears to have been accidental.

DERRY.
Francis Hassan and Patrick Elver, belonging to Feeney, were brought to Derry Prison, arrested in connection with an alleged shooting affray. Hassan, it appears, on the previous day, met William and Patrick Elver on the road. High words passed, and Hassan fired a shot which lodged in William Elver's breast. The police, hearing of the occurrence, arrested Hassan, who attempted to stab his captors with a pitchfork, and afterward tried to get a gun, but the police drew their revolvers. The injured man's deposition was taken before Mr. W. C. Stevenson, J.P. The accused was remanded. Patk. Elver was subsequently arrested on a charge of aiding and abetting the attack on his brother.

MONAGHAN.
The solemn religious profession of Miss Margaret Mary O'Reilly, daughter of Thomas S. O'Reilly, Esq., M. D., Cavan, took place in the Convent of St. Louis, Monaghan. The superb chapel of the convent was specially adorned for the occasion, and the ceremonies were of the most solemn and impressive kind. Miss O'Reilly will be known in religious life as Sister Mary Josephine. The ceremony was performed by the Most Dr. Owens, Bishop of Clogher, who was assisted by the Rev. P. McDonnell, Adm., Monaghan, and the Rev. Jas. Gallagher. The Bishop delivered a beautiful discourse on the occasion.

TYRONE.
In Cookstown, recently, a young man named William Lyons, a shoemaker, attempted to commit suicide by shooting himself through the mouth with a revolver, the bullet lodging in the back of his throat. The police found him lying in a ditch, bleeding from the mouth. He was able to tell the police that he had a paper in his pocket which would explain. On it was written in pencil, in struggling characters: "This is all my own fault, not blaming anyone for it. This is the death had to become of me. Please pay Mr. R. Charles what I am due him, and Fair and Harrison. God bless you all." He was taken to the Infirmary, close by, on a shutter; but it was found impossible to get at the bullet; and he died the next day, from collapse.

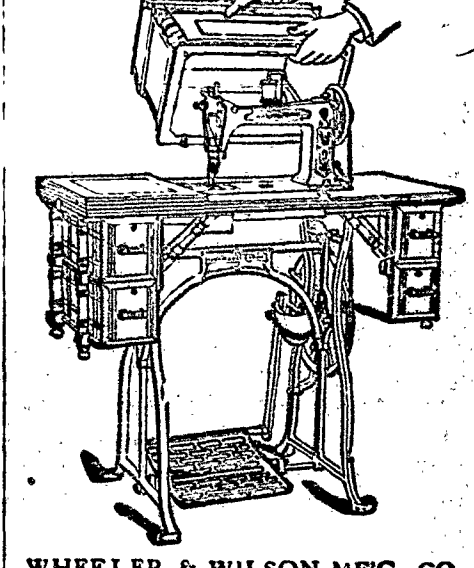
