His ideas are up to date, and the kind that tell in the final presentation. Much of the success of "Captain Jack" can safely be attributed to his care and watchfulness. But by no means let us forget the characters themselves. "No man can get blood for a stone." Neither can any manager, however proficient, gain good results from amateurs where qualifications are lacking. By proper training the good points are brought forth, and in the case of "Captain Jack" the participants were all endowed with certain qualities that went to make up one of the finest amateur performances ever seen on the Lyceum stage. The Auburn Cadets orchestra furnished excellent music during the evening. The proceeds will be donated to the St. Vincent de Paul society for the poor, and from the crowded house certainly a goodly sum was netted. A CATHOLIC PILGRIMAGE.

Pious Americans to Visit the Noted Shrines of Europe.

Inspired by the words of the holy father, spoken at our audience in Rome last August to Father Forde, of our order, the director of the first pilgrimage—in which he bade him return again next year—with "more of these good Americans," and encouraged by the number of inquiries received during the winter by those who so successfully conducted the first pilgrimage—the Fathers of Mercy, with the approval of the archbishop of New York, and Mgr. Satali, the papal delegate at Washington, have undertaken the direction of the second pilgrimage, which it is now proposed to make an annual event, to be known as the American national pilgrimage. The pilgrimage will be accompanied by the Very Rev. Victor Salati, provincial of the order, and Rev. William Smith, S. F. M., as directors, and will visit Rome (where the pilgrims will again be received in personal audience by the pope) and four of the most famous shrines of Europe, Padua, (this year being the 700th anniversary of St. Anthony's birth); Loreto with its holy house; Lourdes, the objective point of last year's pilgrimage, and through the good offices of those who preceded us, the pilgrims of this year will be allowed to remain in Lourdes for the great national pilgrimage, a night that all desire to behold and at which all marvel; and last, but not least, Fatsy in Montini, the shrine of the Sacred Heart.

Arrangements have been made as before with Messrs. Thomas Cook & Son, who undertake the entire business management and responsibility of the tour, under the direction and supervision of Francis H. Throop, who, accompanied by Mr. Throop as last year, will have charge of all business arrangements.

Cost of membership, steamship, railroad, hotel and all other necessary traveling expenses, from New York back to New York, \$400; including London and Ireland, returning from Queenstown, September, 6, \$455.

Those who may desire to leave at an earlier date or by some other line of steamers, or join the party at some point on the journey rather than Rome, may have the rate adjusted to suit the requirements of each individual by application to Messrs. Thomas Cook & Son. No cards will be issued for the papal audience except to members of the pilgrimage.

As arrangements at present are made for the accommodation of a limited number, it is necessary that those desiring to secure membership and steamship berths should either call on or send their \$25 deposit to Messrs. Thomas Cook & Son, as soon as possible, as choice of steamship accommodation is allotted in the order that applications are received.

NEWS FROM THE SUPREME COUNCIL.

We have received the quarterly bulletin of the Supreme Council of the C. M. B. A. D. A. A fine bell rang out of the Supreme Spiritual Adviser, Rt. Rev. P. A. Ludden, of Syracuse, N. Y., reported on the first part, and the balance of the book contains a large amount of information useful to all members. Below we give part of the same.

Since the issuance of the last Bulletin, Sup. First Vice President Theodore has organized a German Council in Syracuse. Dr. J. Korman of Rochester, has added another to the list by placing a council in St. Mary's parish. In our next, we hope to be able to announce the inauguration of many more in that city.

The Supreme President has installed Councils in Schenectady, N. J., Youngstown, Ohio, Scottsdale and McKeesport, Pa., and one at Wallkill, N. Y.

The Association has many deputies, but some are deputies in name only. This cannot be applied to Messrs. Tracy and Korman, who are continuously laboring to advance the Association in their localities.

As the June assessment shows the books for the year, the Councils are requested to be sharply on time with the assessment returns. The Supreme Recorder will balance the books last week in June and as all the Councils are desirous of making a good showing on the yearly report, they are requested not to be behind him with returns.
