Shrines of Europe.

Inspired by the words of the holy father, spoken at our audience in Rome last August to Father Porcile, of our order, the director of the first pilgrimage—in which he bade him return again next year-with more of these good Americans, " and oncouraged by the number of inquiries received during the winter by those who so successfully conducted the first pilgrimage of the archbishop of New York, and Mgr. Satolli, the papel delegate at Warhington, have undertaken the direction of the second American national pilgrimage. The pilgrimage will be accompanied by the Very Rev.
