What's Going on in the Various Parishes.

CATHEDRAL

Confirmation will be given tomorrow afternoon.

Rev. J. G. Van Ness celebrated the 7:30 a. m. mass last Sunday. Owing to the illness of Bishop McQuaid, the confirmation exercises at St. Patrick's Cathedral, which had been announced for last Sunday, were postponed until next Sunday.

The bishop's illness while not serious was sufficiently so to oblige him to remain in quiet Sunday. The confirmation class, which has been under the instruction of Rev. Father Kiernan during the past month, is a very large one and it was thought that the fatigue incident to confirming so large a number might render the Bishop more seriously ill.

ST. MARY'S

To-morrow morning at the 8:30 mass a large class of children will receive their first Holy communion. At the 10:30 mass the children will occupy places inside the sanctuary and will after mass receive their communion cards and blessed scapulars. They will also renew their baptismal vows.

Rev. J. P. Stewart celebrated the high mass last Sunday and he took occasion to say that nearly four thousand dollars had been subscribed toward the fund to pay for the improvements and repairs on the parochial property. He also read a circular which was distributed to the congregation stating that he took that means of reaching all members of St. Mary's who have not been personally visited by the priest's taking the census.

A grand summer festival will be held in the school hall beginning July 29th and ending August 5th. A big electric search light will illuminate the surrounding grounds while ten electric fans will make those who attend fancy they have made a flying trip to Greenland. There will be a contest for a gold watch between E. H. Colbert and George Miller of the fire department. There will be other contests for a diamond ring and other valuable articles. Besides these there will be \$350 in prizes distributed between the holders of the lucky coupons on the admission tickets.

The interior of the church is being re-decorated.

CELEBRATED HIS FIRST MASS

Rev. William C. Reilly Officiates at Immaculate Conception Church.

Rev. William C. Reilly, son of William A. Reilly, a well known business man of this city, was ordained a priest in Brooklyn on Thursday, and Sunday he celebrated mass for the first time at the Church of the Immaculate Conception parish on Plymouth avenue. The young priest's family are members of Immaculate Conception parish and his parents and brothers and sisters, as well as a large number of personal friends from this city and Auburn, were present at the service.

The deacon of the mass was Rev. Father Gleason, assistant pastor of Immaculate Conception parish; the sub-deacon was Rev. D. W. Gommeringer, of St. Bernard's Theological Seminary; first master of ceremonies was John J. Breenahan, of Auburn, a theological student in St. Bernard's; the second master of ceremonies was S. V. McPadden, also a student at St. Bernard's. The acolytes were M. C. J. Wall, and J. W. Kelly. Very Rev. James F. O'Hara, rector of Immaculate Conception parish, was within the sanctuary during the service.

During the mass James A. Hennessey, of Auburn, a personal friend of Father Reilly, sang as an offertory solo the beautiful hymn "O Salutaris."

Rev. Reilly graduated in the classics at the Niagara University and finished his theological studies at St. John's Seminary in Brooklyn. He finished in both institutions with high honors. He will be attached to the Brooklyn Diocese under Bishop McDonnell, who is now in Rome, though it has not yet been determined just where Father Reilly will be located.

Rev. Father Neville, who was ordained a few days ago sang high mass at Victor Sunday. During the mass Rev. Dr. Breen, of St. Bernard's Seminary, preached a sermon, on the dignity of the priesthood.
