CONFIRMED A LARGE CLASS.

Bishop McQuaid administers the Sacrament to 182 Children and Adults at the Cathedral.

At St. Patrick's Cathedral Sunday afternoon Bishop McQuaid administered confirmation to a class of 182 boys, girls and adults. The ceremonies were of an impressive character. A number of priests were in vestments and took part in the services. The Bishop was attended by Rev. E. J. Hanna and Rev. Father Brophy as assistant priests. The master of ceremonies was Very Rev. Mgr. De Regge, and assistant master of ceremonies, Rev. James P. Kieran.

Previous to administering confirmation the Bishop addressed the class on the dignity of the sacrament they were about to receive, and admonished them of the duties its reception would involve. During the service the choir and the students of St. Andrew's Seminary sang the "Veni Creator" and other hymns.

At the close of the ceremony the Bishop spoke at some length on "Confirmation" and the graces to be derived by the worthy recipient.
