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# NEWS DOTS FROM IRELAND

## Interesting Paragraphs Concerning the Doings of Our Friends Across the Ocean,

### Gathered from All Parts of the Emerald Isle for Our Readers.

#### CONNAUGHT. LEINSTER.

**GALWAY.**  
The announcement of the death of Mr. Francis Nolan, Q.C., will be received with feelings of profound regret. Mr. Nolan was a member of the Connaught Circuit, on which he enjoyed a good practice. He was generally regarded as a capable and sound lawyer, and was much respected by his professional colleagues. Outside of the law courts he was but little known, for he was a man of unobtrusive character, and seldom mixed in society. He was a brother of Colonel Nolan, M.P., who was called to the Bar in 1863, "took silk" in 1882, and was elected a Bencher of the King's Inns in 1892.

**LEITRIM.**  
A few days ago, a railway train, passing on the Midland line from Carrick-on-Shannon to Boyle, ran into a flock of sheep belonging to Mr. Mark McDermott, which happened to be trespassing on the railway, and nine of them were killed and eight maimed so badly that all were subsequently sold to a man from Elphin for 24 lbs.

**MAYO.**  
The Lord Lieutenant has intimated to Rev. Mother Bernard his intention to open the great Exhibition of Irish Industries, at Foxford, in September next. The presence of Lord Houghton, who has always taken a kindly interest in the meritorious work of the good Nuns, will add much eclat to the exhibition and make its success doubly assured.

**ROSCOMMON.**  
The Four Roads Races are expected to come off some time during the present month.  
The Suck Drainage Board have decided to appoint an Inspector for the whole length of the river at a salary of £75 per year. Owing to the works having been discontinued along the river, the salary of the secretary was reduced from £125 to £50 per year.  
A man named Thomas Hoare, from Long Walk, has threatened to take an action against the Roscommon Board of Guardians for £500, if they decline to settle his offer for £100, for illegal arrest and imprisonment under the Sanitary Act. The Guardians took no notice of the letter which contained the threat.

**SLIGO.**  
Mr. E. Foley, has sold the well-known Bridge House, Sligo, to the Belfast Banking Company, at a little over £2,000. It is understood that the purchase is on behalf of a syndicate. The price Mr. Foley has received is almost as much as he paid for the house, together with the Lough Gill Brewery and the property attached, not two years ago.

**LOUTH.**  
Mr. George Donaldson, for many years stationmaster on the Great Northern line, at Dundalk, has been transferred to a position in the service of the Company, at Dublin.

**WEXFORD.**  
We announce with regret the death of Mr. John Foley, of Ballyherogue, eldest son of late David Foley, of "Foley's Fort" fame. The deceased was struck down with slight paralysis of the brain about two weeks ago, and gradually growing worse he expired recently. He was interred in Ballyherogue cemetery, the funeral cortege being very large and respectable.

**QUEEN'S.**  
The dedicating of the new Church of the Most Holy Rosary, at Abbey-leix, was performed by the Coadjutor Bishop of Kildare and Leighlin Most Rev. Dr. Comerford.

**WESTMEATH.**  
The licensed premises of Mr. James Moughty, of Ballinacraggy, Mullingar, as well as the post office and telegraph offices, were consumed by fire recently. Three shop assistants who slept in the house had a narrow escape with their lives. The origin of the fire is unknown.

**WICKLOW.**  
Mr. E. P. O'Kelly, M.P., has entered into partnership with Mr. T. B. Doyle, of Balinglass, in the auctioneering branch of his business. Mr. O'Kelly's business as an auctioneer has been most extensive and successful; and with the co-operation of Mr. Doyle it may be anticipated that the engagements of the new firm will be even more numerous.

**MUNSTER.**  
**CLARE.**  
In the Queen's Bench Court, Dublin, before Justice Johnston, Justice Holmes, and Justice Gibson, Mr. J. Fitzgerald Murphy (instructed by Mr. D. R. Hilliard, Kilrush), applied, on behalf of the defendant, in the case of Browne v. O'Brien, for an order changing the venue from the city of Dublin to the city of Limerick, or of county Clare. The action is brought for damages for breach of promise of marriage, and for the maintenance of the plaintiff's child, of which she alleged the defendant was the father. The defendant denied the alleged promise, and also that he was the father of the child. Both parties reside in Kilrush. The plaintiff consented to the venue being changed to the city of Limerick, and the Court made an order accordingly.

**CORK.**  
A fatal accident occurred recently at Dromabane, near Mallow, by which a farmer named William Kelly, aged about 60 years, lost his life. The unfortunate man, with Timothy Sullivan, of Glountane, was endeavoring, with the aid of a red-hot iron, to extract the nipple from an old gun, when the heat of the iron exploded a charge in the gun which had escaped their notice, and Kelly was killed instantly. He leaves a widow and several children.

**KERRY.**  
A sad drowning accident took place at Waterville, recently, when a boy, aged 12 years, lost his life. It appears that deceased, James Leary, son of one of the Waterville lake fishermen, went fishing at a place called Carrigroe, on the northern shore of the connecting channel of the Waterville lake and river. He was accompanied by a younger boy, aged about 9 years, named Shea. The deceased in fishing off the rock either overbalanced himself or slipped and fell into the deep water, and was drowned before the alarm given by the younger boy could bring assistance. The body was recovered, by grappling, the same afternoon.

**TIPPERARY.**  
A man named Hanrahan, aged 77, residing near Mullinahone, attempted to commit suicide by cutting his throat. The wounds, though serious were not fatal.

**WATERFORD.**  
At Dungarvan, Mr. John McGrath, pawnbroker, St. Mary street, was arrested and remanded, recently charged with having set fire to the premises of Mr. P. McKenna, a resident of the town.  
Master Richard Hugh O'Neill, son of Mr. Thomas J. O'Neill, Post Office, Waterford, has secured first place in the examination recently held at the Post Office, for admission to qualify for the positions of sorting

clerks and telegraphists at Waterford. He was the youngest of the nine who submitted themselves for examination, and was taught by Mr. W. Foley at the Ferrybank National School, to whose training and assiduity the lad's success is due. Master O'Neill had only recently attained his thirteenth year.

**LIMERICK.**  
The City High Sheriff of Limerick, Alderman P. Kenna, has given notice of motion to increase the salary of the Town Clerk, Mr. Robert McDonnell, J.P. Outside of the emoluments of the office, the salary of the Town Clerk is a poor one, having been materially reduced some time back, on the appointment of Mr. A. Killeen to the office of Assistant Town clerk.

**ULSTER.**  
**ANTRIM.**  
A serious burning occurred recently in the townland of Lislek, about five miles from Ballymoney, whereby the Lislek Flax Scutching and Saw Mills, the property of Mr. James Nevin, were destroyed, together with the machinery and contents, consisting of a quantity of rag-tow and Indian corn. The burning is believed to be malicious, and the owner intends applying for compensation at the next presentment sessions. The premises were not covered by insurance.

**ARMAGH.**  
A serious fire broke out, recently, in the hardware and grocery stores of Mr. Lawrence Murphy, William street, Lurgan. The fire brigade turned out quickly; but, owing to some misapprehension, proceeded to Queen street, only to find that there was no fire in that part of the town, when they were informed where the fire was. Having arrived on the scene, they laid on the hose, but, owing to the delay caused, were unable to get the flames under control, and the stores were completely burned down.

**DERRY.**  
A public meeting of farmers and others was held in the Town Hall, Coleraine, to consider Mr. Russell's proposed amendments to the pending Land Bill, and advise members of Parliament and farmers' delegates of the views thereon of the farmers of Coleraine district. Resolutions in favor of the original Bill were unanimously adopted; and T. W. Russell was roundly denounced as an enemy to the cause of real land reform.

**DONEGAL.**  
Mr. Patrick McGinley, Breenagh, Letterkenny, has been appointed to the Commission of the Peace, for the county of Donegal.

**DOWN.**  
Mr. John J. McAreevey, Courtenay Hill, Newry, has been appointed to the Commission of the Peace for the county Down.

**MONAGHAN.**  
The Dublin Gazette announces officially that the Right Honorable, the Earl of Dartrey, Lieutenant of the county Monaghan, has appointed Whitney Upthorpe Moutrey, Esq., of Fort Singleton, Emyvale, to be a deputy-lieutenant for said county. That announcement ought, at least, to be a drop of comfort for the Tory abolitionists, who have been gnashing their teeth, of late, over the appointment by the Lord Chancellor, of a few Nationalists, to be mere J.P.'s.

**TYRONE.**  
At the last meeting of the Dunganon Board of Guardians, the relieving Officer reported the case of a woman named Sally Gillis, or Anketell, who had been removed to the Union Hospital in a dying condition on the previous day, and had died shortly after admission. She had been in the receipt of one shilling per week, out-door relief, for the last six years, and she also begged through the town. She had lived in a most miserable condition in a small house in Barr's Lane, Dunganon, and at the last petty sessions a decree for possession had been obtained against her, by the owner, for non-payment of six months' rent. She had repeatedly refused to go into the workhouse, but the relieving Officer, hearing of her condition, brought the ambulance wagon and had her removed. On her departure the police took possession of the house, and discovered the sum of £38 4s. 10d. in silver and copper, stowed away in rags and old tins. The Guardians decided to claim a refund of the money paid to the woman in out-door relief.

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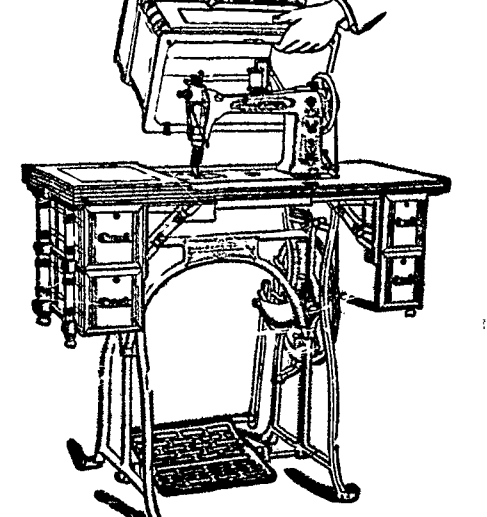
