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# NEWS DOTS FROM IRELAND

## Interesting Paragraphs Concerning the Doings of Our Friends Across the Ocean,

### Gathered from All Parts of the Emerald Isle for Our Readers.

**CONNAUGHT. LEINSTER.**

**GALWAY.**  
It is stated that from thirty to forty ejection processes will be applied for, on behalf of the Marquis of Clanricarde at the impending Quarter Sessions for the Court division. These cases vary from the generality of those in which so many eviction campaigns have already been indulged, inasmuch as they affect a higher class of tenants. The operations of the "howlar brigade" have hitherto been directed, with some exceptions, to the humbler, and, therefore, the most helpless and defenceless of the holders of land on this notorious property, but now the blow is to be struck at the larger farmers.

**LEITRIM.**  
Some months ago we announced that the Crevelin Iron Works were about to be opened, for the manufacture of charcoal turned out from the bogs which abound in that locality. Recently, we regret to learn that owing to the want of local support, the project, as at first arranged, had to be abandoned. The Company, however, have decided to start the peat charcoal industry, immediately. Mr. Oswald Rose, Engineer of the Company, in conjunction with Mr. Byron, inventor of the process by which the peat is manufactured into charcoal, visited the place recently, with the view of making preliminary arrangements for starting the business.

**MAYO.**  
The Chief Secretary recently informed Dr. Ambrose in the House of Commons that it is proposed to open works in Mulranny, Louisburgh, and Killmeena, and that increased number of persons will be employed on the works already existing in the local Union.  
At the last Westport Quarter Sessions, before Judge Richards, County Court Judge, Mr. James Convey, Rate Collector in the Westport Union, brought two actions against the Westport Board of Guardians, one for £35 15s. 5d. for poundage on poor-rates collected in the Achill and Brillycrov districts, and the second for £50 poundage on seed-rate collected by him in the districts. At the close of the case, decrees were given for £35 15s. 5d. poundage on ordinary rates, and £40 2s. upon seed-rates, with £1 10s. witnesses' expenses.

**ROSCOMMON.**  
In Athlone, recently, a serious disturbance was created by a "row" between some soldiers of the Lancashire Regiment and a number of civilians, who were returning from a "wake" when they were attacked by the soldiers. A free fight having taken place on the bridge the soldiers retired to the barracks a short distance away, and having been augmented by a reinforcement, charged up the town with their belts in hand, and savagely assaulted every one they met. The police were summoned, and after some time forced their disturbers back into the barracks.

**SLIGO.**  
As the result of a competitive examination, before Dean Townsend, at Ballymote, Mr. John Dowds, Riverstown, has been appointed Irish Interpreter to the Courts for the county Sligo.  
Recently, Mr. J. W. Kennelly's friends assembled in the Town Hall, Sligo, for the purpose of giving him a farewell supper preceding his departure from the town. Mr. J. F. O'Kelly occupied the chair, and among those present were a large number of the Sligo "Wanderers C. C.," of which Mr. Kennelly was a prominent member, and many others who wished to show even in a small way their appreciation of him. It was a late hour when the company separated.

being a dangerous lunatic, it appeared that, for some time past, Browne, who had been previously in the lunatic asylum, had exhibited symptoms of religious mania. **WESTMEATH.**  
Capt. Leslie Peacocke, of Dalkey, while fishing for pike with John Mahon, on Lough Sheelin, recently, captured in seven hours, twelve pike, weighing from 7lb. to 36lb. The last mentioned fish was a magnificent specimen, and gave splendid sport.

**WICKLOW.**  
The Wicklow Summer Assizes will open on July 20th, before Judges O'Brien and Holmes.

**MUNSTER.**  
**CLARE.**  
At the opening of the Ennis Quarter Sessions, recently, County Court Judge Kelly congratulated the Grand Jury on the peaceable condition of the county at present, and said he hoped it would continue. In returning "no bill" in the only case sent before the jury, the foreman, Mr. Studdert Gilson, said he was directed by them to say that they accepted with grateful thanks his honor's remarks upon the quiet state of the county.

**CORK.**  
Among those called to the Irish Bar, recently, was Mr. T. T. Harley, Cork.

A tinker named Driscoll has been dangerously assaulted on the Ballinacross road, Cork. He is in the South Infirmary. His assailant has not been arrested.

Bailiff Cornelius Leyhane, accompanied by a small force of police, proceeded recently to Carrigapooks for the purpose of evicting Hannah Riordan, a tenant on the estate of Anne McCarthy, of Cork. There was no resistance offered, and the eviction was quietly effected.

A young man named Thomas Kearney, in the employment of a Mr. Schofield, residing at Hallyourney, in the vicinity of Ballineen, went to a portion of the Randon River, near Ballineen Bridge, for the purpose of watering a horse, which he was riding, when the horse made a sudden plunge and disappeared in a hole. Both horse and man were drowned.

**KERRY.**  
A child named Carroll, son of a farmer living near Castlegregory, was eaten and horribly mutilated by a sow, while asleep in a cradle. Eight of his fingers were taken off, and a portion of the neck and face was also torn away.  
Mr. Charles P. Crane, First-class District Inspector, has been appointed Private Secretary to the Inspector-General of Constabulary, in succession to Mr. Robert Starkie, who has been appointed a Resident Magistrate. Mr. Crane was stationed for some years in Kerry.

At the Killarney Quarter Sessions, County Court Judge J. J. Shaw was presented with white gloves, as there was no criminal case listed for hearing. Mr. Huggan, in presenting the gloves, said it was unprecedented in the history of Quarter Sessions Courts held in Kerry that at two successive sessions his Honor was presented with white gloves.

**LIMERICK.**  
The Garryowen Fancy Fair, in aid of Barrington's Hospital, Limerick, was opened by the Countess of Dunraven. Most of the stalls had Irish names and mottoes, taken from the poetry of Irishmen. The Fair continued during four days, and was a great success.

The proceedings of Mr. Pallister Dawson, Petty Sessions Clerk of Newcastle West, have come in for a good deal of attention lately at the hands of Mr. Austin, the Member of Parliament for that division of the county Limerick. Mr. Morley promised that the Lord Lieutenant would institute an inquiry into the charges preferred against Mr. Dawson in his official capacity.

**WATERFORD.**  
Lord Houghton, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and party visited Mount Mellary Abbey, and were entertained for the night. At 3.20 p. m. the train steamed into Cappoulin, conveying in a special carriage the Viceroyal party. They were met at the station by the Prior of Mount Mellary, who had the monastery carriages waiting. Half an hour brought them into the shady avenue leading to the monastery. The party were received at the abbey by the Abbot, Guest-Master, and priests in choral dress, the bells of the tower meantime chiming peals of welcome to the Viceroyal visitors. The visitors dined at the Guest House, after which they took a walk in the gardens attached, and seemed to enjoy the invigorating air of Knockmoldown. Next day the party proceeded to Cahir by Cloneen and Castle Grace. They expressed their warmest gratitude to the good monks for their hospitality, and were astonished at seeing a little Paradise made out of the bleak mountain through the energy of the Sons of St. Bernard.

**TIPPERARY.**  
The Assizes for the South Riding of Tipperary will open in Clonmel, before Justices O'Brien and Holmes.

**ULSTER.**  
**ANTRIM.**  
The position of Locomotive Superintendent on the Great Northern Railway, vacant by the death of Mr. Parks, has been filled by the appointment of Mr. Clifford, Assistant Superintendent at Belfast.

A young girl named Mary MacAulay, who recently fell over a precipice two hundred feet high, near the Giant's Causeway, died at Bushmills, never having regained her consciousness. Almost every bone in her body was broken.

**ARMAGH.**  
Most Rev. Dr. Croke, the illustrious Archbishop of Cashel, arrived in Armagh recently, and was met at the railway station by the Rev. John Quinn, Armagh. His Grace was accompanied by his chaplain, Very Rev. Canon Ryan, Galbally, county Tipperary. The Cardinal's carriage was in waiting at the station, and the party drove to "Ara Cail," the Primate's Residence. In the evening the Archbishop, accompanied by his chaplain and Rev. James Grimes, Armagh; Rev. John Quinn, and Rev. Felix McNally, made a tour of the Primate's city and suburbs, for the purpose of viewing the many objects of historical interest with which the locality abounds. The Archbishop, together with the other Prelates present at the Tuesday's meeting of the Bishops and local priests, dined in the evening with his Eminence, Cardinal Logue.

**DERRY.**  
Mr. Henry McKendry, of Hillhead, Castledawson, has been sworn in a Justice of the Peace for the county of Derry. The appointment has given the greatest satisfaction to the local Nationalists, with whom Mr. McKendry has at all times been in perfect accord.

**DOWN.**  
Most Rev. Dr. Croke, Archbishop of Cashel, who was sojourning at the Mourne Hotel, Restrevor, visited Derry, and was the guest of Most Rev. Dr. McEivern, Bishop of Drogheda. After partaking of luncheon at the Parochial Hall, the Archbishop, accompanied by his chaplain, visited the Cathedral and the Convent in High Street and Catherine Street, where they were received by the Mother Superiores and shown through the buildings. In the evening the Archbishop returned to the Mourne Hotel.

**TYRONE.**  
The melancholy boating accident which occurred on Strangford Lough, resulting in the loss of eight lives, has been again brought vividly before the public mind, another of the missing bodies having been found by Master H. Baile, of Prieststown, some three miles from Portaferry. The remains were identified by some portions of deceased's clothing, as those of Miss Jane Cheshire, maid to Lady Kathleen Cole, who had arrived at Mount Stewart only a few days previous to the sad occurrence.

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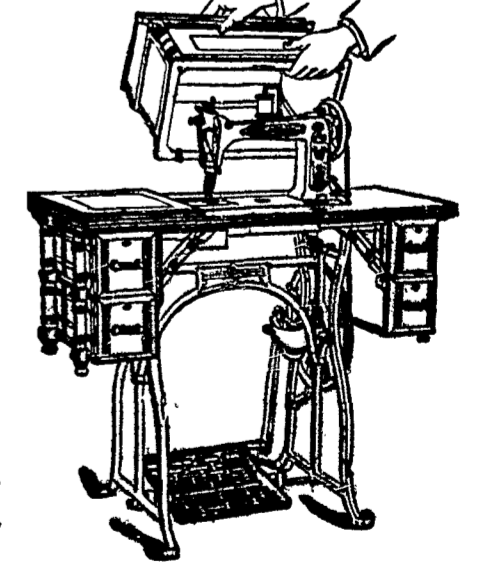
