What is Going on in the Various Parishes.

### St. Mary's Party Fair.

Preparations on a grand scale have been made for the Carnival and Fancy Fair which is to open on Monday evening, and continue till August 5th. The hall will be turned into a grove with trees and flowers, cooled by electric fans, and illuminated with electric lights. Beautiful in design and finish will decorate this summer garden. Ladies in costume will attend them, and everything that genius in such matters can devise will contribute to the enjoyment of visitors.

Voting contests of a most exciting and interesting character will be carried on between some of the popular young ladies and gentlemen in Rochester for valuable prizes.

A splendid musical entertainment will be given every evening at 8 o'clock by St. Mary's choir, assisted by the Keyes girls, of New York.

A beautiful doll at Father Ferron's table will be voted between Miss Kennedy and Miss Paisley, and another at Father Smetz's table, between Miss Mable Hamm. There will be dancing every evening, and Messrs. McQuay, Egan, Kennedy, and Lawlor, will be in charge of this part of the entertainment.

Those purchasing admission tickets will receive an elegant present every evening.

### ST. JOSEPH'S.

The Knights of St. Mauritius celebrated their 91st anniversary Sunday last, by attending Holy Mass in a body. They now number 71 members, and expect to increase this to 100.

The decorating of the church, which was to have been finished some time in August, is now not expected to be completed until September. The entire edifice has been wired for incandescent lights, and when completed will be one of the brightest churches in Rochester.

The successful competitors and their per cent. follow: Lawrence Glasser 92 per cent. Agnes Bieck, 90 per cent. Eustace Leinen, 88. Theresa Verhoeven, 86. Enough cannot be said in praise of such work, as they not only won their prizes, but stood higher in their examinations, the closest one of the other three winning prizes, standing 84 per cent. Let the good work go on, and by next year St. Joseph's should be the banner school in the city.

The Brothers and Sisters deserve great praise for the worthy showing made at the last examination held June 29th, 1895, and it is hoped that the people of St. Joseph's parish work hand in hand with the teachers, and thereby retain the position our school has so suddenly gained.
