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**GALWAY.**  
A public meeting of the citizens of Galway, presided over by Bishop McCormack, was held lately, in the court-house, for the purpose of forming a company to improve salt-hill, the suburban watering place of that city. The meeting was addressed by several speakers, including Father Lally, T. Costello, Mr. Semple, J. P., Mr. Corcoran, Mr. Connelly, and Mr. Stimmens, and resolutions were adopted to form a company and issue a prospectus and articles of association. Land has been acquired for the purpose of the proposed improvements, which it is expected, when complete will place the Galway seaside resort in a position equal to that of the best in the country.

**MAYO.**  
We regret to announce the death, which occurred recently, in Castlebar, of Mr. Thomas Gallagher, aged 31 years, from heart failure. His funeral was very large and respectable. The shops were all closed as the sad cortege passed. Deceased was an affectionate son and brother, clever and industrious, and greatly esteemed by all who knew him. The interment took place in the Old Church. Rev. Father Burke officiated at the grave, where many a prayer was offered up for deceased's eternal repose.

**LEITRIM.**  
A fire broke out recently in the stables attached to the residence of C. C. B. Whyte, D.L., of Carrick-on-Shannon, and damage was done to the extent of £800.

**ROSCOMMON.**  
While Rev. F. Gately, Knockroghery, was driving a young horse, yoked to a car, the animal became restive and threw the Reverend gentleman to the ground, his leg getting badly bruised. The injury is so serious that he will be incapacitated for a few weeks.

**LONGFORD.**  
The Protestant rector of Ballymahon, the Rev. H. Poe, while returning from Longford was attacked by a tramp, who knocked him off his bicycle and belabored him with a stick. The Rev. gentleman was seriously injured. His assailant—escaped capture, though the police are tracing the case up.

**LOUTH.**  
A fire broke out recently in Chester's Lane, Drogheda, which resulted in the destruction of two houses and considerable damage to two others. It appears that some paper decorations had become ignited in the house of a blacksmith named Thos. McManus. The fire rapidly ascended to the thatch and timbers of the roof. The fire-ball rang out the alarm, and very soon the Brigade appeared on the scene, while the neighbors endeavored by every means in their power, to arrest the progress of the flames. It was some hours before these were totally extinguished, the house in which the fire arose and the one adjoining being totally destroyed, thus adding to the already large number of dead walls in what was once a busy and populous locality.

**WEXFORD.**  
The list of Civil Bills in which decrees were obtained at the last Wexford quarter Sessions contained a further large batch from the Templemore estate. In most cases the tenants were decreed for a year and a half's rent. It would appear that Lord Templemore is now fully determined to ruin his tenantry and ruin his estate; for this intention of heavy law costs upon the people, at a time like the present, when farmers are undoubtedly unable to meet their full rents, cannot have any other effect than to bankrupt and ruin them. That this is the policy of the landlord was shown, when during a heavy thunderstorm,

Mr. Bowen effected a further seizure of 29 cattle in the Sbeimurine district.

**MEATH.**  
Letters Patent have passed the Great Seal of Ireland, appointing Simon Mangan, Esq., to be Lieutenant and Custos Rotulorum for the county of Meath, in the room of the Marquis of Headfort, deceased.

At the auction of meadowing near Navan, by Mr. Leonard, the attendance of buyers, and prices, owing to the probable scarcity of hay, were very satisfactory. First crop made £7 17s 6d, and old meadow up to £6 12s 6d, per acre, the purchasers paying fees, and the owner retaining the after-grass.

**WICKLOW.**  
A severe thunderstorm passed over a large part of Ireland and England recently. In Wicklow a number of cattle were killed by lightning.

**CORK.**  
Steps are being taken to erect a monument to the late Rev. T. O'Regan, of Mourn-Abhey.

At Fermoy Petty Sessions a man named Lenihan, was fined £2, and £2 compensation, for deliberately injuring a bicycle belonging to an American tourist.

Michael Lawton, a blacksmith, residing at Ladysbridge, near Middleton, has been arrested for the alleged wilful murder of his wife, Mary Lawton, aged 50. The prisoner, it is alleged, beat his wife to death, during the night, while temporarily insane.

**KERRY.**  
A few days ago a remarkable birth was reported to have taken place at Scart, near Killarney. Mrs. Broder, the wife of a laborer, gave birth to four children. They are all living, and the mother is in good health.

**LIMERICK.**  
At a meeting of the Limerick branch of the Irish National Federation, Mr. David Hegley presiding, the following resolution was unanimously adopted—"Resolved, That we congratulate the electors of Cork City on their victory over Toryism and Factionism combined, and we believe that the heart of Cork is as true as steel, as ever, in the National cause." The chairman congratulated the meeting on the victory. They were threatened with a contest in Limerick by Dr. Fitzgerald, but the Redmondites hadn't had a chance of victory.

**WATERFORD.**  
At Port au, recently, a young man named Butler, was struck by lightning and killed.  
Head-Constable M'Brinn, having graduated from the ranks to the degree of Head-Constable, and spent thirty years in active service between Belfast, Cork, Waterford and Limerick, in which cities his tact and intelligence were acknowledged by all, has resigned, and has been succeeded by Head-Constable Feeney, in William street Barracks, Limerick. Mr. M'Brinn goes out of office with superior marks of efficiency and good conduct in the discharge of his duty.

**TIPPERARY.**  
A specimen of Irish manufacture, highly creditable to the representatives of an industry in which Dublin workmen have long earned a reputation for great efficiency, is being exhibited at the extensive carriage works of Mr. Thomas Denehy, 56 Lower Baggot street, Dublin. It is a handsome brougham which has

been selected for presentation to his Grace the Archbishop of Cashel, by some of the people of Thurles, on the occasion of his approaching silver jubilee. The body of the vehicle, which is circular-fronted, is composed of well-seasoned Irish and American ash, pine, and American white wood, with mahogany panels. The painting is in dark olive green morocco, and all the internal fittings are perfect and up to date. The carriage is fitted with patent double rubber breaks. The arms and crest of the Archbishop of Cashel, are most artistically executed on the sides, by Mr. Watson, Upper O'Connell street.

**ULSTER.**

**ANTRIM.**  
Mr. Joseph P. O'Kane, Ballycastle, has been sworn in as a magistrate for the county Antrim.

The Belfast Ulster Echo states, on reliable authority, that Mr. Thomas Sexton will retire from public life at the close of the present Parliament.

In the House of Commons, recently, the Carrickfergus Town Commissioners Bill, which had passed the Lords, was read a third time. The Belfast and Northern Counties Railway Bill, from the Lords, was also considered without amendment, and offered for third reading.

**ARMAGH.**  
In Armagh, recently, great excitement was caused by a number of party disturbances. The local branch of the Ancient Order of Free Gardeners, and a band, went by road on brakes and cars from Armagh to Dungannon in the morning, to attend, it is understood, the ceremony of laying the foundation-stone of a new Orange Hall. The conduct of the crowd which accompanied them after passing through the Catholic quarter in the morning, was most reprehensible. On the Moy road some of their number cursed the Pope and indulged in party expressions. On returning to Armagh, a portion of the party insisted in forcing their way through Railroad st., where a riot ensued, and blows were received from persons from both sides. The police, however, intervened, and prevented what had the appearance of becoming a very serious disturbance.

**DERRY.**  
Mr. Bernard Hannigan has been nominated for election as Poor-Law Guardian for Derry city and suburbs. Mr. Thomas Lindsay, City Coroner, has also been nominated.

The Derry Nationalist Council has invited Mr. Justin McCarthy to accept the Parliamentary candidature for that city. At the last election Mr. McCarthy was defeated by Mr. John Ross by only twenty-six of a majority, and the Nationalists claim to have since improved their position on the register.

**DOWN.**  
A fire broke out recently in the workshop and furniture store of Mr. M'Roberts, Mill street, Newry, and had it not been for the prompt exertions of the fire brigade and police, the premises would have been burned down. The conflagration originated by some shavings coming in contact with a lighted match that one of the workmen was about to use to start a fire in a grate. The fire was extinguished, but not before a considerable amount of damage was done. Neither the premises nor the stock were insured.

**MONAGHAN.**  
The new parish church at Clones, which has been in course of erection since October, 1892, is rapidly approaching completion. The old church, which is at present in use, is in a very decayed condition; but the new edifice will fully meet the requirements of the parish and will be opened on the 8th of September next, and will cost £12,000, of which almost £8,000 has been already contributed by the people of Clones.

**TYRONE.**  
Recently fire was discovered to have broken out on the premises of Mr. John H. Reid, Donaghendry, near Stewartstown. The fire was discovered about one o'clock a.m., and everything possible was done to save the building, situated at the rear of the dwelling-house, but without success. The building contained a large number of farming implements. The damages are estimated at £300, only partly covered by insurance. A claim for malicious injury, it is stated, will be made.
