DIOCESAN NEWS.

From Our Special Correspondent.

Geneva.

On Friday morning, Aug. 16th, the citizens of Geneva were aroused, at about half-past four, by the sound of fire bells, and the whistle of the Phillips & Clark's stove company's works blowing, at the unusual hour, it turned out to be, that the stove works was on fire. If it had not been for the presence of the Andes House company, the building would now be a heap of ashes, and all the stoves made this season, would be included on the list. As it is, the loss is estimated at \$10,000 fully covered by insurance. The cause of the fire as far as can be ascertained is as follows: Nightwatchman Trainor says he was making a round of the shops, and on reaching the store-room located in the second story, on the Evans street side of the works, he passed a large can containing a mixture of stove polish and benzine. He carried a lantern in his hand and it is supposed that the gases from the mixture ignited from the lamp. An explosion took place, setting fire to Mr. Trainor's clothing, and some loose paper on the floor. Trainor tore off his burning coat and then attempted to stamp out the flames. He was unsuccessful in this. He then hastened to the alarm and sent a call for the fire department. The firemen quickly responded, but owing to the dense smoke with which the building had become filled, they found great difficulty in reaching the flames. The firemen did excellent work, confining the fire to the two upper floors, and after two hours hard work had it under control. Mr. Trainor in attempting to put out the flames had his left hand burned severely.

The death of Sarah O'Malley occurred on Friday morning, at two o'clock, at the home of her sister, Mrs. Isaac Phillips, after an illness of a few months duration, aged about 19 years. Sarah had many friends, and will be much missed by her associates and companions. She was highly respected by all who knew her. Her funeral was held from St. Francis de Sales church on Monday morning, at 9 o'clock and was very largely attended. May her soul rest in peace, Amen.

THE CATHOLIC UNIVERSITY.

The Celtic Chair Founded by the A. O. H.—The Professor Appointed.

The appointment of Father Fritchard Hembry to the Celtic Chair of the Catholic University weekly fills the professorship founded by the generous patriotism of the A. O. H. The University authorities are to be congratulated upon having secured one of the best equipped Celtic scholars living. For more than ten years Father Hembry has been a warm supporter of, and worker in the Gaelic movement, and the circumstances which cast his lot for the past few years, in the English city of Manchester, fortunately brought him into contact with some of the best know Celticists, and gave him opportunities, such as rarely if ever have been afforded to Celtic students of becoming familiar with the methods of work of modern philologists. Father Hembry had the initial advantage of being brought up in a Gaelic speaking district, the north of Waterford. There in the wild glens of the Comerage mountains, the Gaelic is spoken with a richness of vocabulary and ready idiom rarely found, and the wealth of folk lore and other traditional literature, for which that district is noted, would be of itself an excellent foundation for late Gaelic studies.
