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CONNAUGHT.

OALWAY.

It is announced in the official Gazette that Mr. W. P. M. Keogh, son of Patrick T. Keogh, Esq., Glenna, recently of Galway, passed at the recent University examination in the first class in medicine, and was recommended for honors.

At a recent meeting of magistrates, held in the County Court-house, for the purpose of electing a High Constable for the Baronry of Ballymoe, Mr. W. Shaw Taylor, in the chair, three candidates offered themselves for the position—namely, Mr. John D'Arcy, of Westport; Mr. Henry Madden, of Hermitage; and Mr. James D. McDonagh, Prospect, Dunmore. A poll having been taken, the voting resulted as follows: Mr. McDonagh, 30; Mr. D'Arcy, 20; Mr. Madden, 7. The Chairman then declared Mr. McDonagh duly elected as High Constable for the Baronry of Ballymoe.

LEINSTER.

DUBLIN.

A man named Francis Wilson, plasterer, aged sixty-five, was recently found lying in the street at Westmacott, county Galway, passed at the recent University examination in the condition. He was conveyed to Sir Patrick Dunn's Hospital, but on medical examination life was pronounced extinct.

A man who had the appearance of a ship's fireman, and who gave the names of Carney and Anderson, and said he lived in Fitzgerald street, Dublin, died at Liverpool recently. He was found in a railway tunnel the previous night, with both arms severed and one foot terribly mangled. A wages document on him bore the name of Patrick Spence, Dublin.

KILKENNY.

In Kilkenny, Justice Holmes, accompanied by Mr. Thomas Power, High Sheriff, City Court, and opened the Commission. The Grand Jury having been sworn, Justice Holmes said: "The Sheriff has told me that at the last two assizes he had the pleasure of presenting to the presiding judges a pair of white gloves as a token that the calendar was free from crime. On the present occasion he is unfortunately deprived of a similar pleasure by reason of the damage that is alleged that one John Flanagan, on some day in the month of April, committed a theft. The result of that allegation by the Crown makes it necessary for you to investigate the case—which will be laid before you, and it deprives me of the gloves. At the same time I am happy to say this does not indicate an unsatisfactory state of the city." In the County Court Justice O'Brien presided. There were only a few cases of no importance on the calendar.

MAYO.

Mr. Robert Porter, for many years agent of the Bank of Ireland in Castlebar, has retired after a long service. Mr. Porter was for many years an official of the Bank of Ireland in Ballinrobe, where, as well as in Castlebar, he was deservedly respected.

At All Hallows Convent, Ballina, three young ladies were recently received in the beautiful Chapel of the Convent by Most Rev. Dr. Conroy, assisted by a large number of the clergy of the diocese. The names of the young novices are Miss M. A. Egan (in religion Sister Clara Brennan); second daughter of Mr. Thomas Egan, Glenisland, Castlebar; Miss Gertrude McCarrick (Slater Attracta), daughter of the late J. McCarrick, Esq., Clonberry House, Aclare; and Miss Robinson (Sister Dympna), daughter of Mr. J. Robinson, Ballina.

ROSCOMMON.

A sad fatality occurred recently on the Ballymurry river, close to the railway bridge between Moate and Lisbridge. A young man named Naughton, who lived close by, went to bathe in the river, which was quite low, and it appears he either must have got cramps, or got caught in the mud, and could not extricate himself before he was drowned. A man who was passing by noticed the clothes on the bank of the river, and seeing no one around went a short distance along the river, when he saw the dead body laying in about three feet of water. Word was at once conveyed to the friends of the deceased, and the remains were taken up and removed to his father's residence, where an inquest was held, and after hearing the evidence a verdict of accidental death was returned. Deceased was only about twenty-eight years of age.

SLIGO.

Mr. Joseph L. Keane, a prominent lawyer of New York City, and nephew of the late Dr. Gillooly, has been recently stopping at the Greenlands Temperance Hotel, Rosse Point.

Alderman Francis Higgins, Sligo, has been appointed Justice of the Peace for the county of Sligo. Always a staunch Nationalist, and taking a foremost place in the national movement, Mr. Higgins will be a valuable acquisition to the national bench.

In Maryborough, the assizes were opened by Mr. Justice Holmes, who addressing the grand jury, said that there was only one case to occupy

the session. This was an assault case, which was quickly disposed of, the criminal business not occupying an hour.

WESTMEATH.

The assizes for Westmeath commenced in the Mullingar Courthouse recently. The Judges were Justice Murphy and Justice Johnson. The latter took his seat in the Criminal Court, while the former presided in the Record Court. There were only three trivial cases on the calendar, which was disposed of in about an hour, and the business of the assizes terminated.

WEXFORD.

Natives of New Ross and elsewhere will learn with regret that General Napper, Belleville attempted suicide, while in a state of temporary aberration, recently. It would appear that on the above morning, shortly after getting out of bed, he procured a small penknife, and standing before a mirror gashed the side of his throat, but fortunately did not sever either windpipe or arteries. Only a few minutes elapsed until he was found by his wife, who immediately summoned Dr. Anne McColl, of Philadelphia, Mrs. Walsh and Cherry, who arrived in very short time and rendered the necessary aid before much blood was lost. They were of opinion that the wound is not in its serious, and that the General will soon recover in mind as well as in body.

MUNSTER.

CLARE.

Dr. Hickey, of Kilkee, has been sworn in as Justice of the Peace for the county of Clare.

An action was brought for £1,000 at the Limerick assizes, by Miss Bridget Lynch, Liscare, county Clare, against Mrs. Mary Kate Butler, of Ballymoe House, and her two daughters for the obstruction of a water-course which caused floods that did considerable damage. The jury found for the plaintiff, with £100 per week.

ORK.

At the last meeting of the Magistrate Board of Guardians it was decided to increase the salary of the master of the workhouse from £50 to £70 per annum.

A Skibbereen press correspondent states that a shocking outrage is reported from the district of Durus. A young woman named Dakelows stated to have been outraged and murdered.

KERRY.

A presentment for £2,000 was for extra police force in county Kerry, has been passed by the Grand Jury at Tralee.

Lawler, of New York, the handball champion, will arrive in Cork on the 11th of August, for a match with Fitzgerald of Tralee.

Miss Frances Walsh, pupil of the Loretto Abbey Convent, Rathfarnham, county Dublin, and daughter of Mr. John Walsh, the Square, Tralee, has received the Royal Irish Academy of Music certificate of pass for the piano forte, and for that most beautiful of all instruments, the harp.

LIMERICK.

The Most Rev. Dr. O'Dwyer, Bishop of Limerick, and Mr. F. G. M. Kennedy, have become annual Governors of the County Limerick Library.

An old man named O'Rourke, a native of the parish of Dromin, near Bruree, was buried a few weeks ago, at Holy Trinity Churchyard, Dromin. He had attained the advanced age of 102 years. It is a curious fact that he was bedridden for almost half a century before his death.

TIPPERARY.

In the Probate Court, Dublin, recently before Judge Warren and a Special Jury the case came up of Hyland vs. Landy. This suit was brought to establish the will of the late William Walsh, farmer, of Baptist Grange, county of Tipperary, who had died possessed of considerable property. By his will, which was dated the 4th February, 1884, he gave to his two nephews, Michael and William Walsh, all his personal property in certain National Bank Shares, with the exception of £40 to his brother, Martin Walsh, and £60 to his sister, Mrs. Maguire, the shares to be sold after his death. He appointed Wm. Hyland, of Shanballa, and Jeremiah McCarthy, of Fethard, as executors, and they were the plaintiffs in the suit. The defendants were nieces of the testator, who was a bachelor, and they

had obtained the will on the usual stale grounds, and they also pleaded that the will was obtained by the undue influence of Mary Walsh and others acting with her. The jury found a verdict establishing the will, with cost against the contestants.

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
