St. Mary's Hospital now has a separate building for patients afflicted with contagious diseases. An addition to the stone building in the yard, formerly used as a wash house, has been erected, and this has been fitted for the reception of patients. The pavilion is 100x35 feet in size and is constructed in accordance with modern ideas on sanitation, and will accommodate twenty patients and the necessary corps of nurses. It is two stories in height and is surrounded by broad verandas glazed, heated by steam and lighted by gas. In these glass corridors, convalescents can take exercise and have the advantage of sun baths. The pavilion is entirely separate from the main building, and is intended as a hospital for diphtheria, scarlet fever and measles patients. The food for these patients, and for the nurses engaged there, will be supplied from the general kitchen.

The funeral of Richard McNamara, who died on Sunday last at his home No. 414 Plymouth Avenue, was held at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning from Immaculate Conception Church, Rev. T. Farro officiating. The deceased was survived by three brothers, Matthew and Edward McNamara of this city, and Patrick McNamara, of Philadelphia. One sister, Mrs. Ellen Hennessy, of this city also survives.

Patrick Brennan died Sunday morning at his residence, 105 South Washington street, aged 79 years.

Mr. Brennan was born in County West Meath, Ireland, in 1816, and emigrated to this country in 1842, settling in Boston, where he was married two years later. Shortly after his marriage Mr. Brennan removed to this city, where he has since resided. He was one of the charter members of St. Mary's Society, which was organized in 1855, and is the oldest religious society in this city.

He is survived by his son, Lawrence Brennan, residing in Flower City Bank, and one daughter, Miss Mary Brennan.

The funeral took place Wednesday morning at 9:30 o'clock from the house, and from Immaculate Conception Church at 10 o'clock.

Mrs. Ellen Groves, widow of the late Thomas B. Groves, died Thursday afternoon at her residence, 92 Smith street, aged 64 years. Mrs. Groves was born in Toronto, Canada, and came to this city in 1846.

She was for many years a member of the Cathedral, and was a devout Christian. The funeral will take place from the residence of Charles J. Maloy, 68 Linden street, at 1:30 o'clock this morning, and at 10 o'clock from the Cathedral.
