## CLUBS AND THE LAW

Police Commissioner Roosevelt now says he will prevent the clubs in New York from selling liquor on Sundays. If the clubs are violating the excise law by selling liquor on Sunday then they are violating it by selling it on week days because the clubs, as a rule, have no license. There is no provision made in the excise law for club licenses.

This question was raised so long ago in good faith by a well known lawyer who thought the club was violating the law by selling liquor on Sunday. His statements were challenged by another equally well known lawyer who surprised his opponent by showing him that the question whether a club was required to have a license had never been decided by the courts of New York state.

## A PECULIAR CASE

A very peculiar case was reported in the New York "Sun" last Monday. It appears that Edwin C. Odell, who died a few days ago, had been married three times. By his first wife he had three children. Twenty-four years ago he was left a widower. He married again, but his second wife and her step-children did not live happily together, and eventually Mrs. Odell number two secured an absolute divorce, with the custody of the two children that had been born to her.

All this is of no account to the readers of the Journal; but here is the peculiar part: According to the "Sun," Mrs. Odell number two had re-married; but still she and Mrs. Odell number three are both devout Catholics, and both attend the same church. This cannot be. Either the "Sun" is misinformed, or both women are arrant hypocrites.

Wallace, chancellor of Newark Diocese, master of ceremonies.

GOSPEL: St. Luke xiv. 1-11.—At that time: "When Jesus went into the house of one of the chief of the Pharisees, on the Sabbath-day, to eat bread, they watched Him. But when thou art invited, go, sit down in the lowest place: that when he who invited thee cometh he may say to thee: Friend, go up higher. Then shalt thou have glory before them that sit at table with thee. Because every one that exalteth himself shall be humbled, and he that humbleth himself shall be exalted."
