Penn Yan.

Mrs. B. Bergman has purchased premises owned by Fred Wagoner, on Elm street, and will soon reside there.

William Lynch, the oldest son of Timothy Lynch, of Dundee, died on Friday last of consumption. The requiem Mass was celebrated in Dundee, on Saturday morning, and the remains were brought to Penn Yan on Sunday, and interred in St. Michael's cemetery. The bereaved family have the sympathy of many friends in their affliction.

The Board of Water Commissioners are negotiating for the extension of the village mains on Head street to Robert O. Hewson's Mill, and on Boundary street as far as Henry street.

Charles Knapp will call his skating rink Iceland Park. An earthen embankment has been thrown up enclosing about two and a-half acres. This will be flooded with water from the local waterworks system. One million gallons will be required. BISHOP McQUAID

Lays the Corner-Stone for the New Church at Ovid.

A large crowd assembled last Monday afternoon to witness the laying of the corner-stone of the new Catholic Church at Ovid. After the conclusion of the laying of the corner-stone the audience listened to a few remarks made by the Bishop. The day was not very pleasant, as there was a sharp, penetrating wind blowing.

The following articles were deposited in a box in the cavity of the corner-stone: A copy of the Ovid Independent, Farmer Review, Catholic Journal, Ovid Bee of 1870 and 1872; copy of Seminary book, names of Bishop McQuaid, Vicar-General O'Hara, and others of the Diocese; coins of different value.

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A PARISH MOURNS.

REV. FATHER DOUGHERTY.

Pastor of St. Patrick's cathedral, died at his home, 111 Broadway, on Nov. 1, 1905 at 8:45.

Rev. Father Dougherty, a native of Ireland, was born in 1822. He received his early education at the Mount St. Vincent Seminary, and was ordained a priest in 1845. He was pastor of St. Patrick's cathedral for many years. He was a devoted and successful pastor, and his death is a great loss to the parish.

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
