James E. Sweeney, aged 88 years, died Oct. 15th, at his home in Henrietta. Glancy, of Honeoye Falls, assisted by Rev. A. A. Hughes and Rev. J. G. VanNess. Interment took place at Holy Sepulchre cemetery. Mr. Sweeney was a young man of rare personal traits and of unimpeachable integrity. Although active in politics since he was of age no one ever knew him to do aught that was not in accordance with the strictest justice to all, and friend and opponent alike respected and admired him. He was elected collector on the democratic ticket when he was but 31 years old. He was afterward elected assessor and re-elected at the close of his term by the largest majority ever given a candidate in Henrietta. He was an idolized son and brother and his death leaves a gap in the family circle that never can be filled. May his soul rest in peace.
