COOK OPERA HOUSE

No comedy produced in recent years has attracted the attention of the amusement-loving public or been afforded more space in the daily papers throughout this country than has "A Happy Little Home," which George W. Monroe brings to the Cook Opera House next Monday afternoon to fulfill his annual engagement in this city. Even where the new piece de resistance for the fat factor of "My Aunt Bridget" fame has been produced, it has been received in the most enthusiastic manner, and it is predicted that its presentation here at the Cook Opera House will be signified on Monday night by the gathering of one of the largest audiences ever contained within the four walls of this popular playhouse, that is, if the advance sale which has been in progress several days is to be taken as an indication.

ACADEMY.

For the coming week Manager Cook announces a star in two plays of the sensational order, the kind that always wins the approval of the gallery and presses the down stairs patrons as well, viz., Dan A. Kelly, the young character actor, in his realistic scenic melodramas of metropolitan life, "Outcasts of a Great City," and "The Shadow Detective."

The first one, which will hold the boards for the first three nights and Tuesday matinee, is a play for the masses, founded on the vicissitudes of some poor outcasts in their attempt to gain their rights and thwart the plans of their persecutor and enemy. The scenes are all laid in and around the city of New York, consequently admit of realistic stage representation, which is duly taken advantage of.

The play for the last of the week, while similar in construction is a little different, in that its scenes are more diversified and varied in their locale. Like all detective stories and plays, "The Shadow Detective" is full of hair-breadth escapes and thrilling adventures, the hero, after meeting with all kinds of obstacles and overcoming all manner of difficulties, ferreting out the true inwardness of the villain and bringing him at last to justice.

With two such sensational plays and a good company, headed by a clever star like Mr. Kelly, the Academy will no doubt be packed to the dome and its patrons enjoy every performance.

WONDERLAND THEATRE.

This house will have a good strong show composed of specialties and comedy for the coming week, headed by a duo of high class and versatile society sketch artists, Frances Redding and Mr. Hugh Stanton, in a legitimate domestic comedy entitled "A Pair of Lunatics." These people were seen here a few weeks ago and they made big hit. The new sketch is said to be way ahead of the old one. No doubt they will receive a warm welcome next week.
