Godkin, the renegade Mugwump who edits the New York "Evening Larry abused President Oleveland and lauded Salisbury He also wrote letters to prominent Hagiish papers, in which he stated that the general sentiment of the American people was violently opposed to President Cleveland's position. With all this assistance Saliebury was justified in maintain ing his "bluff." In the last fer days, however, the mass of th English people have seen new ligh on the Venezuelan question, and are not half as eager to thrash th United States as they were.

Great Britain has another matter to adjust now, as we said before and it is likely to cause her more trouble than the Venezuela difficulty As a matter of fact the new trouble may force an entire back down on the Venezuelan question. The press despatches have been filled the last fer days with the story of the invasion of the Transvani, or South African Republic, by Dr. Robert Jameson, and the crushing defeat of the latter by the sturdy Boers who make up the population of the Transwasl. The Emperor of Germany has telegraphed the President of the Republic congratulating him on defeating Jameson. This is interpreted in England as tantamount to a declaration that Germany will aid the Boers. This means wer or the overthrow of the Salisbury ministry. And war with Germany means diffioulty with France, with Russia and with Italy. Meanwhile the United States has not been pacified. In order to understand the situa-

The South African company has, since the defeat, claimed it did not author ize Jameson's expedition, and, on the contrary, warned him not to undertake it. When Jameson was well on his way and the fact wel advertised—which was not tended—the English government saw that a satal mistake had been made and Secretary Chamberlain immediatery made a public repudia tion of Jameson and his schemes. This looks like double dealing. I it probable that the South African company was ignorant of Jameson's plant? If it were cognizant, then it is abourd to say that the government knew nothing of it, with royalty represented in the company's directorate. If the government was cognizant, then Chemberlain's abandonment of Jameson was the height of perfidy. The outcome of the incident will undonbiedly be that England will have to abandon her protectorate over the Transvant or fight. The ultimate result of the latter course may be the dismemberment of the English empire.
