Rev. James P. Kieran, rector of St. Patrick's Cathedral, has completed his annual financial statement as Treasurer of the parish.

The report shows total receipts of \$18,499.46 and disbursements of \$18,448.40. Of the receipts \$10,816.84 came from pew rentals and \$1,055.78 from collection for St. Bernard's Seminary.

The financial report of Rev. J. J. Leary as treasurer shows the total receipts \$9,927.31, and disbursements \$8,559.73.

Mr. Gladly was born in County Westmeath, Ireland, but has been a resident of Waterloo for over forty years, and he held many positions of responsibility, including canal inspector. He leaves besides his wife, three sons, John, Joseph and Lawrence, and five daughters, Mrs. Geo. King, Mrs. William Pelzer, Mrs. E. J. Logan, Mrs. Grant Fredericks, and Mrs. George Segar, the latter of Rochester. The funeral was held Tuesday afternoon.

Ex-Police Justice Bartholomew Keeler died at his residence, 419 Lyell Avenue, Wednesday night.

One week previous to Thanksgiving Judge Keeler was stricken with anæmia. Since then he had been confined to his room.

Mr. Keeler was born in Ireland 46 years ago. With his parents he came to this country in 1849 and settled in Herkimer County, this State. He went to school in the winter time and worked on the farm in the summer until he was 21 years old. He then prepared for college at the Episcopal Seminary in Little Falls and Genesee University in 1872. He was graduated in 1876. He spent two years of his college course in Germany where he went for the purpose of learning the German language.

After leaving college he studied law with his brother, D. B. Keeler, of Syracuse, and was admitted to practice in April, 1878. He came to this city in the same year. In the meantime he kept up his studies and in 1882 took the degree of Ph. D. on a dissertation at Syracuse University. He served two years in the Board of Supervisors for 1888 and '89 from the old Fourth Ward.

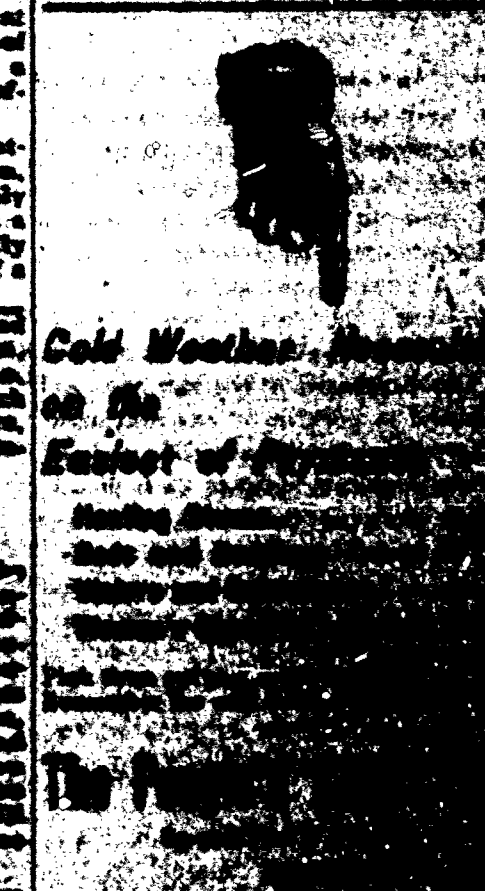
