Would Cost the City \$30,000.

Clerk Malley, of the Excise Board, sent a communication to Mayor Warner Tuesday stating that the city would lose \$30,000 in rebates, if the Raines Excise bill becomes a law. Mayor Warner presented these figures to Governor Morton at the Mayor's hearing at Albany, given on the bill.

In order that our readers may form their own opinions about it we deem it well to give the provisions of the measure. They are as follows:

1. Abolition of all Excise Boards on April 30 next.

2. Termination of Excise in Congress June 30 next.

3. Creation of Excise Commissioner at salary of \$5,000, deputy at \$4,000, three special inspectors at \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000; sixty inspectors at large at \$1,500, and expenses for all.

4. A bureau at Albany, with clerical help.

5. Gives one-third of the net revenue collected to the State and two-thirds to the counties.

6. Allows County Treasurers, except in counties containing cities of the first class, fees ranging from 1 per cent to three per cent, the latter in country districts.

7. Prohibits all-night licensees and the sale of liquor on Sunday, except in hotels, with meals, or in rooms occupied by guests. This prohibition extends to clubs, where liquor may be sold only at meals.

8. Fine for violation of law is fixed at not less than twice the amount of license.

9. Allows local option in towns only, and not in cities. Compels posting of liquor licenses in windows of saloons.

10. Prohibits saloons within two hundred feet of a church or school.

11. Allows courts to review applications for license, also petitions for revocation of license.

12. Hotels must have at least ten rooms for accommodation of guests, to be rated as hotels.

Act takes effect immediately.
