

CENSURE FOR BAYARD.

House Calls the Ambassador to Account.

RUMORS THAT HE WILL RESIGN.

Reports to This Effect, However, Are驳回 by His Democratic Friends.
House Declares Against Pe-
tition Speeches by
Diplomats.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—The house, after three days' debate, adopted a resolution censuring Thomas F. Bayard, ex-secretary of state and now ambassador to the court of St. James, for utterances delivered in an address before the Edinburgh, Scotland, philosophical institution, last fall.

The vote stood 189 to 71 in favor of the first resolution and 191 to 59 in favor of the second. Five Republicans broke away from party lines and voted against the resolution of censure and six Democrats voted for it.

All the Republicans and the Democrats voted for the second resolution. Mr. Wil- liams, a Republican from Mr. Bayard's state,

made a speech in opposition to the first resolution, and Mr. Bailey (Dem., Tex.) not only endorsed the resolutions but declared that a man who delivered such utterances as Mr. Bayard had at Boston was "in worthy to represent the United States anywhere at any time."

There was a report about the house after the resolution had been adopted that Ambassador Bayard would resign, but close friends of the administration asserted positively that there was absolutely no foundation for the rumors which they did not hesitate to ridicule.

MURDERER STRUNG UP.

Taken From Jail by a Mob and Hung to a Tree.

CINCINNATI, March 23.—A special from Chattanooga, Tenn., says: "A mob took William Murphy from the jail at Huntsville, Tenn., and strung him up to a tree. The villagers knew nothing of it till the body was found hanging from a honey locust in the morning. William Murphy was in jail waiting trial for the murder of Bill Nowlin, a miner three weeks ago at Pioneer in Campbell county which adjoins Scott county in which the lynching occurred. About 80 mountaineers with handkerchiefs over their faces did the lynching. The leaders were no disguise, but seemed to be a strangler. He knocked at the door, awakened Jailer C. C. Ellis, representing that he was a deputy sheriff with a pistol on him, and the jailer opened the door he was covered with a large army pistol and the keys demanded. He refused to surrender the keys. The mountaineers drew revolvers on the jailer's frightened wife and daughter and they got the keys and gave them to the mob. Murphy was found praying for mercy.

He begged hard for his life, but if they would kill him he begged not to be dragged or choked to death. He was roughly dragged out and hung on the nearest tree. Murphy and his victim were both miners. Murphy leaves a widow and several children at Junction City, Ky. Huntsville is near the Kentucky line.

NARROWLY ESCAPED DEATH.

Congressmen, All Unaware, Nearly Drift Over a Dam.

PITTSBURGH, March 21.—The congressional committee on rivers and harbors arrived here from Fairmont, W. Va., after an inspection of the Monongahela from that city to this and this morning resumed their journey down the Ohio on the steamer Virginia.

Nothing of moment occurred during the day's trip until just as the boat Isaac M. Mason, carrying the party, was entering lock No. 1 just above this city. The river being about 100 feet high, the boat was carried within six feet of the dam, and was saved from going over by the opportunity of the steamer Phillips, the officer of which, seeing the danger, hastily threw a rope to the impaled Mason and towed her up stream out of danger.

The 100 souls on board the Mason narrowly escaped a terrible death. They only lay down on board under the direction of Congressman Carpenter, who was in command of the party, when the accident occurred.

Broadside Blows Viking Boated.

HARBOUR, N. E., March 21.—The trans-Atlantic steamer Viking, with coal from Mexico, which left for Hull River, was towed by the oil tank steamer "Fowey" from New York for London. The schooner's anchor was blown away and the crew were in the act of abandoning the vessel when the steamer hove in view. The steamer took off the Viking's crew and then put a prize crew under the steamer's second officer in charge of her.

Rev. Brown Charged With Heresy.

MADISON, Conn., March 21.—Rev. W. H. Brown was placed on trial before the New Haven association of the Congregational church, charged with heresy. He is accused of not holding the doctrine of the atonement, of denying the doctrine of the trinity, and of the nonacceptance of the doctrine of the incarnation.

Balfour Falls Off His Bicycle.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—The Conservative leader and first lord of the treasury, A. J. Balfour, appeared in the house of commons with his right arm in a sling. Mr. Balfour, who is an arthritic patient, suffered while riding his bicycle and sprained his right arm and wrist.

MORTON FOR PRESIDENT.

The New York Republican Convention Declares War Him.
New York, March 26.—The Republican convention has finished its labors. The preliminary sparring that has been going on for weeks ended in the final battle last night and the forces that have been dormant for two years kept within the state boundaries, the honor of the presidential independence of the greatest state in the Union, theistic casting the largest number of votes in the electoral college. That independence goes to Governor Levi P. Morton.

The delegates-at-large will be Thomas C. Platt of Troy, Warner Miller of Wyoming, Chauncy M. Davis of New York and Edward Lauterbach.

The alternate will be George Fish of Garrison, Frank S. Williams of Port Henry, C. H. Babcock of Buffalo and Daniel McMillian of Buffalo.

The elector-at-large will be General Benjamin F. Tracy of New York and Edward H. Butler of Buffalo.

The platform of the party is as follows:

The Republicans of New York in convention assembled again declare their firm and unyielding adherence to the doctrine of protection to American industries, protection to the products of the American farm and protection to American labor. We are in favor of a tariff which will provide an income sufficient to meet the expenses of the government honestly and economically administered, at the same time securing honest labor and home capital from foreign countries. We believe in the principles of the other nation which shall give our producers and manufacturers an opportunity to dispose of their surplus products and to obtain articles we desire from those countries on the most advantageous terms.

The agitation for the free coinage of silver, at the ratio of 16 to 1, seriously disturbs all industrial interests, and calls for a clear statement of the Republican party's attitude upon this question, to the end that the trade of this country at home and abroad may again be based on a sound and stable foundation.

We are in favor of a business administration of the government by business men on business principles for the benefit of the suffering business interests of this great people.
