What's Going on in the Various Parishes.

### ST. PATRICK'S CATHEDRAL.

Order of Exercises in the Cathedral During Holy Week.

The following is the order of exercises at the Cathedral during Holy Week:

Palm Sunday—Masses at 6:30, 8:30 and 10:30 a. m. Blessing and distribution of Palm at last Mass. Solemn singing of the Passion according to St. Matthew. The evening service will be for men only and will be the closing exercise of their retreat; it will consist in the recitation of the Rosary, Sermon, Papal Benediction and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. After Benediction the Rev. Father who preached the retreat will bless rosaries and other religious articles, and will invest the corporal.

Masses on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday mornings of Holy Week at 5:30, 6:30 and 8 o'clock.

Office of Tenebrae on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

Holy Thursday.—At 10 o'clock a. m., there will be the consecration of Holy Oil, Pontifical Mass, and procession of the Blessed Sacrament to the Repository. Communion at 6, 7 and 8 o'clock.

Good Friday.—Services will begin at 9 a. m. There will be the Uncovering and Veneration of the Cross, singing of the Passion according to St. John, Procession of the Blessed Sacrament from the Repository to the High Altar, and the Mass of the Pre-Sanctified.

Holy Saturday.—Services will begin at 9 a. m. There will be the blessing of New Fire, of the Paschal Candle, of Baptismal and Holy Water, and Singing of the Prophecies and the Celebration of Solemn High Mass.

Easter Sunday.—Masses at the usual hours for Sunday. At 10:30 a. m., there will be Pontifical High Mass, at the close of which the Papal Benediction will be given. All who are present, and who shall have fulfilled the required condition, will gain a Plenary Indulgence. The morning service will close with the Te Deum sung by the whole congregation.

Confessions will be heard on Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, from 2:30 to 10 p. m., except during the time of public services.

Men's Retreat at the Cathedral.

A man's retreat is in progress at the Cathedral. It began last Sunday, and will continue until Palm Sunday. The retreat is being conducted by Rev. Father Campbell, S. J. It is expected that twelve hundred men will receive the sacraments of penance and Holy Communion.

Going to Europe.

It is reported that Rev. Monsignor De Regge, chancellor of the Diocese, and Rev. Father Stewart, pastor of St. Mary's Church will sail for Europe on an extended tour, immediately after Easter.

ST. BRIDGET'S.

The funeral of Patrick Kelly, an old and respected communicant of this church was held from his late residence, 19 Ward Park, Tuesday morning, at 8:30 o'clock, and from the church at 9 o'clock.

Mr. Kelly's death, which was entirely unexpected, occurred on Friday evening, March 20th, and resulted from an attack of paralysis. He is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Stephen Bauber, wife of Alderman Bauber, Margaret and Anna Kelly, all of this city.

An earnest effort is being made by the young men of St. Bridget's Church to organize a society among the Catholic young men of this city. It is the purpose of those having the matter in charge to perfect an organization similar in nature to the Young Men's Christian Association. Rev. Father Hendrick is the originator of the idea, and a few days ago summoned several of the young men of his parish to the parochial residence, and explained to them his idea in detail.

At his suggestion subscription lists were placed in the hands of a number of young men of the parish, with instructions to circulate them among their young Catholic acquaintances. Returns received thus far are favorable to the success of the experiment. The events of the past few months have demonstrated only too plainly the necessity of a representative body of this character in this city; and is, therefore, hoped that the Catholic young men will, with one accord, co-operate with those seeking to form this society, and by so doing they will assist in filling a long needed want.

**HOLY WEEK SERVICES.**  
New Instructor for St. Bernard's Seminary—Priests for the Diocese.

During Holy Week elaborate services will be conducted at St. Bernard's Theological Seminary. The entire ritual for that season will be carried out excepting the blessing of the baptismal font. The chapel at the seminary has received during the past week a new statue of St. Joseph, the gift of Father Fitzsimons, of New York city.

Shortly after Easter the teaching force will be increased by an additional teacher of history. Father De Maire, formerly librarian at Louvain, has been engaged by Bishop McQuaid to fill the chair. It is expected that the number of priests in the Rochester diocese will be shortly increased by the addition of eleven newly ordained, two of whom will return from Rome, Rev. Dr. Nolan and Rev. Father Gefell. At that time the parish of Mr. Read, which has been filled since the death of Rev. Father Maurice by Father Meekins, of St. Bernard's, will be supplied with a permanent pastor.
