ST. BONIFACE.

The choir of St. Boniface has been making great efforts in rehearsing a Mass of St. Francis, to be rendered on Easter Sunday, with appropriate solos and quartettes, which is expected will be the feature of the Easter music.

Father Ranber will soon begin to prepare the class of first Communicants, as previously announced, for the latter part of June.

The School Sisters of St. Boniface are making preparations for an entertainment to be given by the children of the congregation.

ST. BRIDGET'S.

Mrs. William F. Rampe, directress and organist of St. Bridget's Church choir, has resigned, to take effect May 1st. At a meeting of St. Bridget's Church choir last Sunday evening a committee was appointed at the request of the pastor, Rev. T. A. Hendrick, to co-operate with him in securing a competent director and also a new soprano soloist to succeed Mrs. Rampe.

It is now nearly two years since the O'Rourke Post of the G. A. R. established a new and noble precedent by presenting an American flag to a parochial school. Previous to this commendable departure from the usual course pursued by G. A. R. posts in making presentations of this nature, public schools were the only institutions of learning thought to be worthy of having this honor bestowed upon.

But thanks to the efforts of one catholicity's young and enterprising champions, St. Bridget's school was made the recipient of one of these honors. The occasion was appropriately observed by a grand reception and entertainment given in Cathedral Hall. Patriotic speeches were made and beautiful sentiments responded to by members of the post, irrespective of creed. Shortly after the presentation, Rev. Father Hendrick caused a large flag pole to be erected on the boys' play ground, but the weather was so unsuitable that a view of "old glory" as she floated from her position in space, was made impossible from either of the thoroughfares upon which the school and church are situated. So in answer to the repeated urgings of the boys of the advanced grades, he had a large and beautiful pole erected in front of the school-house on Hand street early last month. Having gratified the wishes of his youthful communicants as to their ambition to give outward display to their patriotic impulses, it is safe to say that "old glory" will float proudly over at least one "little red school house" in our beautiful City of Flowers on every fine day during the ensuing year.

M. L. Hughes has resigned his position as director of the Immaculate Conception Church choir, and with the presentation of the Easter programme to-morrow will retire and will be succeeded by Wm. F. Deaths and Funerals.

Ex-Police Justice John Wegman, one of the oldest and most respected of Rochester's German citizens, died about 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon at the family residence, No. 140 Adams street, at the advanced age of 85 years. Mr. Wegman had not been ill; in fact, he had been in the best of health and spirits until about two weeks ago, when advanced age caused him to consider the advisability of remaining inside for a time, and the disposition he then felt was not considered serious; but which, however, resulted in death.

Mr. Wegman was born in Bavaria, Germany, May 23, 1811, and came to this country in 1830, when he was only 19 years of age, to seek what fortune had in store for him. On arriving in this country he settled in Rochester and lived here until he died. Mr. Wegman held many public positions before his retirement to private life. He was police justice from 1861 to 1865. He was also a member of the Board of Education, being president of that body for two terms. Religious matters were ever of vital importance to him. He, together with the late Bernard Klem, were the prime movers in the erection of St. Joseph's Church. From 1850, the year after the church was built, until his death, he has occupied the same pew in the church.

In 1865 he retired from active business life, although he spent a part of the time for some years after in the practice of law. He is survived by two sons, John B. and Louis A., and by three daughters, Magdalena, Amelia L. and Mrs. P. Grady, all of this city. The funeral was held from the house Wednesday at 9 a. m. and from St. Joseph's Church at 10 o'clock.
