Lively Debate.

WASHINGTON, May 8.—The debate in the senate was of a dramatic and sensational character, recalling the famous Ingalis-Voorhees contest of some years

Amendments adopted exempt from the provisions of the bill persons who come to teach new arts or industries and sailors and employes of vessels navigating the Great Lakes Mr. Mahany's bill provides a comprehensive set of rules for the restriction of immigration and was reported with several minor amendments.

He had a drink with some friends in a saloun situated in the same building and then mounted the stairs in order to attend the meeting of the Nitrate railways. Prior to this meeting Colonel North ate a dezen of oysters and drank a buttle of stout, both of which were sent to him from a neighboring restaurant.
