What is Going on in the Various Parishes.

**CATHEDRAL.**

An eloquent sermon was preached by Rev. Thomas F. Hickey at High Mass last Sunday.

The girls and young women of the Sodality received Holy Communion at the 7:30 Mass last Sunday.

Ellen, eldest daughter of Mary and John Rooney, died Sunday afternoon at the family residence, 16 New York street. She was beloved by all who knew her, and although she was ill for many years she bore her cross patiently until the angel of death called her to that home where pain and sorrow are unknown. The funeral took place Tuesday, at 8:30 a. m., from the house, and at 9 o'clock from the church. Requiem Mass was celebrated by Rev. Father Kieran. She leaves to mourn her loss two sisters and four brothers.

Mary Martin, aged 68 years, widow of the late Michael Martin, died Tuesday at the family residence on the Boulevard. The funeral took place Friday morning from the house at 8 o'clock and at 9 o'clock from St. Patrick's Cathedral.

**HOLY ROSARY.**

An acclion recital and concert was given Thursday evening at Cathedral hall for the purpose of establishing a fund for the completion of the new parochial residence of Holy Rosary church, now in course of erection on Lexington avenue. The hall was attractively draped and the stage was decorated with potted plants and ferns. The funeral was held Monday at 8:30 from the house and at 9 o'clock from Holy Rosary church. Interment was made at Mt. Read.

The death of Frederick Cochrane occurred Tuesday at the residence of his father, Deputy County Clerk James Cochrane, No. 24 Gardiner park. The deceased caught a severe cold last winter, which aggravating a long standing liver complaint, caused his death. Up to about six weeks ago Mr. Cochrane was in the employ of Hyson & Company, plumbers, afterwards occupying the position of court attendant. He was a member of St. Bridget's church on Gorbam street and was connected with the social work of the parish. His mother died eighteen years ago, and, besides his father, he is survived by three aunts, Miss Julia Cochrane of this city, Mrs. Frank G. Wilkin of New York city and Mrs. S. V. Wilkin of Bay City, Mich. Mr. Cochrane was one of the most prominent members of St. Bridget's parish and his death will be mourned by a host of friends.
