**TO USE X RAYS.**  
Company Formed to Exhibit the Rays Throughout the Country.  
The X-Ray company of Chicago is the first corporation organized to turn the cathode ray into profit. The company was incorporated under the laws of New Jersey and received its charter. The capital stock is \$100,000, of which \$25,000 is subscribed and \$9,000 paid in.

The purpose of the company is to show the nature of the rays by means of the radioscope. Rooms similar to the photograph exhibition rooms will be opened in New York, Brooklyn, Boston, Philadelphia, New Orleans, Cincinnati, St. Louis, Denver, San Francisco, and Chicago.  
The radioscope has the Crookes tube and is provided with the fluorescent screen used by Edison, so that pictures are thrown upon a screen instead of a sensitive plate.—Chicago Record.

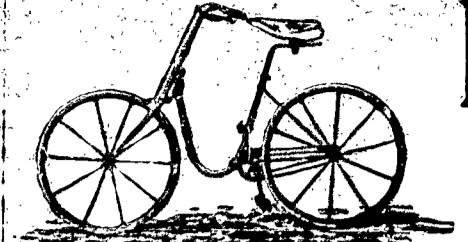

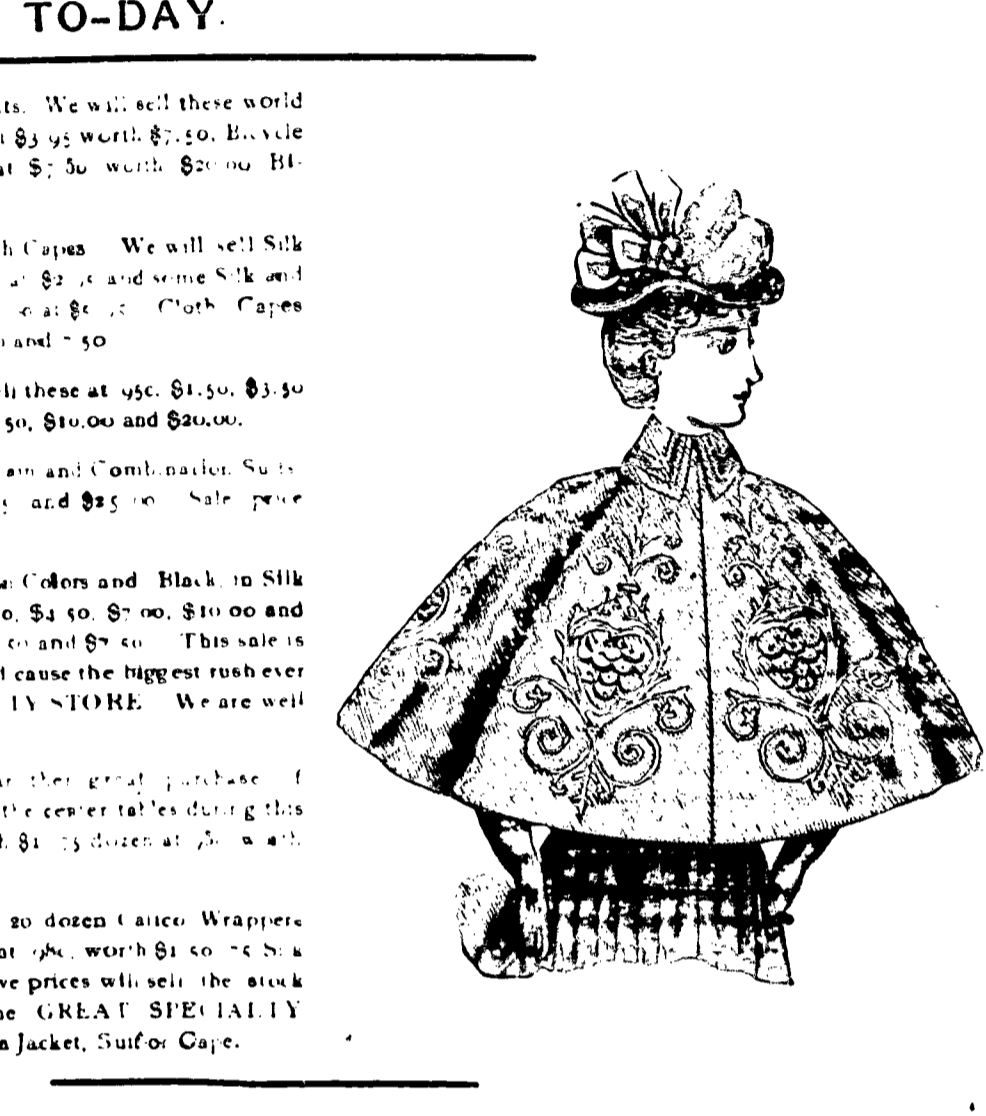
