What is Going on in the Various Parishes.

CATHEDRAL

St. Patrick's cathedral was filled to the doors Sunday afternoon with those who had come to witness the beautiful ceremony of confirmation. There was as a large class of children to be confirmed as well as a few adults in the number. The children occupied seats in the centre aisle, the girls wearing white dresses while the boys were in black. The ceremony began at 4 o'clock. Before administering the sacrament Bishop McQuaid addressed the children on the importance of the sacrament and congratulated them that they had been permitted to receive it. He also exhorted them to persevere in their faith and never be ashamed of their religion.

Those who were to be confirmed then marched up to the altar rail and received the sacrament.

Afterward the bishop again spoke. This time his remarks were not directed so much to those who had received confirmation as to the others in the congregation. He exhorted them to always stand up for their faith and never to be ashamed of it under any circumstances. He then dismissed the congregation with the episcopal benediction.

The bishop was assisted in the ceremony by the priests of the Cathedral and members of the faculty of St. Bernard's seminary.

Miss Minnie Mahoney, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Mahoney, was married Wednesday evening to Edward Clayton Wihors of Chicago. The ceremony was performed by Bishop McQuaid at his residence, and afterwards there was a reception at the residence of the bride's parents, No. 7 Kay terrace, where a wedding supper was served to about sixty. The house was prettily decorated with palms and roses, and an orchestra played the sweetest of music throughout the evening.

The bride and groom left on a late train for the east, where they will spend some time before going to Chicago, where they will make their future home.

Invitations are out for the marriage of M. T. Franey and Miss Susie C. Hogan.

HOLY REDEEMER

Last Sunday a very impressive celebration took place in the church of the Most Holy Redeemer. The children—60 boys and 52 girls—received first Holy Communion. The church was richly decorated with an abundance of flowers, garlands and trees. The happy children were at 9 o'clock escorted to the church by the boys of the Angel Guard, a great number of girls dressed in white, their priests, Rev. T. Oberholzer, rector of the church, and his assistant, Rev. J. Miller, and the Sisters of Notre Dame, who cannot receive enough praise for decorating the House of God so beautifully. In the evening Vespers was sung by Rev. Jules J. Burriok of West Troy. After the Magnificat the communicants renewed their baptismal vows, on which occasion Rev. F. Oberholzer addressed the children in very touching words. The celebration closed with the "Te Deum," in which the faithful present joined with heart and soul.

ST. BONIFACE

Last Sunday St. Boniface's day was observed by special services in St. Boniface's church. Solemn high mass was celebrated at 10:30 o'clock by Rev. Frederick Rauber, assisted by priests from Buffalo and elsewhere. The Knights of St. John attended the service in a body and the church was crowded. On Sunday, June 7th, St. Boniface, the oldest benevolent society in the congregation, received Communion in a body when High Mass was celebrated. The Young Ladies' Sodality also received Communion at early mass. This being the feast of St. Boniface, High Mass at 10 o'clock was attended by an unusually large congregation of members and others who had come to attend the feast. At this mass an interesting sermon was preached by Rev. H. Marckel, S. J., of Canisius College, Buffalo. Rev. Father Marckel has a strong yet clear voice, and being a fluent speaker, held the attention of the congregation listening to an instructive sermon on the life and works of St. Boniface, and on the Blessed Sacrament. The feast of Corpus Christi was celebrated in this parish with procession of the Blessed Sacrament. The school children strewed flowers; following the Sacrament came the officers of the various societies of the congregation. At the ending of the Mass all present joined in the "Te Deum."

ST. BRIDGET'S

Rev. Father O'Connor, who was raised to the dignity of the priest-

hood at the ordination services held at Niagara Falls on Memorial day morning, celebrated Solemn High Mass at this church at 10:30 o'clock last Sunday morning. He was assisted by Rev. Fathers Hogan and Dwyer. Edward Dwyer, nephew of Father Dwyer and a student at St. Andrew's seminary, acted as master of ceremonies. The altar was beautifully decorated by a sweet profusion of cut flowers, potted plants and palms. The church was completely filled by the friends and relatives of the young priest. In accordance with a desire previously expressed by Rev. Father O'Connor the two front pews on the west side of the centre aisle were reserved for those sisters of the order of St. Joseph that wished to be present at the ceremony. Rev. Father McHale, president of Niagara Falls university and a warm friend of the young priest, delivered the eulogy. It was an eloquent and forcible discourse, treating in detail the different duties and obligations of the priest to his flock, and vice versa. At its conclusion Rev. Father McHale pronounced his blessing on the young priest. Rev. Father O'Connor has been assigned a parish in Brooklyn, for which place he will soon leave.

An unusually large class of children will receive first communion at 8:30 o'clock mass Sunday morning. The good Sisters are unusually busy this month, preparing the children for the final examination which takes place the latter part of this month, and it goes without saying that the "blessed school" will again sustain the reputation which she has enjoyed uninterruptedly since her induction into the scholastic world, that is, the honor of graduating the largest class of any school, Catholic or public, in the city of Rochester. Let the untiring energy of Sister Matilda and her corps of able assistants realize the reward they merit.

The new pastoral residence at the corner of Lexington avenue and Finch streets is rapidly approaching completion and Father Van Ness hopes to be able to occupy it in August. The women of the parish have arranged for a festival to be held on the evenings of June 16th and 17th, the proceeds to go toward furnishing the parochial residence. John H. Foley has given them permission to use two vacant stores belonging to him on the southeast corner of Lexington avenue and Finch street, and the festival will be held there.

The newly organized choir under the leadership of J. P. F. McSweeney are improving, and will soon be recognized as one of the best.

ST. MARY'S

The funeral of James L. Archer took place Monday morning at 8:30 o'clock from his residence, 90 South Clinton street, and at 9 o'clock from St. Mary's church. At the church there was a large gathering of relatives and friends of Mr. Archer. Requiem mass was celebrated by Rev. O. P. Farron, assistant rector of the church. The music was rendered by the children's choir, assisted by Miss Katherine Moran. As the procession passed out of the church Mrs. W. F. Rampe sang in an affecting manner "There is a Land Mine Eye Hath Seen."

The floral tributes included pieces from Rochester Lodge, B. P. O. E., the Bartholomew, Genesee, Rochester and Standard brewing companies, Smith, Eggleston, Joseph Schleyer, D. B. Interment was made in Holy Sepulchre cemetery.

The feast of Corpus Christi was celebrated in an appropriate manner at this church last Sunday. The procession of the Blessed Sacrament took place at 7 o'clock, and High Mass and Benediction were at 8:30. In all it is estimated that 3,000 people participated in the procession. First came the school children, the girls of which were dressed in white, wore wreaths and carried roses and were led by Sister Materna. The Knights of St. George acted as an escort of honor and turned out 50 men, followed by Knights of St. Michael, St. Leo and St. Anthony's society in regalia. Rev. Father Schellhorn carried the Blessed Sacrament. At 10 o'clock Thursday morning was celebrated the marriage of Miss Lena Rauber to Mr. William M. Keller, both of this city, and prominent in German social circles. The bride is a daughter of Mr. John Rauber of the firm of Whitmore, Rauber & Vicinus, and the groom is a member of the florist firm of J. B. Keller's Sons.

When the bridal party entered the church the edifice was completely thronged, many persons being unable to gain admission. Elaborate decorations of ferns, palms and cut flowers lent fragrance and beauty to the scene.

To the strains of the wedding march from "Lohengrin" the bridal party passed up the center aisle. First came the ushers, followed by the flower girls, bridesmaids, maids of honor and the bride, escorted by her father. At the altar stood the groom and his best man. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Mathias J. Hargather, pastor of the church, assisted by Rev. Fathers Regenbogen and Neigel. Solemn High Mass was celebrated. During the service a vocal solo was rendered by Miss Caroline O. Gramer.

John Hargather died at the family residence, 75 Orange street, June 5th. He came to this country from Harlingen, Germany, in 1846, and located in Rochester in 1850. He married Victoria Kleisley and has lived at his late residence ever since. He leaves to mourn his loss a wife and three children, Mr. P. Hargather, Mrs. G. H. Stalker and Mrs. W. J. Wegman. The funeral was held from St. Peter and Paul's church last Monday morning at 9 o'clock. Rev. Father Sinaitz celebrated requiem mass. The bearers were Mr. Spreck, Mr. Westinghouse, Mr. Marx, Mr. Thoma, Mr. Smith, Mr. Gravel. Burial was at Holy Sepulchre.

The town festival which was to take place Tuesday night was postponed until the following evening, owing to rain. A very enjoyable time was had.

Confirmation will take place at Corpus Christi on the 17th inst.
