What is Going on in the Various Parishes.

## IMMACULATE CONCEPTION.

Susan Kirk, aged 69 years, 5 months and 1 day, died on Thursday afternoon of last week at the residence of her son, Thomas H. Kirk, 51 Frost avenue. The deceased leaves five sons and four daughters, Thomas H. and Francis B. Kirk of this city; James W. Kirk of St. Louis; Charles P. Kirk of Pittsburg and E. G. Kirk of Buffalo; Katie, Mary and Susie Kirk of this city, and Mrs. W. H. Kelly of Buffalo. The deceased was the widow of the late Thomas Kirk, who held a responsible position on the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. R. from the date of its construction till his death in 1883.

Mrs. Kirk was an old resident of this section, having come from Ireland to Rochester in 1844, when 17 years of age, and married here three years later. For a number of years with her husband she lived at Byron and Bergen, but finally returned to Rochester to end her days at a ripe old age.

Mrs. Kirk was a truly estimable woman in every sense, and esteemed very highly by all who ever knew her. She was a true and devoted wife, an affectionate and careful mother and a kind companion to all who had her acquaintance. She was a sincere and practical Christian and a devout child of the Catholic church. In early days, when churches were fewer than now, her home was always open to priests who needed a place in which to celebrate mass for the benefit of those who were far removed from churches, and for years her house was frequently used for Catholic services, as will be remembered by the old residents of Byron and Bergen.

The funeral took place from her late residence, 57 Frost avenue to Immaculate Conception church on Monday, July 6, and was largely attended. At the church Rev. Father James Gleason celebrated a solemn requiem mass, assisted by Rev. Father Richard O'Brien of Buffalo as deacon and Rev. Father Bernard Gommenginger as sub-deacon. The pall bearers were her five sons and a son-in-law, and her remains were interred in Holy Sepulchre cemetery beside those of her deceased husband and son. Requiescat in pace.

She was singularly strong and active up to a few months ago, when the death of her son, Edward Carey, occurred. Since that time she did not recover from the shock and has been failing bodily when at the end death came peacefully. Mrs. Carey had full possession of all her faculties up to the day of her death. Mrs. Carey was born in the city of Limerick, Ireland, and came to this city 50 years ago, where she has since resided.

Funeral took place Thursday morning at 8:30 from the house and at 9 o'clock from the church. Rev. Father Smeltz, assisted by Rev. Fathers Farron and Gommenginger, celebrated solemn requiem mass. Miss S. Madigan sang an "Ave Maria" at the offertory, and as the funeral was leaving the church she sang "There is a Land Mine Eye Hath Seen."

Besides his wife and children he is survived by his father and two brothers, John A. and George J. Weider, all of this city.

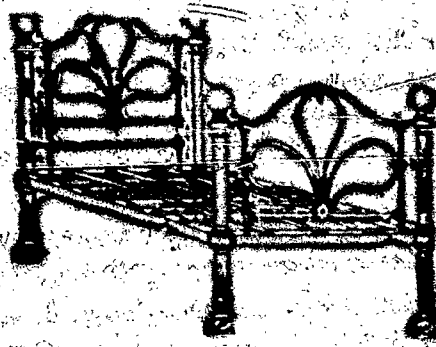

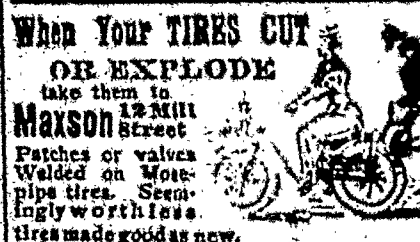
