Prof. Corson's Lectures

Hiram Corson professor of English literature at Cornell, who is delivering a series of lectures this week at Cathedral hall under the auspices of the Sisters of St. Joseph, has a remarkable manner of holding his audience strictly to what he is saying, and his reading presents a very artistic view to a passage. His voice is deep and musical. He is one of the greatest Browning scholars in America, which is perhaps accounted for from the fact that he was a personal friend of Robert Browning.

He has been giving two lectures each day, one at 9 o'clock and one at 3:30 o'clock. In the first of the courses he took up "The Revival of English Poetry, and Wordsworth." In the second he dwelt on "Coleridge." Tuesday he began a series of four lectures on Lord Tennyson, of which the first was "Tennyson's Relations to His Time." In the second he explained "In Memoriam." In the third he commenced a review of Tennyson's "The Idylls of the King," and in the fourth of this series, and sixth of the whole number, he continued his theme and interpreted the difficult passages so as to make clear the mystic meaning of them. The lecturer took up each idyll separately and read it slowly, explaining the time of each event and the result of each character. This made the most difficult passage so simple that even a child could understand them. He also brought out the religious connection of each part and the religious representations embodied in the whole story.

In his lecture Thursday morning he dwelt at length on "The Artistic Purpose of the Rhyme Scheme," and read one of Mrs. Browning's famous compositions, "The Rhyme of the Duoboss May." The institute will close this afternoon.
