The decoration of the Order of Christ, just conferred by the Pope upon M. Lefebve, late French Ambassador at the Vatican, is the highest distinction of the kind in the gift of His Holiness and one very rarely conferred on diplomata. Its possessor must be an uncompromising Catholia

Only two pastors in one hundred and eleven years, with no break in the church services, is the record of the village of Vallon sur Gee in the department of the Sarthe, France. Abbe Pineau held the place from 1785 to 1842, when Abbe Paris, who is still the parish priest, succeeded him.

Mary Alacoque, whose supernatural experiences gave rise to the Ordar of the Sacred Heart, having now been dead over two hundred years. is a candidate for canonization. Oardinal Perraud has taken to Rome a petition sigued by 270 Cardinals, Archbishops and Bishops begging the Pope to hasten on the necessary procedures

Cardinal Vaughan, since his appointment 28 Cardinal Manning's successor in London, has employed a number of Boman Catholic laymen as lecturers in the public parks and open spaces. The new movement is under the direction of the Cardinal's prother. The lecturers are men of ducation, and are for the most part frawn from the legal and other pro-Tessions.
