The telephone line between Vienna and Trieste is believed to be one of the largest European lines now in operation. It covers a distance of 506 kilometers, or rather more than 314 miles.

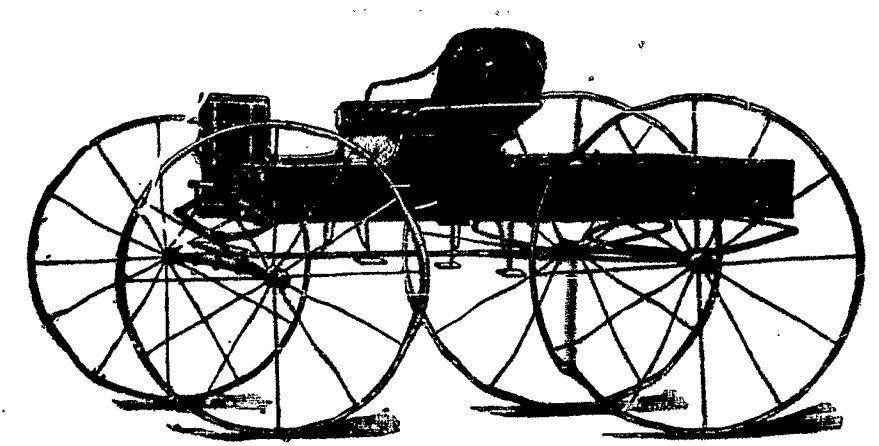

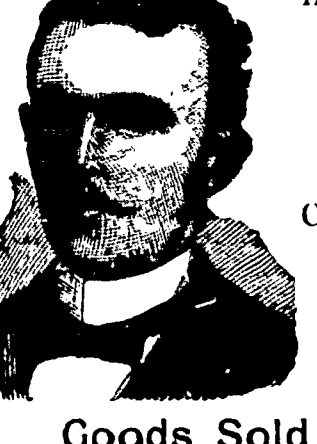
