

## CITY PARISH NEWS.

Interesting Budget of Happenings Gathered by Our City Reporters.

### CATHEDRAL.

The retreat for the Sodality of the Blessed Virgin will open Thursday, the 16th inst., and close on the following Sunday.

Miss Elizabeth McCort and John Welch were married at the Cathedral Tuesday morning by Rev. Father Kiernan. Mr. and Mrs. John Cashman were the witnesses to the ceremony. The bride and groom have gone on a trip to New York.

Commencing Sunday, October 11, there will be a double course of sermons at St. Patrick's Cathedral. The "Sacraments" will be the topic for the 10:30 mass, and the "Commandments" for the vespers at 7:30 p. m. Rev. E. J. Hanna, D. D., J. P. Brophy, A. E. Breen, D. D., and A. B. Meehan, D. D., will preach on the sacraments of baptism and confirmation and the general sacraments. Revs. T. F. Hickey, A. A. Hughes, M. J. Nolan, D. D., and Emil Gefell will take up the subject of "Commandments."

The work on the extension of the Cathedral has been delayed on account of the lack of cut stone. The sacristy has been torn down and the construction of the chapel and new vestry is proceeding as fast as could be reasonably expected. It is the intention to renovate the entire interior of the Cathedral next year. It is expected that the chapel and new sacristies will be ready for use by January next.

The corner-stone of St. Stanislaus new school at the corner of Hudson avenue and Norton street was laid by Bishop McQuaid last Sunday afternoon. The bishop was assisted by Revs. F. Oberholzer, Father Miller, J. Boppe, J. Netzel, Father Fisher, A. Smeltz and the pastor, T. Smolinski. The school will be a two story brick building and cost about \$14,000.

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
