CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—While the Demo cratic parade in honor of the arrival of Mr. Bryan in Chicago was passing the corner of Michigan avenue and Monroe attest several eggs were thrown at it by young students in the Metropolitan Bus iness college. None of the eggs came near Mr. Bryan or his wife, and neither of them knew of the episode until after the parade was over.

The Cook County Marching club, which was escorting Mr. Bryan, received the bombardment, and several Prince Albert coats and glossy black ties were splantered with yellow. One or two eggs struck the sidewalk, and the crowd was decorated ac cordingly.

Later in the afternoon a delegation from

the Cook county Democracy descended on the college with every symptom of hostility and demanded that the students who had done the throwing be turned over to it. They held possession of the college for a time and finally left without learning who the miscreants were. The police had no better success, and Mr. Powers, the owner of the building, who is also presi dent of the college, said that he did not know who had thrown the eggs, although he admitted they came from students in his institution. He was much distressed by the occurrence and declared if he knew Who had done the work he would have no hesitancy in turning them over to the po-

Mr. Powers offered a reward of \$500 for the apprehension of the person or persons who threw the eggs.

"I would be very glad to hear that the police have acrested those who insuled Mr. Bryan," said Chairman Mark Hanna of the national Republican committee Whatever may have been their motive the act was a most disgraceful one and deserves the condemnation of every right minded person. I hope the authorities will investigate the case fully and properly punish the guilty ones. The Repub lican management have no sympathy with the people who engage in business of this

While the crowds were dispersing after the Bryan demonstration at the depot, the sidewalk in front of 191 Canal street gave way and nearly 100 people were precipitated into the basement, a distance of 19 feet. Many received slight injuries.

EGG THROWERS RELEASED.

Mr. Bryan Desired It, Though Thei

Families Declined to Interfere, CHICAGO, Oct. 29.—Chauncey Foster and L. J. Hanchett, two of the four students of the Metropolitan Business college accused of having thrown eggs at W. J. Bryan and Mrs. Bryan during the parade Tuesday, were arrested by Detectives Mc-Caffrey and Fay. The two boys are the sons of well-to-do south side families, each 17 years old.

Later in the day Foster and Hanchett confessed to Chief of Police Badenoch that they had thrown the eggs.

Thomas Gahan, chairman of the Demo cratic county committee, received the following letter from Mr. Bryan regarding the matter:

AUDITORIUM HOTEL, Chicago, Oct. 28. DEAR MR. GARAN -I wish you would ask for the release of the boys arrested for throwing the eggs. I am sure it was an act of thought lessness, and their arrest has doubtless been sufficient lesson to them and to others. Yours truly, W. J. BRWAN.

Late in the afternoon the chief of police was compelled to release the two youn prisoners as, after Mr. Bryan had written his letter asking for their release, it was evident that there would be no prosecution if the prisoners were arraigned.

Before the prisoners had been released word was received from both of their families saying that the law could take its course as no part in the defense would be taken by any of their relatives.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—Senator Butler. chairman of the Populist national committee, before leaving here for Indiana, authorized the publication of the following signed statement concerning Watson's letter of acceptance:

Deings at McKinley's Home. CANTON, O., Oct. 28. - There never was a more inspiring scene than that witness ed on the public square of Canton. Thou sands of people, including the ladies from Norwalk, marry of the visitors from Mas sachusetts, West Virginia, Maryland and Ohio. gathered in front of the court house and sang patriotic melodies, intersperse with music frequent cheers and waving of flags, banners and campaign parasols with which the women's delegation were

supplied. "Yankee Doodle," "The "America." Star Spangled Banner" followed one an other. Nor were "Dixle" and "Maryland My Maryland," forgotten. Both were sung as justily and patriotically as was "John Brown's Body" and "Marching

Through Georgia." The affair was entirely impromptu and ended with "Home, west Home," from both the bands and the wast audience which had gathered, first as spectators, and then as participators in that great patriotic concert.

Distribution of Electors.

CHICAGO, Oct. 26. - The Republicans have a straight electoral ticket in 44 of the 45 states, having effected a fusion in only one-Texas-with the Middle-of-the road Populists and gold standard Demo-

The Democrats have a straight electoral ticket in only 15 of the states, having effected a fusion with the Populists and silver Republicans in 29 of the others. conclusion not having yet been reached in the remaining one. In some cases the Populists and silver Republicans in dorsed the Democratic electoral ticket. but in others concessions of electors were made to them for their support of Bryan and Sewall. In two states, Oregon and South Dakota, the Democrats indorsed the Populist electoral ticket.

Covington Makes Amends. COVINGTON, Ky., Oct. 97 .- Odd Fellows hall was crowded by men exclusively without distinction of party, to express indignation at the insult offered to Secretary Carlisle in that hall last Thursday night. The chairman chosen was Hon. Harvey Meyers, one of the electors on the Democratic W. J. Bryan ticket.

The resolutions, which were unanimous ly adopted, condemn the outrage to Mr. Carlisle in unmeasured terms, disclaim the responsibility of Covington for that conduct, and call upon the city government to detect and punish the perpetra-

The same is true with the registration which closed in the Ohio cities Saturday night. The increase far exects all increase in population and the percentage is so much higher than in any other Just since registration was provided for that it is the general opinion that the vote in these two states will be phenomenally large. This belief is based on the fact that many who laye not voted in former years have registered this year.

CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—Mark A., Hanna has received the final reports of the chairmon of the state committees of lows Ken-tucky, Minnesots, Michigan and Tenrice All the state chairmen claim that their states were safely for McKinley. According to the reports in Mr. Hanna's keeping the five states named will go for McKinley by the following pluzalities: Iowa, 50,000; Kentucky, 15,000 to 20,000; Minnesofa, 20,000 to 40,000; Michigan, 15, 000; Tennessee, 15,000.

Rochester Adopts Voting Machines. ROCHESTER, Oct. 23, - The common council has decided to use the Myers bal; cort, leaving by the next train. lot machine in this city for the coming election. Seventy machines will be used and it is expected that the result of the election in this city will be known within 80 minutes after the polls close.

Errson Commission Adjourns. ALBANY, Oct. 29.—The state prison com-mission has concluded its labors by disapproving of some portions of the plans for the new Tombs prison in New York city. The members think that the corridors

should be wider and the colls constructed of steel instead of granite as provided for in the specifications. President Stewart was appointed to confer with Commisconer of Corrections Wright of New York, relative to the desired changes. He will report at the next meeting.

ALBANY, Oct. 29.-Private Secretary Cole of Governor Morton's office was asked if the ramor that the governor would appoint Jacob Worth county clerk of Kings county was true.
