**NEWS FROM IRELAND.**

Interesting Paragraphs Concerning the Doings of Our Friends Across the Ocean.

Gathered from All Parts of the Emerald Isle.

**CONNAUGHT**

**GALWAY.**

A bailiff, named Thomas Faherty, has been remanded at the Clifden petty sessions for an assault committed on a countryman named Pearl, on the streets of Clifden. The assault was of a most serious character. Pearl being in hospital, unable to attend the court and actually unable to make his deposition, owing to extreme weakness and loss of blood.

**LEITRIM**

Messrs. W. P. J. Conolly and F. W. D. Mitchell, representing the Irish Loan Fund Board in Dublin, have been recently in Carrick-on-Shannon, holding an inquiry into the working of the Mohill, Leitrim, Drumshanbo, and Drumshambo Loan Fund Societies, which are all controlled from the central office in Dublin Castle.

**MAYO.**

On the Feast of Our Lady of Mercy, the ceremony of the reception of a man took place in the beautiful chapel of the Convent of Mercy, Ballinrobe. The ceremony was performed by the Very Rev. Canon Rosayne. The young lady who had the happiness of receiving the white veil was Miss Annie Barry, now known in religion as Sister Mary of Mercy.

**ROSCOMMON.**

The tenant farmers on the Aughrane property, at Ballygar, have had a lively time of it recently. Some of them had their crops seized for the Snook Drainage Tax, which was not paid until a sale of the crops was effected by the sheriff's representative—the purchaser being an imported "emergencyman." The tenants were not clear of the first difficulty when a second one appeared in the shape of a process-server, who showered ejectment writs wholesale, for the Bagot Trustees, on the poor tenants, some of whom owe but one half-year's rent and the running half-gale. For unfortunate tenants who are thus threatened with ruin the outlook is sad in the extreme.

**SLIGO.**

At the last conjoint examination in Ireland, by the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons, Master R. Q. Vernon, third son of Mr. W. T. Vernon, Secretary of the Sligo grand jury, passed with honors, obtaining fourth place and the record marks of 90 per cent in Latin Dictation and Euclid.

**LEINSTER**

**CARLOW.**

At the last meeting of the Guardians of the Carlow Union, a letter to the Treasury, asking a remission or reconsideration of the penalty of £15 15s., sought to be extorted by the Board of Works, in consequence of the guardians, through illness of the clerk of the union, having exceeded by ten days the limit prescribed for the repayment of a seed loan of £315 1s. 6d., was approved of and forwarded. Instead of the expected remission a letter was returned from the law agent of the Treasury peremptorily demanding payment of the penalty, with additional costs.

**DUBLIN.**

The death is announced of Mr. Patrick Dolan, at his residence, 51 South Great George's street, Dublin. Mr. Dolan was for many years a member of the Licensed Grocers and Vintners' Association, and had on several occasions been invited to go forward for municipal honors.

**KILDARE.**

At Naas quarter sessions, Edward Glere, theatrical proprietor, was put forward on bail charged with having fraudulently obtained 17s. 6d. from Squadron Quartermaster-Sergeant Harrison, First Royal Dragoons, at the Curragh, the same being the property of Mr. R. R. Lewis. The affair proved a case of mistaken identity and Mr. Glere was discharged.

**KILKENNY.**

The new church at Coolaghmore was dedicated to the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin by Most Rev. Abra-

ham Browne, D.D., Bishop of Ossory, with great solemnity. A very large congregation was present.

**KING'S.**

Richard Bull, sub-sheriff of King's county, accompanied by bailiffs and a force of police, proceeded to the townland of Lemonaghan to carry out four evictions on the estate of Mr. Samuel Alexander, of Killester Abbey, Artane, county Dublin. On reaching the locality the sheriff's party proceeded to the holding of James Harrington, who, with his wife and seven children, were evicted. The same process was repeated in turn at the residence of Walsh, Connally, and the two Bigney's, and the lands having been cleared of the few head of stock found on them, the sheriff and his satellites, with their escort, returned.

**LONGFORD.**

At the last meeting of the Ballymahon Board of Guardians, during the discussion on the refusal of the inhabitants of Black Island to pay the seed potato rate, the clerk, Mr. P. McGreevy, said that during the preceding week he had received a visit from Head Constable White, Ballymahon, with reference to the remarks the chairman, Mr. James Ross, made when the subject was last under discussion, to the effect that he (Mr. Ross) considered the inhabitants of Black Island a "capital fine people," and that they ought to be praised when they can keep the Queen's sheriff out. The head constable wanted to know if Mr. Ross were serious when he gave utterance to those remarks. The clerk said he informed his visitor that the remarks were made in a joking manner. The chairman now said that, of course, he was only joking. This a police censorship, with a vengeance.

**MEATH.**

Mr. W. Chambers met with a serious accident at Slane, whilst assisting in the casting of a horse for an operation. The animal fell on Mr. Chambers, causing dislocation of the knee joint, with other injuries.

**WEXFORD.**

At the last meeting of the Wexford Corporation resolutions were unanimously adopted commencing Coastguard Cowling for his bravery during the late storm, he being the means of saving an entire crew.

**MUNSTER**

**CLARE.**

At a recent meeting of the Ennis Town Commissioners, Mr. M. A. Scanlan in the chair, on the motion of Mr. P. J. Linnane, a petition was unanimously approved of, to be forwarded to the Lord Lieutenant, praying for his favorable consideration for the cases of seven prisoners from the county of Clare who are now undergoing penal servitude for offences committed during the late agrarian trouble. These men, five of whom were from Tuils, have now spent six years in jail.

**CORK.**

The fishing smack "Sir Richard Hall," which was supposed to have foundered in the recent gale, turned up all right in Baltimore Bay.

All the tenants on the estate of Mr. Robert McBride of Hamburg, Germany, have just decided on purchasing their holdings under the Land Purchase Act. The estate is situated at Dungourney, near Middleton.

**KERRY.**

An old man named Kennedy died in Dingle Hospital from the effects of injuries received on the Trales and Dingle Railway while returning home from Dingle in a donkey cart.

The tourist traffic to Killarney has almost totally stopped on account of the weather.

**LIMERICK.**

Mr. James F. Bannatyne, D. L., has intimated to Most Rev. Dr. O'Dwyer, Bishop of Limerick, that he will subscribe £2,000 to the artisans' dwellings scheme for Limerick. In addition to this munificent gift the firm of Messrs. Bannatyne have subscribed £1,000.

**FIPPERRY.**

The death is announced of the ejected tenant, Mr. Henry Meagher, of Killybeg, near Malinbeg. The sad event recalls the old fighting days of the Land League. Mr. Meagher was evicted for non-payment (on principle) of £500. A very moderate reduction would have satisfied him, but this was denied and a land-

grabbing tenant put on the land at a rental of one-fifth the amount. After waiting seventeen long years to return to the home of his childhood, Mr. Meagher died of a broken heart.

**WATERFORD.**

The sea wall at Tramore, which stood the force of the ocean so bravely for close upon half a century, failed to withstand the waves of the recent storm. There are now two large gaps in the wall.

**ULSTER**

**ANTRIM.**

A young man named McWilliams was recently admitted to the Royal Hospital, Belfast, suffering from severe lacerations to both his arms. The injuries were caused by his arms being caught in the rollers of a hydraulic mangle, while at work in the Union Finishing Works, Durham.

**ARMAGH.**

The terrible weather, which has prevailed almost without intermission for five or six weeks, has had a most disastrous effect on the crops in many places throughout Armagh.

**DERRY.**

A man named William Waley, aged seventy years, and residing in Castledawson, recently attempted to commit suicide by cutting his throat with a razor. Waley was for nearly twenty years engaged as porter at the Castledawson railway station. Later he had been unable to find employment, and had been noticed to be in a deplorable state for some time past.

**DONEGAL.**

At the last meeting of the "Hugh Tuthill" Branch of the Irish National Federation, Ballyshannon, a letter was read from the Most Rev. Dr. O'Donnell, Bishop of Raphoe, in acknowledgment of resolutions adopted by the branch relative to the late National Convention.

**DOWN.**

News has been received in Newry of the promotion of Superintendent Denis McCabe, at the Trinidad police, to the charge of constabulary headquarters at Port of Spain, in the West Indies.

**FERMANAGH.**

At Enniskillen petty sessions, John McClintock, who resides near Tempo, summoned Bernard Dwinan for assaulting him near the new cemetery, Enniskillen. The magistrates dismissed the case peremptorily.

**TYRONE.**

The bazaar in aid of the new church at Omagh was opened recently in the courthouse. Right Rev. Monsignor McNamee, Omagh, opened the bazaar, and thanked all who had assisted them in the matter, especially their American friends.

Mgr. Azarian, Armenian Patriarch of Constantinople, in a letter which has been received in Cologne, states that the Armenian Christians are dying in masses of hunger. The starving are crying to him for bread and he hasn't a sou in the house. The Cardinal Archbishop of Cologne has forwarded several hundred pounds contributed by his people, and in accordance with a resolution adopted at the Bishops' conference in Fulda, a collection on behalf of the Armenians is to be made in all the Catholic churches throughout Germany. Mgr. Altmayer, Prefect Apostolic of Mesopotamia, estimates the number of Armenians who have been massacred or have died of wounds and hunger at no less than 300,000.

The White Fathers have suffered a serious loss through the death of Bishop Guillermeau, Vicar Apostolic of North Nyanza, who was recently consecrated at Rubaga by Bishop Hanken, Vicar Apostolic of the Upper Nile. Mgr. Guillermeau had just made his first visitation of the vicariate and confirmed over twelve thousand neophytes, but despite the equatorial sun he had often to walk knee deep through snow, and at other times suffered from starvation, subsisting altogether on a limited supply of bananas. He returned to Rubaga quite exhausted and died in the arms of his missionaries.

Rev. Michael J. Doody of St. Peter's Church, Cambridge, has been appointed chancellor and secretary of the archdiocese of Boston, in place of Rev. Richard Neagle, who has been appointed permanent rector of the Immaculate Conception Church, Malden, to fill the vacancy made by the death of Rev. Father Flatley.

**Pittsford.**

Mrs. Hannah Sullivan and Agnes, Convent of the Rochester State hospital visited friends in town Sunday.

Patrick Lannon and family visited Rochester on Sunday last.

Mrs. John Sullivan, jr., of Rochester, was in town last week.

McKinley carried Pittsford by 82 majority.

**Coldwater.**

The blessing of the graves took place last Sunday after high mass.

**Macedon.**

On Tuesday, Nov. 3d, Rt. Rev. Bishop McQuaid confirmed a class of 30 boys and 13 girls in St. Patrick's church. The day was beautiful, and a large crowd turned out to do honor to our Rt. Rev. Bishop, and his ministrations to the children were listened to with close attention. At the conclusion of his remarks the class took the pledge until each had attained the age of twenty-one years. Rev. Fathers Cadyre of Fairport and Hartley of Palmyra assisted our pastor, Rev. Father Holmes.

The ladies of the village served dinner on election day, the proceeds to go to the suffering Armenians.
