A Plenary Indulgence is granted to those who, having made a good confession and communion, visit the church where the devotion of the Forty Hours is celebrated, and spend some time in prayer before the most Holy Sacrament. The Indulgence cannot be gained more than once during the three days' Exposition of the **Blessed Sacrament.** 

A Partial Indulgence of ten years and ten times forty days is granted once each day to those who, during the Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, visit the church and there pass some time in prayer.

The Plenary Indulgence is made appliable to the souls in Purgatory, provided that the church be visited each day of the Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament.

All the altars of the church are declared privileged during the exposition

Where permission to celebrate the Devotion of the "Forty Hours" has been granted, its solemnization must be observed at the appointed time, to gain the Indulgence.


