It is stated that the English Education Department have at length decided to recognize the teachers' certificates issued by the Irish Education Board. This decision will render Irish teachers eligible for vacancies in English schools, a concession that has heretofore been denied them, though the standard of Irish examinations has been higher than the English average.

A conference of representatives of public bodies from twenty-seven out of thirty-two counties of Ireland was held on Monday, February 22nd, in the Mansion House, Dublin, to consider the Financial Relations Commission report. The Earl of Mayo presided. It was decided to call a convention, representing all Ireland, at an early date, in Dublin, to arrange for the future conduct of the movement. A resolution was passed stating that there was no justification for the appointment of a further commission to inquire into particular matters reported upon by the Royal Commission.
