Interesting Budget of Happenings Gathered by Our City Reporters

ST. BONIFACE

The feast of Corpus Christi was celebrated most appropriately at this church last Sunday. The beautiful altar was tastefully decorated with flowers and palms. Rev. Father L. E. Lapham of St. Bernard's seminary celebrated solemn mass. He was assisted by Rev. Mathias Hau of North Carolina as deacon, and Aloysius G. Meyer of St. Bernard's seminary as sub-deacon. The rector of the parish, Rev. Father Rauber, acted as master of ceremonies.

Father Lapham was first impressed with the truth of the Catholic church while visiting the grand cathedral of Cologne, and a few years later he was received into the church in a small village of Northern Germany. He deemed it proper, therefore, to sing his second high mass in the church of St. Boniface, who is the patron saint of Germany. Rev. Father Rauber preached an eloquent and instructive sermon suitable for the occasion. His text was taken from the epistle of the day: "Take, and eat, this is my body which shall be delivered for you, this do for the commemoration of me."

The mass ended, the customary procession and sacramental benediction took place. Rev. Father Lapham then gave the people his sacerdotal blessing, which was followed by the whole congregation singing the "Te Deum."

In the afternoon the faithful again filled the church to assist at solemn vespers and benediction.

T. MICHAEL'S

A large class of children will receive first communion to-morrow. Solemn high mass will be celebrated at 8 o'clock, when the little children will receive the Bread of Life for the first time.

Corpus Christi was celebrated in an imposing manner in this church last Sunday. Children's mass was said at 6.30, after which the procession formed on the grounds of the church. First came the acolytes, bearing cross and tapers, after which followed the Sanctissimum, borne by Rev. F. P. Scheid, assisted by M. J. Hargather and Rev. J. P. Schellhorn. The Knights of St. George, in full uniform, acted as escort. Then followed the Knights of St. Michael in full uniform, and after these St. Leo's and St. Anthony's societies in their respective regalia, the different sodalities and the school children, and after these the faithful not belonging to an organization, numbering in all at least 3,000 souls. The grand procession moved through the spacious parochial garden, where three altars had been erected, at each of which the benediction with the Blessed Sacrament was given. After those who had taken part in the procession had entered the church solemn high mass was celebrated by Rev. Father Scheid, assisted by Rev. Fathers Hargather and Schellhorn.

The two new stained glass windows referred to in last week's JOURNAL have been placed in position and were exposed to view for the first time last Sunday. They are beautiful works of art, a description of which will be given later.

Rev. Father John P. Schellhorn, the assistant at this church, celebrated his Saint's Day, the feast of St. John the Baptist, last Thursday. The evening before he was serenaded by the choir of the church, and Thursday morning high mass was celebrated in honor of the day according to the intention of the school children. Father Schellhorn received congratulations from many people upon this occasion, especially from members of the clergy.

Wegman, the superintendent of the money order department at the postoffice, left for Erie, Pa., Wednesday evening, to attend the nineteenth annual international convention of the Knights of St. John, which convened Thursday morning. Capt. Wegman represents the Knights of St. George in the convention.

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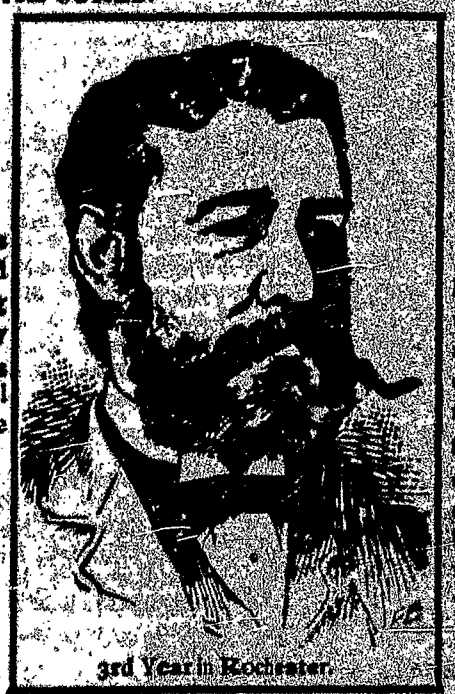
