ULSTER.

ANTRIM.

The King of the Belgians recently visited Belfast, and went by rail to Dublin.

Mr. John Erskine, Belfast, hat and cap manufacturer, has offered through the Lords of the Treasury, a site for a royal residence, free of rent forever, about seven miles from Belfast, overlooking Belfast Lough.

John Dillon, M. P., chairman of the Davitt, M. P., the father of the Land League, will arrive in Belfast on June 17 and address an open-air demonstration of Nationalists on the Falls road the same evening.

At the annual meeting of the Belfast Irish Parliamentary party, and Mr. Michael Young Ireland Society, M. McCartan, M. P., presiding, following were elected to office: The chairman was elected president; Vice-Presidents, Patrick Dempsey, James McAnan, James Millar, George J. Wake, Jr., Lurgan; John Byrne and John Duffin, Treasurer; P. Flanagan, Secretary; Joseph Develin, who declined to accept office, and Mr. J. Donovan was unanimously chosen. Mr. Develin will continue his great services to the organization with which his name has been closely identified during many years.

Edward McDonald, messenger in Messrs. Eason & Sons, Limited 17 Donegal street, Belfast, June 1, was underneath the hoist, pulling a rope another boy was assisting him, but fortunately for himself he had only one foot in the space underneath. Both boys were pulling the rope, and as the first landing, about ten feet from the ground, a man was hauling up the hoist, which had a load of over a hundredweight on it. When the hoist was eight feet above the boys it suddenly fell, and McDonald was instantly crushed to death. When the heavy weight was lifted from the unfortunate boy he was perfectly lifeless, with his head shapeless. His skull was terribly fractured, his jaw shattered, teeth knocked out and neck broken.

CLARE.

Mrs. Alicia Seymour of Ennis Medical Hall, Ennis, was found dead in her room on Sunday. She had just returned from Lahinch.

Robert Wogan Suddert of Cullane House, Kilteebob, died May 28, at Arnamoore Lodge, Spanishpoint, aged 31 years. He was a nephew of Tom Steele "Head Pacifier" during the historical struggle for Catholic emancipation in Ireland.

The body of a young man named Shannon was lately found in the Killyrath reservoir that supplies the town of Miltoon-Mulboy with water. To add to the terrible shock to the family a sick brother has since died, and the sister is in a precarious condition. Much regret is felt for Mr. Shannon in the terrible affliction. The people who have been using the water were horrified, as the remains had been in the reservoir three weeks.

Thomas Ronan of Ballynacally, West Clare, was released from Maryborough Prison May 30, after undergoing seven years' penal servitude. He had been sentenced at the Clare Winter Assizes in 1883, to ten years for firing at Peter Scanlan. He seemed in good health, but commenting on his treatment, said it could not be worse than it was in Mountjoy. He met Hartigan, Brogan, Hurst, Moloney, and other Clare prisoners, all of whom, with the exception of Moloney, are in good health. The latter is invalid. Ronan says he is innocent of the crime for which seven of the best years of his life were passed in a living tomb.

The Christian Brothers of Killyrush and the pupils recently presented an address to Rev. Daniel Courtney for a great many years curate in Killyrush, and now has the pastoral charge of Coolmeer. The interesting event came off in the schoolroom. A number of the towns people were present, in addition to 200 pupils. After the song, "Old Familiar Faces" had been sung by fifty pupils, the Rev. Brother O'Donnoghue superior, read the address, expressing appreciation of Father Courtney's high qualities, gratification at his promotion, and regret at his departure. The attendant souvenir consisted of a beautifully bound copy of "The History of Mountjoy College." The Rev. D. Courtney acknowledged the presentation in appropriate terms and paid a high compliment to the work of the Christian Brothers. Mr. J. C. Mahony, B. L. having briefly spoken, and a physical drill display by the junior boys having been given, the proceedings concluded. The address was illuminated by Miss Fahy, artist, Killyrush.

CORK.

An old man, named Daniel O'Riordan, was accidentally killed at Shadbill a few days ago. A swarm of bees lodged on a tree growing over a fence, and O'Riordan tried to dislodge them. He got on the fence and shook one of the branches of the tree to frighten them off. While thus engaged he slipped and fell, and his head coming violently in contact with a large stone, he was killed on the spot.

The poor fellow savagely attacked his mother and brother, and would have killed them had help not arrived and overpowered him.

In consequence of the general reduction of the Royal Irish Constabulary the police stations at Killybeg, Tuilaghan and Anaghmore, Leitrim, and at Gravisks, Roscommon, have been discontinued.

It was reported at the Mohill police barracks a couple of days ago that a moonlight outrage had occurred Tuesday night, shots having been fired, about 10:30 P. M., adjacent to the house of Mr. Ben. Lloyd, of Anaghmore. The police authorities are making diligent inquiries. The police barracks at Anaghmore has just recently been broken up, and the shooting out was done by the police, who had a "mass" of it.
