Old Church to No Abandon

A report is current that the diocesan authorities are about to establish a new parish on the west side in New York city, to embrace the territory lying between Forty-second and Fifty-sixth or Fifty-seventh streets, and from Tenth or Eleventh avenue to the Marth river.

According to the best information obtainable in the matter, the establishment of the new parish will mean the abandonment of one of the oldest of the down town churches, St. Andrew's, at City Hall place and Duane street, the lower part of the town. This is one of the most venerable of Bonnas Catho-He churches on Manhattan Island, and in its early history was one of the most successful. In late years, however, the members of its congregation, with their families, have removed from the neighborhood in large numbers, crowded out

by business houses. It has been estimated that the property of St. Andrew's church is worth about \$500,000. If it can be sold at that figure, the proceeds will be more than sufficient to erect the new church building up town and furnish all the facilities required in modern church work.—New York Times.
