JAMES C. BARRY DEAD.

Sudden Death of a Well Known Rochester Business Man.

James C. Barry died Thursday night at St. Mary's Hospital as the result of an operation for appendicitis, aged 42 years. Mr. Barry was taken to the hospital a week ago and an operation was successfully performed, but a sudden change occurred that resulted in his death.

Mr. Barry was one of the best-known business men in the city, and had formed a large circle of friends, to whom the announcement of his sudden death will be a great shock. He had been a member of St. Mary's church ever since taking up his residence in this city, and was prominently identified with the interests of that body. He was also prominent in social circles, being a member of the Union Club, the Knights of Columbus, Ancient Order of Hibernians, the C. M. B. A. and other social and fraternal organizations.

He leaves a wife and four children.

Passed Peacefully Away at the Carney Hospital in Boston Friday Morning.

Rev. J. P. Stewart, pastor of St. Mary's church, died Friday morning at 7 o'clock at Carney hospital, in Boston, Mass., of cancer of the tongue and heart disease, after an illness which confined him to his bed for ten days.

Father Stewart's remains will be brought home at once and they will lie in state in the church Sunday afternoon. The funeral services will be held Monday morning at 10 o'clock.
