Death of the superior of Order of Mercy. Reverend Mother Mary Camillus, superior of the Order of Mercy in Rochester, died Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock in the Convent of Mercy on South street, in the 68th year of her life.

Reverend Mother Camillus had spent 40 of those years in the Order of Mercy. She was nine times chosen superior of her order, and the whole number of years passed in that post was twenty-nine.

Her life was intimately bound up in the Lord. She was gentle to all those under her, and was obeyed by the members of her community because they respected her moral worth and loved her as a loving mother.

Her life was hidden to the world, but known to God. All that can make the sad event of death less terrible is verified in the death of this departed nun.

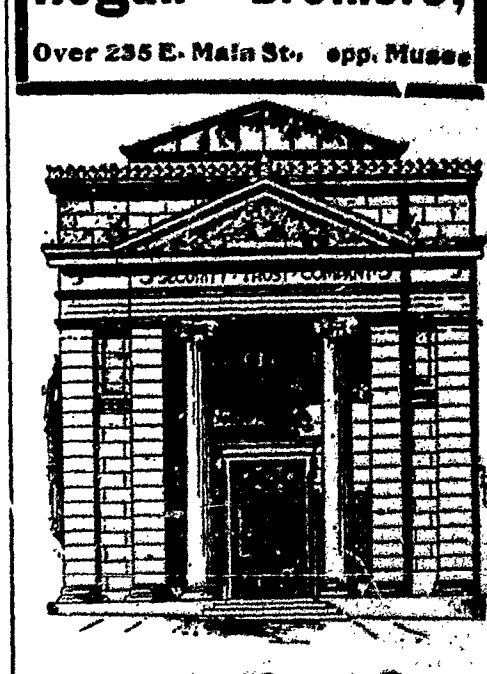

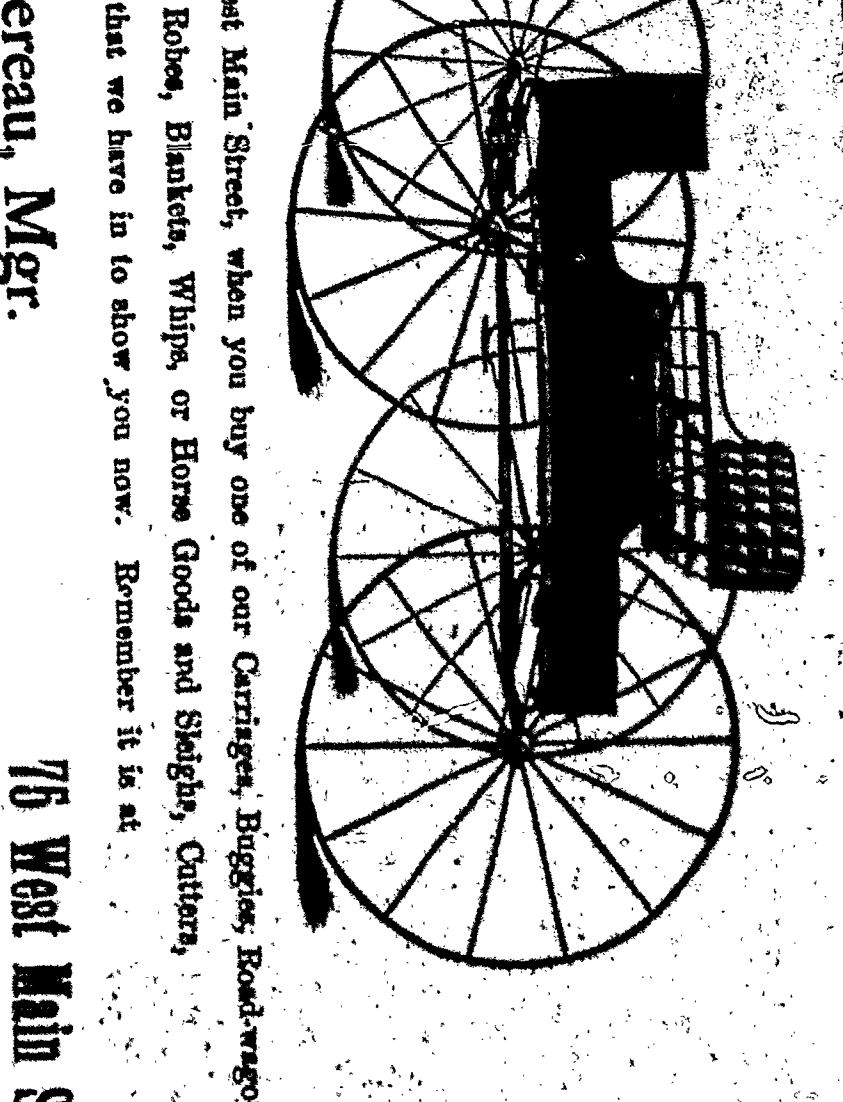
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
